WALMSLEY TELLS LEADERS HE WILL NOT QUIT OFFICE

Says Will Continue Fight on Huey Long Alone

NEW ORLEANS, July 12, (P).—
Presented with a formal request for his resignation by leaders of his political organization, Mayor T. Semmes Walmsley today refused to quit and reiterated his determination to continue his fight against Senator Huey P. Long alone if necessary.

Fourteen of Walmsley's 17 ward leaders signed a round robin asking the Mayor to step out in a move to end the political warfare between Senator Huey P. Long and the city administration.

U. S. LOSES IN AAA

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., July 12, (U.P.)—The United States District. Court granted a temporary injunction Thursday to sixteen large milling companies restraining collection of the AAA processing tax. The court denied a Government motion for dismissal of the injunction suit. The court, while it did not rule on constitutionality of the AAA, declared:

"We do not determine at this time that any provisions of the act in question are unconstitutional. A in question are unconstitutional. A reading of the cases offered by counsel however, amply supports the view that the constitutionality of the act is subject to serious doubt. It is sufficient to justify relief by temporary injunction.

"If there exists any serious or probable cause to believe that the taxes so authorized are unconstitutions."

taxes so authorized are unconstitu-tional, under the circumstances they come within the recognized rule of equitable jurisdiction."

The decision affected only taxes of May and June of the plaintiff companies, The taxes are held by the Federal Court pending final decision of the case.

NONE HURT WHEN TOP OF GIANT BAG **COLLAPSES TODAY** Projected Trip Now

Is Indefinitely Halted Rapid City, S. D. July 12, (A)-Disaster overtook the National Geogra-

phic Society United States army air corps stratosphere balloon here today as the giant bag collapsed from an unexplained cause at three a. m mountain time. No one was injured.
The top of the mammoth bag
burst without warning, permitting
375,000 cubic feet of helium gas to
escape and definitely halted the
projected flight.

Captain Albert W. Stevens, flight commander, said that there was "absolutely no explanation" for the

Spectators said that the ground rope suddenly slackened and the top of the giant bag flew open like a paper sack exploding.

As the helium, a colorless gas rushed out, a blue haze appeared all around it.

Officials of the National Geographic Society in Washington expressed the opinion that the explosion was caused by talcum powder used to prevent friction in foldin the balloon.

Stevens said that the balloon's top was probably three times as strong as that used in last year's

Man Hunting For Gold; Said To Be 12 Miles Of Here

CRANE, (P).—Men and women have been digging in the sand hills of West Texas for years in search of buried treasures. One legend is that \$184,000 in gold was buried by robbers in 1864. C. N. Newland, who has been a West Texas ranchman since 1888, says the loot is supposed to be hidden 12 miles from Midland, near a lake.

Newland says robbers waylaid a caravan of Spanish merchants near Horsehead Crossing on the Pecos river. The merchants were murdered and their wagon burned but Texas Rangers set a trap for the outlaws, killing all but one. Just before the fight started the gold was buried. The man who escaped the Rangers' bullets was sentenced to a life term in the penitentiary.

Twenty-five years later, Newland relates, the convict revealed the hiding place of the gold to the warden. The convict died soon after and the warden gave to a friend in West Texas a map of the treasure cache the convict had given him.

The map later came into possession of W. M. Bryant of Midland, who hired Newland in 1914 to stay on his ranch and do nothing but search for the treasure. Newland says he found a half circle of an old oxen bow and some yoke rings near the place specified on the map. The wagon tires from the caravan had remained intact and had been removed to a ranch nearby, Newland says.

DICTATORS STILL AWAIT THEIR CRUCIAL TEST

The lost liberties of the world have been lost only for a while, and not for keeps.

So says Dr. Ellis Paxon Oberholtzer, Philadelphia historian, in an address before the University of Virginia Institute of Public Affairs.

It is Dr. Oberholtzer's notion that we are now progressing through a painful cycle in human affairs in which, distressed by the fix into which we have got ourselves, we are looking for miracles. Being unable to accomplish any miracles of our own volition, he continues, we tend to turn to dictators who promise that they can do what

We get, therefore, in one country after another, dic-

We get, therefore, in one country after another, dictatorship.

Italy puts its fate in the hands of Mussolini, Geramany follows Hitler, Russia clings to Stalin, and other tended to all. nations find themselves turning toward similar men. And nations find themselves turning toward similar men. And out of it all has grown a feeling that the democratic idea has been worked out, that people are not and cannot be capable of solving their own problems in a complex modern world, and that a regime in which there is a relentless driving power applied to the attainment of some simply

"The new tyrant," he says, "will go the way of the old and take the same place in the history of man's movements on this earth."

Perhaps the greatest danger we run nowadays is the danger of growing discouraged by the progressive failure, in one country after another, of parliamentary institutions and democratic processes. By growing discouraged we prepare the way for the destruction of such institutions

and processes in our own country.

When we take the long view, and reflect that this reversion to dictatorship in the modern world is still approaching its crucial test, that in the long run it will stand or fall by the amount of plain human happiness it is able to bring to the ordinary citizen—when we do that, we are able to see that our own democracy is by no means discredited or outworn.

Suspended Sentence or Probation
Amendment

Proposition Number 5 on the ballot of the August 24th special election reads: "For (and Against) the Amendment to the State Constitution authorizing the Courts to place defendants on probation."

Proponents claim that if this amendment is passed, many who are now sent to the penitentiary for first offenses will be permitted to enjoy suspended sentences under restrictions of the court.
