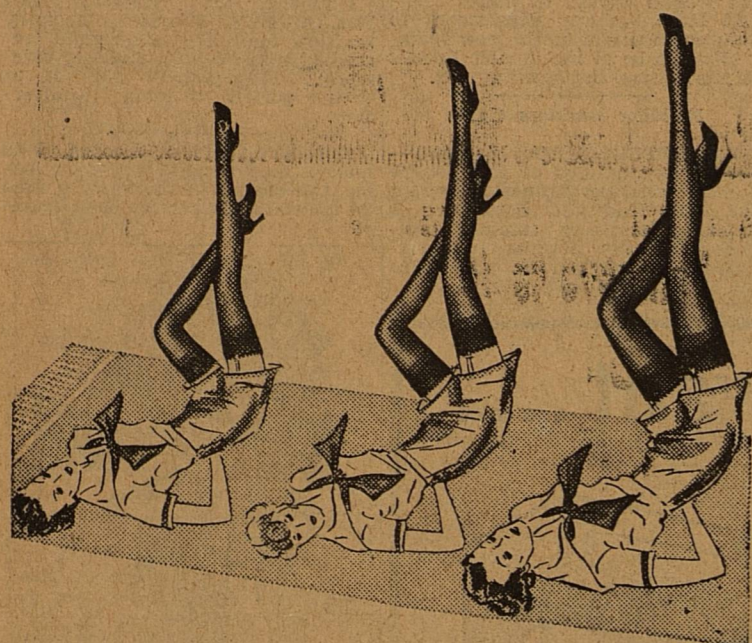

WITH COUNTY DEMONSTRATION CLUBS

"Plant your tomato seed where you want your tomatoes to grow" is a practice being demonstrated by Betty J. Stewart, Prairie Lee 4-H club girl. Four tomato seeds were planted in a well prepared seed bed. The seed were covered one-half inch deep with a mixture of powdered manure and soil. The manure was added to prevent soil packing. A tin can with both ends removed was placed over the hill of seed. Water was applied in a shallow ditch around the bottom of the can. After the water was taken up by the soil the shallow ditch was covered with a mulch of soil to retain moisture. After the seed germinate the best plant will be left with the tin can around it until it has made a substantial growth.

Some ceiling and 2 x 4's removed from an outhouse and hinges, nails and a catch costing fifty cents have been made into a clothes closet 4 1/2 feet by 26 inches for Mrs. A. L. Hellman, first year wardrobe demonstrator of the Busy Bee club.

The closet was first papered with heavy brown paper to make it dust-proof. White ceiling paper was then applied for reflecting light and as a precaution against moths which prefer dark closets. Side shelves were made for hats and folded garments. A high shelf extending the length of the closet was added for out-of-season storage. The full length of the closet was installed for hanging clothes.

Scrap lumber built into a clothes closet can eliminate the nail and sheet system of storage.

Efficiency may be added to clothes closets already built, according to Mrs. Henry Locklar, first-year demonstrator. Gold Star home demonstration club, who added a low rod so that the children could get and

From a patch of English peas 30 feet square, said by J. F. Roseborough, extension horticulturist, to be the best that he had seen growing in West Texas, Mrs. T. D. Jones, living a mile south of Midland on the Rankin highway, gathered a bushel basket of peas at one picking.

The peas, Bliss variety, were planted about Feb. 25 in a well-spaced seed bed six inches apart in the drill with rows 12 inches apart. Cultivation was with a push garden ploy until the middles were a matted mass of growth. Irrigation of the surface type kept the peas growing rapidly. Harvest began May 10. The vines continue to bloom and bear profusely.

A total of 34,586 row feet of garden vegetables consisting of 42 varieties has been planted in the garden of five Stokes club girls. Twenty-five of those varieties have been planted since the recent rains. Three of the number are field gardens which lessen labor by field
