Jurist Journeys to Pantless Prisoner

When a judge goes to jail to try a prisoner that's news, but that is what Judge Knowles, justice of peace in precinct one, city judge and bearer of other titles, was forced to do today.

The prisoner, an Odessa man, was discovered by offibefuddled from intoxicating libations, yet presenting an immaculate appearance, with one exception—he had no trousers. All other requirements of what the well-dressed man should wear were be ing conformed with except lack of the customary limb adornment.
