Rain fell at Sierra Blanca, and apparently over much territory back this way.

Ranchmen said the rain this time, coming before previous moisture had dried except on the surface of the ground, would assure ample grass for months to come. Many farmers had their crops up to a sufficient stand that the moisture was highly beneficial. Others had planted the second or third time, on account of hail or hard rains, and were delayed somewhat in getting the seed into the ground.

However, it was declared generally that the season in the ground at present is the best since 1932 and one of the best over a long period

Many outlying ranches have reported much heavier rain than has fallen at Midland. Lake water is abundant in many places and the growth of grass and weeds has been almost phenominal, considering the extent to which the ranges had been dried out and grazed off.

Pastures in which the "turf" was practically gone now have new grass from an inch to five inches in height. Pastures which had not been heavily stocked, and which had a substantial amount of old grass, have taken on the aspect of wheat fields in some areas.

"The greatest come-back" in years is the term applied by ranchmen to the ranges around Midland.
