Since December 1918 the organization as part of its health education work has held 980 classes in home hygiene and care of the sick, with 8,859 mothers instructed. 

## TEN COTTON STATES WILL SELL AS UNIT

COMBINATION OF TIONS WILL CONTROL 3 TO 4 MILLION BALES

The American Cotton Growers' Exchange, an overhead selling agency to be made possible by a federation of the cotton growers' marketing associations being formed in ten states with a total of probably three of four million bales of cotton, has been tentatively planned by representatives of Texas, Oklahoma, and eight other cotton growing states, it was announced by C. O. Moser, executive secretary of the Texas Farm Bureau, upon his return to Dallas from a conference of representatives of these states in Oklahoma City.

The Oklahoma marketing association oversubscribed its 300,000 bale quota by more than 100,000 bales and is incorporating with 35,000 seven year members. The triumph of the Oklahoma cotton farmers in organizing to sell their cotton co-operatively on so large a scale has sent a feeling of confidence throughout the South, Mr. Moser said.





### We have urgent OIL DEVELOPMENT IN THE PECOS FIELD

Since the shooting of the Troxel well on section 8, block 59, public school land, 16 miles northwest from (\$288.40) dollars and costs of suit, plained in free Catalog "G." Write Toyah and about 30 miles west and north from Pecos Tuesday the oil has risen in the well to a depth of 600

> The shot was placed in 80 feet of oil saturated sand at between 1870 and 1950 feet, and 250 quarts of nibile loads of people present to witness the shooting and between 500 and 600 people. The shot is said to have been a very satisfactory one and following the explosion which sounded only a dull thud the derrick was enveloped in an oil saturated mud and rock which went over the top of the derrick. Soon after the shot the derrick was filled with sight seers many of whom were covered with mud and rock from another burst of gas which sent the rock and mud to the top of the derrick.

> The shot revealed only a small quantity of oil and it was evident the hole was bridged. On Wednesday the tools were let down and penetrated according to Mr. Hancock, of Parker & Hancock who are interested in the well, oil to a depth of 600 feet before striking the bridge 125 feet from the bottom of the hole.

> Later reports show that the well is gradually increasing in oil and in all probability will be flowing over the top within a few days. It is almost a cinch that if it does not flow it will be a splendid pumper which only the cleaning out of the hole and time will tell.

> Many will be interested to know just how an oil well is "shot" and this writer will not attempt to tell more than he heard from those in charge of the shooting for he is forced to confess that he gave the well and nitro wagon a wide berth until the stuff was safely placed in the bottom of the well. The nitro was lowered in the well in tubes with cone shaped bottoms, in order that they would not hang on any obstructions, by cable. It took two or three hours to perform this feat. Then they are set off either by dropping a weight in the well

or by electric current. On this occasion only a dull thud preceded the mass of smoke, rock and mud which came from the well with great force. After the first and main explosion at intervals there were several others and as the crowd dispersed only a sight smoke and gas were coming from the hole.

Mr. Livingston is now on the job at the Laura well with a trained force of men and is said to be pushing operations. Those in charge of the Laura well have pulled the 6 5-8 inch casing and are busy taking out the 8 1-4 inch casing which will be replaced with a new string of the same size and run on down to a depth of 2500 feet. Then the 6 5-8 inch casing will be run on down to a depth of 4200 feet if oil in commercial quantities is not encountered before that depth is reached.

The gas in the Laura was so strong that three of the force were "knocked out" on Tuesday and now the workmen are all wearing gas masks and have an electric fan in operation to blow away the fumes which are getting stronger every



### **NEW STATE IDEA** GAINING HEADWAY

VETO OF WEST TEXAS A. & M. BILL CAUSE OF MUCH DISCONTENT

West Texas is not greatly pleased, so far, with the governor it so strongly supported in the last election. Most of us are pretty sore, and the old idea of separating the east from the west has been revived, with a good deal of enthusiasm. Note the following from the Buletin of the Young Men's Business League of Ballinger:

"Everything was all set for the West Texas A. & M. location fight, when Pat pulled the chair out from under us, but Ballinger will line up with other West, Texas towns through the medium of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to put over the A. & M. Bill at some subsequent session if the East Texas Legislature. (Apologists for Pat can explain his economy, but they can't explain why he gave the University of Texas \$1,350,000.00, that was not a platform demand, and vetoed the \$50,000.00 appropriation for West Texas.)"

This expression is pointed, suggestive, but less so than many others we note. For instance the following from the last issue of the Ft. Stockton Pioneer:

The nucleus of an organization was started last week at Sweetwater proposing a division of the State of Texas. This purpose has been in the minds of the people for more than 30 years, but lately it has come to a head following the almost complete disregard that has been paid to the interests of West Texas by the machinery of government at Austin.

The people of West Texas have suffered long and have been kind. They have paid an over-proportion of the taxes and have little or no repres-



GENERAL REPORT OF RANGE CONDITIONS

Under date. April 27th, the U.S. weather bureau, station at Amarillo, gives out the following general report of range conditions:

Amarillo District-The weather during the week appears to have been favorable to the ranges and the livestock, except that a shortness in the moisture content, is noted over the northern tier counties, and eastern New Mexico, where the observer at the latter section reports stock poor, ranges very poor throughout southeastern New Mexico. Compared with the weather for the corresponding week in 1920, there appears a decided shortness of precipitation for the current period. Rain needed over northern and western sections of the district. Some shipping to Kansas grazing fields. Over the Utah district the week was cold and stormy, and a heavy snowfall over the western portion retarding shearing generally; loss in shorn sheep heavy, locally, in the western portion. Other livestock in good condition. Pastures good. Over the Wyoming district the week was dry in north, but wet and cold in south portion. Livestock perhaps weaker from grazing new grass. Lambing loss small, as storms were of short duration. Over the Arizona district the observer reports diminishing stock water supply rendering conditions more serious. Stock only fair, and some are being shipped to pasture from southern section.
