PARIS, April 9, (P).—Premier Pierre Etienne Flandin decided to-



PILLAR OF CLOUD GRIM WARNING OF FOLLY

About all we need to finish the warning from the western plains is a pillar of fire by night. We had the pillar of cloud by day, and it went swirling eastward as a grim reminder of the fate that follows after folly.

A dust storm, of course, is a natural phenomenon like a cyclone or a flood. But unlike these it is partly a man-made thing, also. We got our dust storm because of the way we used our land, and it was an ominous indication of the way nature can go on the rampage when man upsets her balance.

Altogether, it is a queer situation. We expanded our agricultural production beyond reason, a few years ago, just as we expanded other kinds of production. By bringing under cultivation more land than we needed, we helped to give ourselves a farm depression which today is requiring the most heroic measures.

Then, as if that were not enough, high winds and dry weather combine to ruin the land which we unwisely plowed.

Out of it all we ought at least to get a new comprehension of the proper way to use our natural resources. Few lands have ever been as blessed with such resources as America. Fertile soil, great forests, mineral deposits—they were here in seemingly limitless abundance, and we let them dazzle us. We got into the habit of moving in on them en masse and letting the lucky first comers use them as they pleased.

That worked all right for a while. Now it is exacting a penalty. The dust storms are forcing us to learn that unwise exploitation of these resources has to be paid for by the nation as a whole. We can use our resources as individualists, but eventually we have to foot the bill

This is not true only of farm land. It is true of our forests, of our oil fields, of our coal deposits and of all the other riches with which nature blessed us. All of us must have a say in the way these things are used, because if they are used unwisely all of us will feel the effects.

This is the warning presented by our pillar of cloud. If we are as smart as we like to think we are, we won't wait for another warning before we insist that our resources be used under a plan which has the welfare of the whole country in view.

ESCAPE FROM REALITY

The way in which an economic crisis can be a direct menace to world peace was strikingly illustrated by a paragraph in a recent news dispatch from Berlin, telling of Germany's reaction to Hitler's rejection of the military clauses of the Versailles treaty.

"The entire country," said the dispatch, "has forgotten its economic troubles during the last few days to swamp Hitler's office with enthusiastic letters and tele-

It is right there that the danger lies. Any national leader, confronted by an insoluble economic crisis, can always take his people's minds off of their troubles by adopting a "strong" foreign policy. The temptation to adopt such a policy, therefore, is extremely great.

But a strong foreign policy is the kind of policy that eventually leads to war. In trying to submerge the economic problem, the leader runs the grave danger of starting something that can only be finished by fighting.

scores who have visited the hole dug by two young farmers on a ranch near Bronte. The farmers admit they have been seeking the "Bronte gold" for more than ten years.

The legend has matured with the years. Estimates of treasure reputed to be buried in this section range as high as \$90,000 but all variations of the story agree that was in \$20-gold pieces.

Like other major "buried treasure" tales this one goes back to the lawless frontier days.

"The stage drivers and passengers were killed and the government payroll taken. The rangers were sent to hunt the robbers and three sent to hunt the last man dangerously wounded, hid. Too weak to carry the gold he is supposed to have buried it between three live oak trees and marked them with a bowie knife. Dying, he reached the old Butterfield hotel, three miles south of the river crossing, and told of hiding the money. "Some people say the Indians held up the stage but only white men knew the value of gold," Elkins said.

Three frees on a ranch threefourths of a mile from the Colorado
crossing fit into the story. Each is
marked with a long V (treasure language for "deposit beneath").

The faint marks of the Butterfield trail are visible near by and
the rock foundation of the old hotel
where stage coaches changed horses
can still be seen. The government
paid its outpost soldiers in silver
or gold and the Butterfield stage
was the only means of reaching
them. Robberies were common.

The Butterfield trail was laid out
from St. Louis in Sept. 1858 and was
in use in March 1861.
