

Winter Everywhere

Winter reigned unchallenged in Texas Thursday and Friday from the Panhandle to the Gulf of Mexico and the Rio Grande. After blanketing large areas of

South Texas and many sections of West Texas with a fall ranging up to several inches, snow began whitening the countryside in the northcentral and western parts of the state to intensify the cold weather

which has rayaged crops in the state the past three days.
