Kill Stormy Petrel of Cuban Strife

ANTONIO GUITERAS SHOT BY SOLDIERS FROM AN AMBUSH

Was Secretary War, Navy and Interior At One Time

HAVANA, May 8, (P).—Antonio Guiteras, American-born stormy petrel of Cuba's recent political strife, alleged kidnaper, extortionist and terrorist, was killed in a battle with soldiers near Matanzas today, army officers announced. One of Guiteras' followers and two soldiers died in the skirmishing.

Major Valls of the Cuban army said that Guiteras, who formerly was Secretary of the Interior, War and Navy, fell into an ambush laid for him and his radical companions.

Guiteras had been widely sought as the instigator of the \$300,000 kidnaping of young Eutimio Falla Bonet, Cuban millionaire, and was trying to escape the island at the time of his death Valls said.

ROTARY GOVERNOR


