CANYON. (P).—Experiments in wind erosion control will be conducted on the T-Anchor College farm here next year, T. M. Moore, professor of agriculture at West Texas State Teachers college and overseer of the farm, has announced.

The work will be done in cooperation with authorities at the federal soil erosion control project near Dalhart.

soil erosion control project hear Darhart.

The farm is operated entirely by volunteer labor. Moore selects 40 young men each year from applications of high school graduates. The farm helps them defray their school expenses, serves as a laboratory for the college agricultural department and supplies milk to the dormitories and cafeteria.

Moore said the farm had completed a successful year. He listed construction of a five-room rock house and an irrigation project as the principal achievements. The house was built of native rock by student labor at a cost of less than \$400.

A 14-acre pasture, irrigated from an artificial lake, helped to reduce feed costs for the dairy herd. About 200 trees are being planted around the lake in a program to create a college recreation grounds.



Duck Stamps Sold To Anyone Under New Law Passed

WASHINGTON.—Stamp collectors

WASHINGTON.—Stamp collectors and friends of conservation who are not hunters, may now purchase 1934-35 duck stamps without having them affixed to hunting licenses or certificates. A new law provides that the stamps may be purchased by anyone, and in unlimited quantities.

The new law making this effective, approved by President Roosewelt on June 15, opens to the public the sale of the first migratory-bird hunting stamp, designed by J. N. (Ding) Darling and required of hunters of ducks and geese last season. Provisions of the original law that authorized the duck stamp made it difficult for nonhunters to purchase stamps and also required that each stamp sold should be attached to a hunting license or a special certificate. The stamps may now be purchased at post offices at one dollar (\$1.00) each, either singly, in block, or in full sheets of 28 stamps remaining unsold after June 30 will be destroyed.

This announcement is issued by the Biological Survey of the Department of Agriculture, so that persons and organizations desiring to make their contributions to the migratory - waterfowl program in this manner, and stamp collectors who have previously sought the stamps unaffixed to a license or a certificate, may now obtain as many as desired before they are withdrawn from sale.
