On MacDonald's Resignation LONDON, June 7, (P)-Stanley

Baldwin, twice prime minister of Great Britain, accepted that post again today from King George after Ramsay McDonald, who had served as head of the government for six years, resigned.

MacDonald, who is leaving the post on account of failing health, surrendered his portfolio to King George during an hour's audience. MacDonald recommended that Baidwin succeed him.
