If you sometimes suspect that states and cities are inclined to spend too much money on public playgrounds and other recreational projects, consider these figures, compiled by the National Recreation Association.

Last year attendance at outdoor playgrounds in the United States was 300,000,000—a gain of 66,000,000 over 1933. At indoor centers, attendance increased 15,000,000 to a total of 75,000,000.

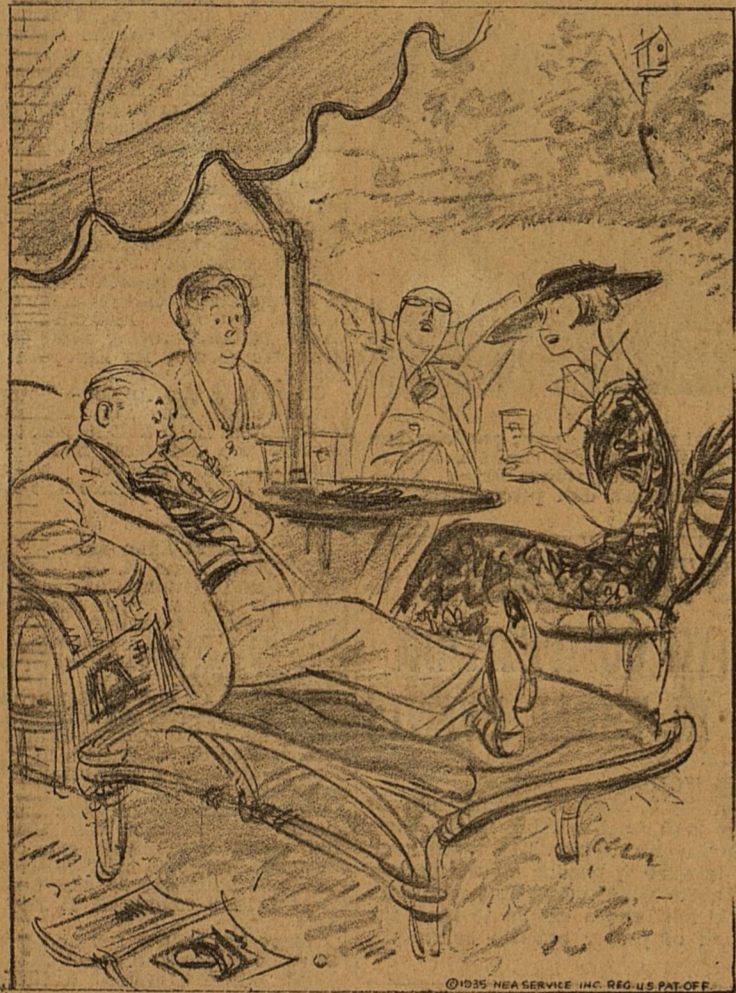
Meanwhile, the number of cities reporting organized public recreation activities rose from 1036 to 2190, and expenditures shot up from \$27,000,000 to \$41,000,000.

Increase in expenditures and in total number of playgrounds available was largely due to allocation of emergency relief funds to recreation projects.

Tremendous increase in public use of such facilities can only mean that they meet a very real need. Money spent for playgrounds seems to be money very well spent.

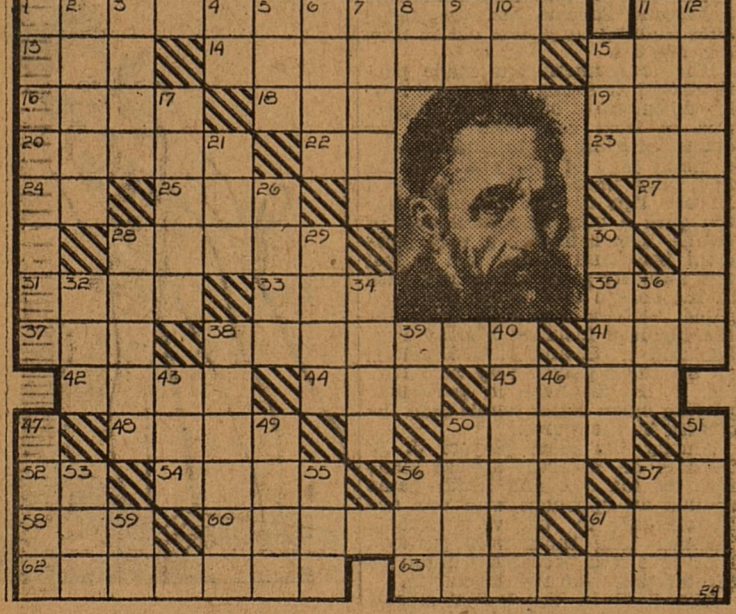

Frozen Dessert's The Berries When Days Are Roasting

By MARY E. DAGUE NEA Service Staff Writer On a roasting hot summer day can you imagine anything more delightful than to sit down to a meal of refreshingly cool dishes—accompanied by a chilled beverage or frozen dessert?

