Antis Show Strength In Testing of Prohibition

WASHINGTON, March 14. (UP)-Anti-prohibitionists today lost their motion to bring the Beck-Linthi-cum resolution before the house but mustered unexpected strength in the first clear-cut test of prohibition in

The house voted 227 to 187 against discharging the judiciary committee from consideration of the resolution, calling for submission to the states of an amendment to the constitution for returning to the states control of liquor traffic.

The discharge of the committee would have brought the resolution directly before the house.

Among those voting were Buchanan of Brenham, Kleburg of Corpus Christi and Mansfield of Columbus. Others of the Texas delegation voted against the motion, were absent or withheld their vote.

ART AND HARD TIMES

Hard times or no, the cause of art seems to be a flourishing one. The American Art Dealers association recently came to bat with the estimate that during the past year gifts of paintings, sculpture and facilities for art appreciation and education worth more than \$136,-000,000 were made to the American public.

Most of this is made up of the opening of new museums and of private collections turned over to the public. Chief among the latter is the \$50,000,000 collection of the late Henry Clay Frick, which became public property last in it. fall on the death of his widow.
