CALL LEAGUE PLAN MORE THREAT THAN A PLEA FOR PEACE

Italian Journals in Attacks Upon Motive

DELAY DECISION

Desire Guarantees Before Accepting New Offer

Rome. Mar. 4 (A)—Fascist newspers today characterized the Lea-

pers today characterized the League of Nations appeal for peace as more like a threat than a sincere effort to halt the war. The papers branded the plea an effort to exert pressure on Italy at a moment when widtory against the Ethiopians seems assured.

Well informed sources predicted that Italy would not reply with a direct yes or no to the peace plea, but would seek a definite statement on guarantees it would receive before halting hostilities.

Italy's nothern army, continuing a series of major triumphs, today smashed the last complete Ethiopian army on the northern front.

A force of 30,000 Ethiopians under Ras Imeru was routed after a three day battle on the western sector, along the Takazze river.

There the Ethiopians had attempted to block an Italian movement toward Lake Tana, headwaters of the Nile.

Fascists proceeded swiftly with mopping up operations in the Tembien area and in every direction the ground was littered with enemy dead and wounded and abandoned arms.

The victory was described as com-

The victory was described as complete a one as the recent ones over three Ethiopian leaders—Rases Mulugheta, Kassa and Seyoum.

Driving forward, the fascists occupied four mounts—Anding, Enda, Mariam and Quoram.

Italian airplanes riddled with machine gun fire 4,000 Ethiopians who sought to flee from the sector and flew up and down the valley of Takazze to mop up any resistance.

The Henrys were first indicted in the case Feb. 1, 1935, soon after a skeleton identified as that of McBee was found hanging from a tree near Rising Star.

Henry and his wife were held in Jail here. His bond was set at \$6,000 and Mrs. Henry's at \$3,000. Mrs. Henry formerly was the wife of McBee.


A. W. Holden, tetchnical supervisor of the state tax survey, and R. B. Anderson, youthful state tax commissioner, each spoke of the importance of the survey.

President Faces Arduous Campaign

WASHINGTON, March 4. (U.P)—
President Roosevelt today entered he homestretch of his administration faced with the task of soon going before the nation to uphold in a campaign for reelection the New Deal policies that have made the country as "government conscious" as during the days of the Civil War. The Chief Executive, facing the last nine months of his present term, has rounded out his protest of social and economic leg-

Crisis Faced 3 Years Ago
A glimpse into the recent past brings a picture of the President taking office on a bleak March day of 1933 with the economic structure collapsing and business calling loudly for succor.

His first act on entering the White House on that memorable day was to summon his cabinet and shortly thereafter declare the national bank holiday until legislation could be enacted by a special session of Congress to meet the emergency.

Then came the embargo on gold and an executive order revamping

and an executive order revamping the country's monetary policy. With those pressing problems out of the way, the President took a short breathing spell and then moved toward the development of his long-range economic and social program for recovery. There came in rapid succession a farm program, since outlawed by the Supreme Court, the NRA, also declared unconstitutional, the Supreme Court, the NRA, and S

also declared unconstitutional, the TVA, which has been upheld, and a steady drive for reciprocal trade agreements with foreign nations, the most notable and publicized one being that which recently was concluded with Canada.

During his term, the President, an ardent preparedness advocate, built up the navy to an approach of the parity described by the London and Washington treaties, increased the army, created the

During those three years Congress at the insistence of Mr. Roosevelt voted billions of dollars for relief, the last appropriation being \$4,880,000,000, from which evolved the Works Progress Administration, the National Youth Administration, Rural Resettlement and an extension of public works building. The first two of the three years witnessed a continuation of the popularity of the President, and the election of 1934 bore out the contention of political observers that "nothing could beat him".

The "honeymoon", however, ended in the late summer of 1935 when Mr. Roosevelt dispatched to Capitol Hill a special message urging a new tax program designed to extend the levies on the rich.


