Recover 35 Bodies from South Nebraska Flood Waters

KNOWN TOLL OF **DEAD INCREASED** TO 140 PERSONS

2,000 Families May Be Homeless, Is Estimated

McCOOK, Nebr., June 3. (AP). — Thirty - five bodies been taken from the flood swept Republican river valley in southern Nebraska today when State Senator W C. Bullard, general chairman of relief work here, an-nounced that the known death toll was about 140

persons.

J. M. Powers of Saint Louis, Red Cross official, said between 1,000 and 2,000 Nebraska families were homeless. Bullard estimated that 5,000 head of cattle were dead and 50 miles of railroad track were washed

Rescue work and the search for bodies continued in 11 Nebraska counties. Property damage was estimated at above \$12,000,000.

Storm Waters Reach Kansas CONCORDIA, Kan., June 3. (A).— A mighty head of flood water rolled into North-Central Kansas from Ne-braska Sunday engulfing the valley of the Republican River and driving

No further losses of life were discovered here Sunday. The Platte and Republican Rivers, which carried the Colorado flood waters east to add to the burden caused by cloudbursts, were subsiding in Eastern Colorado and Western Nebraska and Kansas. The crest of the Platte River passed through Julesburg, in the northeastern corner of Colorado, without heavy damage.

The Republican River, ordinarily less than forty feet wide, was two and a half miles across in this vicinity. In its wild rampage through Nebraska and Northern Kansas it ripped houses and barns from their foundations and inundated thousands of acres of growing grain.

Routed residents of the bottom land villages and farms huddled along the banks. Cattle and hogs were swept downstream among pieces of furniture and wreckage of houses. No further losses of life were dis-

were swept downstream among pieces of furniture and wreckage of nouses. Railroad tracks in the path of the flood were ripped loose and oridges carried away.

Forty houses here were covered by flood waters. Householders hastily gathered what furniture and bedding they could and fled. The Concordia ed Cross Chapter sent out an ap-al for bed clothing and garments

for the homeless.

Boatmen were patrolling the inundated area and no lives were believed endangered. Concordia citizens were advised to boil all drinking water as the flood waters had covered the city's wells.

The Gather Inn Dance Hall north of Concordia was floated from its foundation and moved seventy-five yards where it lodged against trees. State Highway 9 was covered with water and traffic over it was halted.

Pleads Guilty to a Part in Bremer Kidnaping

ST. PAUL, June 3. (AP) Volney Davis, 35, convicted of murder and one of the alleged kidnapers of Edward G. Bremer, who paid \$200,-000 for his release, was brought here today by airplane under heavy guard of

federal agents. Davis was a member of the Barker-Karpis gang and is a possible suspect in the kidnaping of George Weyerhaeuser, 9, at Tacoma, Wash., last week. He was arraigned before Federal Judge M. M. Joyce and pleaded guilty to a part in the Bremer kidnaping.

Harold E. Anderson, district chief of the department of justice here, refused to discuss the phase of the case affecting the Weyerhaeuser boy who was returned safely Saturday morning.

It was indicated that Davis, who was captured at Chicago last Saturday, would be sentenced next Friday or Saturday.

When the band believed to consist of six men freed the member of a wealthy timber family early Saturday, it freed the hands of the Federal men and all other officers for one of the greatest manhunts on record

The first alarm in this grim search came from the Umatilla area of Northeast Oregon adjacent to the Washington line. A sedan containing five or six men burst through the cordon of State and county officers patroling all roads in 500 miles of Tacoma.

Traveling at a high speed the automobile outdistanced the slower vehicle of a Deputy Sheriff, but did not get through a circle of State police and Deputy Sheriffs around an area fifty miles in diameter.

Officers said there was every indication that the fugitives had speed off some sideroad in the same area that William Edward (The Fox) Hickman was captured in 1927 after he kidnaped and butchered little Marion Parker of Los Angeles.

BLOW AT CROOKED POLITICS

City planning experts, meeting in Cincinnati for a discussion of problems of urban life, are told by Frederic A. Delano of the National Resources Board that city planning is striking a mortal blow at the political corruption which makes most city governments so inefficient and expensive.

Planning, says Mr. Delano, tends to break up the heavily concentrated blocs of population which are the chief reliance of the political boss. By breaking them up it robs the boss of his chief source of strength—and, in consequence, makes it easier for the city to get a government responsive to the will of all the people instead of a small political clique.

These are hopeful words, and if city planning can work such wonders we might profitably get more and more of it everywhere. Unfortunately, however, the problem is a trifle more complex than that.

In the long run the people of any city get just about the kind of government they deserve. So long as they let indifference and self-interest govern their attitude toward local politics, they are pretty likely to get poor city government in return.
