EL PASO, March 3. (P).—El Paso's power strike situation was quiet Monday night with utility officiais and strike leaders holding apart while civic leaders made plans to offer peace overtures.

Utility officials announced that a 25,000-volt generator, assertedly damaged when workers walked out of the Rio Grande plant last Thursday, would be restored to service tomorrow.

Thousands of signatures have been gathered in a campaign by municipal ownership advocates, who will ask city officials tomorrow to study plans for power plant contents.