Frozen Strawberries Georgette

One quart strawberries, 1-2 cups sugar, 1-2 cup boiling water, 1 pint whipping cream, 1-2 cup powdered sugar, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla, 1 teaspoon granulated gelatin, 2 tablespoons cold water. Wash and hull berries. Combine granulated sugar and water and bring to the boiling point. Add berries and remove at once from the fire. Let stand two hours. I tried sprinkling half the berries with sugar and letting them stand two hours, but these berries were dry after freezing. Those in the syrup had just as fresh a flavor but had absorbed enough sugar to prevent hard freezing. Soften gelatin in cold water and dissolve over hot water. Whip cream until firm. Stir in powdered sugar, dissolve gelatin and vanilla and beat a few seconds. Put prepared berries in freezing trays and cover with whipped cream. This amount will fill two trays. Freeze two hours or longer until firm. Unmold and garnish with fine large berries to serve.

To unmold a frozen dessert of this type, run a spatula around the sides of the mold. Then put the platter on serving dish, which has been chilled, over the mold and invert. Put a hot towel over the bottom of the mold for a minute and the mold lifts off easily. Peaches Instead of Berries Later in the season try peaches in place of strawberries in this recipe. The only thing to remember about using fruits in frozen desserts is the necessity of saturating them with sugar, otherwise they will be frozen hard.

This is a particularly good dessert to serve with veal because veal is very low in fat calories. For dinner it goes well with hot bouillabaisse and tiny noodles, breaded veal outlets, buttered rice, creamed new carrots and asparagus salad.

Huge Skeletons Believed Indians

HARLINGEN, (U.P.)—A number of over-sized skeletons found on the Adams tract west of here when an irrigation system was constructed are believed to be those of Carankaway Indians, a race of giants that once inhabited this part of Texas.

The skeletons reveal that the men were from four to six inches taller than the average man of today. The Carankaways, a primitive tribe of grass-hopper-eating Indians, were said to have been abnormally tall. They also lived on seafood but are said to have been of so low a type that they lived in the brush like animals, not building shelter of any kind.

Volney Smith, engaged in construction of the irrigation system, estimates that portions of 35 skeletons have been uncovered. Since the skeletons cover only a small portion of the tract, he estimates that there must be hundreds, perhaps thousands, of skeletons beneath the soil. Bones have been uncovered by ditching machines all over the tract, indicating that the burial ground was not concentrated.

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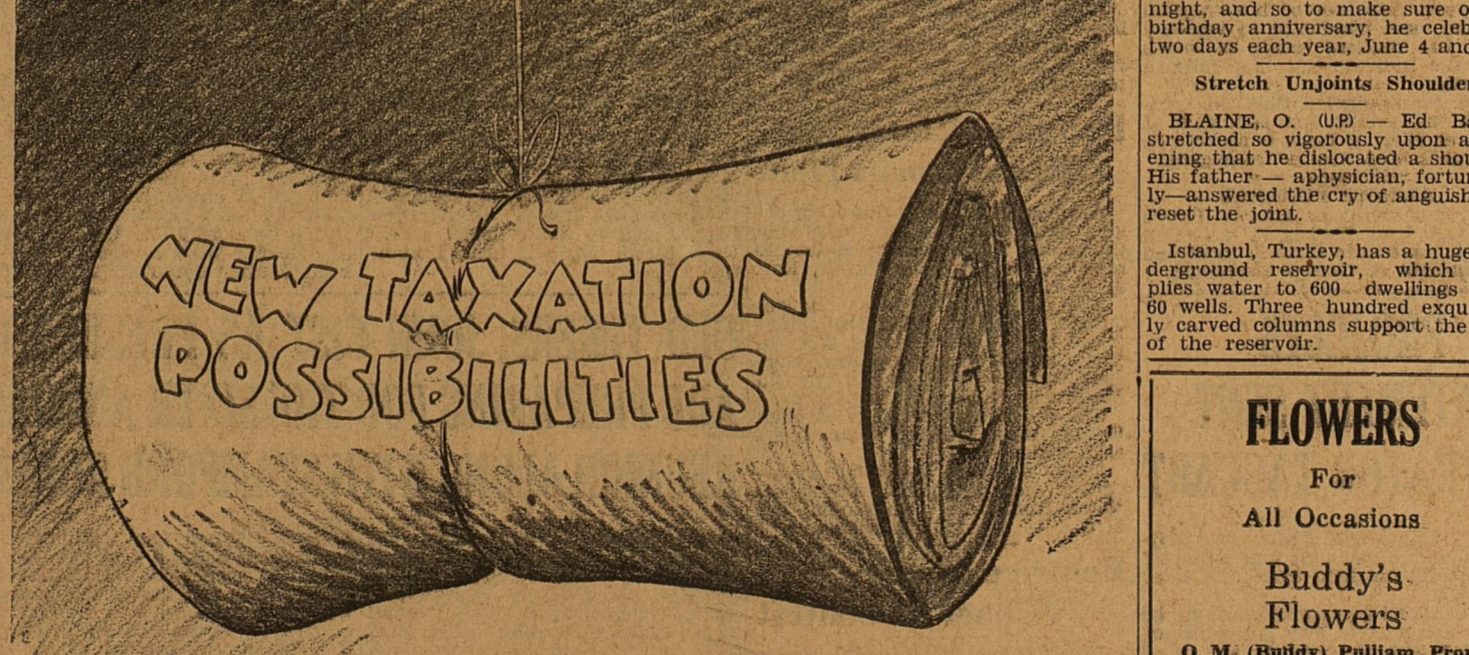
