Midland is on the "eligible list" of 433 cities for which appropria-tion was approved in the house of representatives, at Washington, late for postoffices and public

The appropriation included \$88,-Oto for a new postoffice at Midland, according to Associated Press dis-patches. Civic leaders said Satur-day that Congressman R. E. Thom-ason deserved the principal credit for keeping Midland on the eligible list

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line. to keeping Midland on the eligible list. The appropriation was a part of the "second deficiency bill", going to the senate for action after being passed in the house. Congress recommends in the bill that the treasury and post office departments select buildings from a list of approximately 1,200 cities. It is not mandatory, however, that selections be made from the list, the two departments being given discre-tionary powers. The \$58,000,000 appropriation, it is estimated, will provide buildings for only about 433 cities. In some cases, the bill fixes the maximum that may be spent, but in others the matter of cost is left to the treasury and postoffice departments.
