## **ICKES THREATENS CANCEL LOUISIANA WORK PROJECTS**

Says PWA Funds Not Be Used for Long Machine

WASHINGTON, April 16, (P).—In scathing attack on Senator Huey Long of Louisiana, Secretary of the Interior Ickes today threatened o cancel all public works projects in Long's home state if legislation is passed to give Long authority over the local projects.

"PWA funds haven't been used to get up a political machine anywhere

"PWA funds haven't been used to set up a political machine anywhere and they won't be used that way in Louisiana," Ickes said. "They certainly won't be used to build up Senator Long's political machine.

Ickes referred to the Louisiana Legislature, now in session as considering a measure, introduced by Governor O. K. (Huey) Allen, giving state authority over the expenditure of Federal funds by localities.

GENEVA, April 16. (P).—France, Britain and Italy today submitted to the extraordinary council session of the League of Nations a draft of the resolutions condemning any "unilateral repudiation of international obligations such as Germany's repudiation of the armaments clauses of the Versailles treaty."

The French Foreign Minister, Pierre Laval, although faced with opposition to the resolution by several nations, notably Poland and Denmark, received the strong support of spokesmen of both Britain and Italy when the resolution was presented to the council.

A promising beginning is being made in the task of he providing the United States with a unified police system, which can cope with modern criminals.

Fourteen states and some 150 cities are expected to get together in the near future in a scheme of co-operation by which information can be exchanged promptly and co-operation can be achieved. State bureaus of identification are being established to co-operate with the federal bureau at Washington. Legislatures are considering schemes to have state police forces supplement the work

of sheriffs and country police.

The result of all this should be to make the path of such men as Dillinger and Floyd infinitely more rocky. The kind of co-operation that will enable the law to strike promptly across state and city lines is precisely the kind of thing that the criminal connot cope with. It is encouraging to see that we are going to get some of it.







An increase of approximately 10,000 in the enlisted strength of army units in the Eighth Corps Area will follow enactment of the legislation raising the personnel of the army to 165,000, Maj. Gen. Johnson Hagood, commander of the Third Army and Eighth Carp Area, said.

Infantry, cavalry and engineer companies will be increased from their present strength of about 65 ment to 120 and all other branches of the service will receive an increase of about 30 per cent. None of the increase will go to staff organizations.
