# Pres. Cardenas to Continue His Church-State Program

# FIRST MEETING OF NEW CABINET

Says Will Enforce Present Laws on Problem

MEXICO CITY, July 2. (A).-A clear indication that the government of President Lazaro Cardenas intends to continue its present program and policies came today from the first meeting of the new cab-

gram and policies came today from the first meeting of the new cabinet.

It was learned today that Cardenas made plain his future plans by re-reading to the cabinet yesterday his January first message to the nation.

The President asserted that the present laws on the church-state problem would be fully enforced.

The re-stating of his program was taken to mean that there would be no modification of the religious or educational laws.

It was unofficially reported yesterday that the government campalgn against the church would be relaxed but news today indicates that the President is opposed to any movement in that direction.

Well informed sources today said that Cardenas had not altered his proposal to issue an order to federal and military authorities to withdraw charges of rebellion against exiles, permitting them to return.

Occupants of the bank quickly spread the alarm, and a posse led by Deputy Sheriff Walker Good followed the bandit car as it sped out of town.

The trail, soon lost, was again picked up when the abandoned machine was found near Fort Chadbourne, on the J. A. Dabney ranch. The rear window glass had been shattered, apparently to afford an unbroken range of fire should the chase become too close.

Director Sees Pair

E. C. Rawlings, director of the bank whose ranch adjoins the Dabney property, saw two men speeding toward Bronte, as he started to town after being informed of the robbery. The pair went on the western edge of town and were thought headed south toward San Angelo.

Rawlings gave the description of the second car used by the bandits, carrying a New Mexico license plate; but accounts varied as to whether it was a Plymouth or a Dodge. Officers late last night had not ascertained where the fleeing pair had obtained the machine.

Sheriff Frank Percifull of Robert Lee was heading the search in Coke count; while Sheriff W. A. Holt and Runnels county officers were on the guard in that area, in which direction the fleeing pair were at first believed headed.

### "WORK FOR A SANE FOURTH"

Editor's Note: The following is the second editorial on a safe and sane Fourth of July to be printed at the request of the Midland County Public Health Board.

"Work for a sane Fourth", says former governor of New York, Alfred E. Smith, in an editorial for the Parents Magazine. "We are told on good authority that more persons have already been killed or injured in celebrating our independence than were killed in acquiring independence. . . . I am firmly convinced that none of these deaths and none of these injuries need take place.

"The correction of the situation this year lies almost entirely in the hands of the fathers and mothers of American children. Nobody knows which children in America who are now alive, healthy and happy may be killed in fireworks accidents between now and the Fourth of July; nobody knows in which households are the 3,000 or more children who will be injured by fireworks accidents between today and the Fourth of July. They may be your children: they may be your neighbors'.

"If I were writing the prescription for the correction of this year's fireworks accident situation, I would put it about as follows:

"Use no fireworks and make it impossible for your children to use fireworks before or after the Fourth of

"If you do use fireworks on the Fourth, put no fire-works in the hands of little children; there is no such thing as safe fireworks for little children. Deaths have been caused by so-called harmless sparklers and by other apparently 'harmless' fireworks.

"If your children do use any fireworks, be present and watchful throughout the celebration to caution against or stop any risky practice.

"Better still, confine your celebration of the Fourth to watching the shooting of fireworks by pyrotechnic ex-

perts.
"Best of all, provide a worthwhile recreational program for your children and your neighbors' children on Thought Liberty the Fourth of July."


