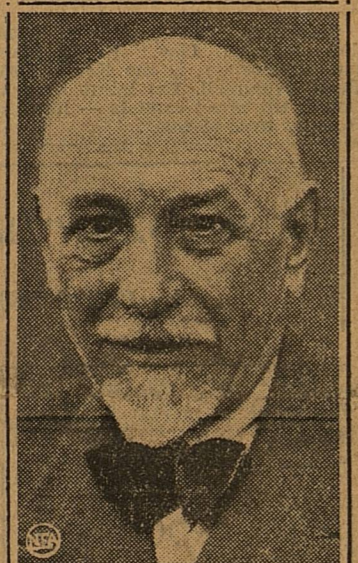

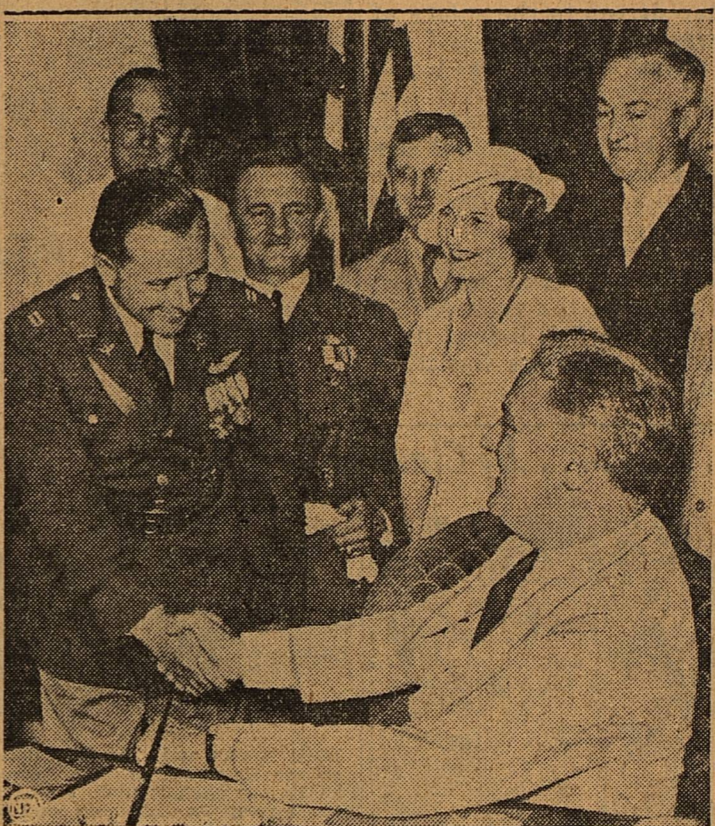

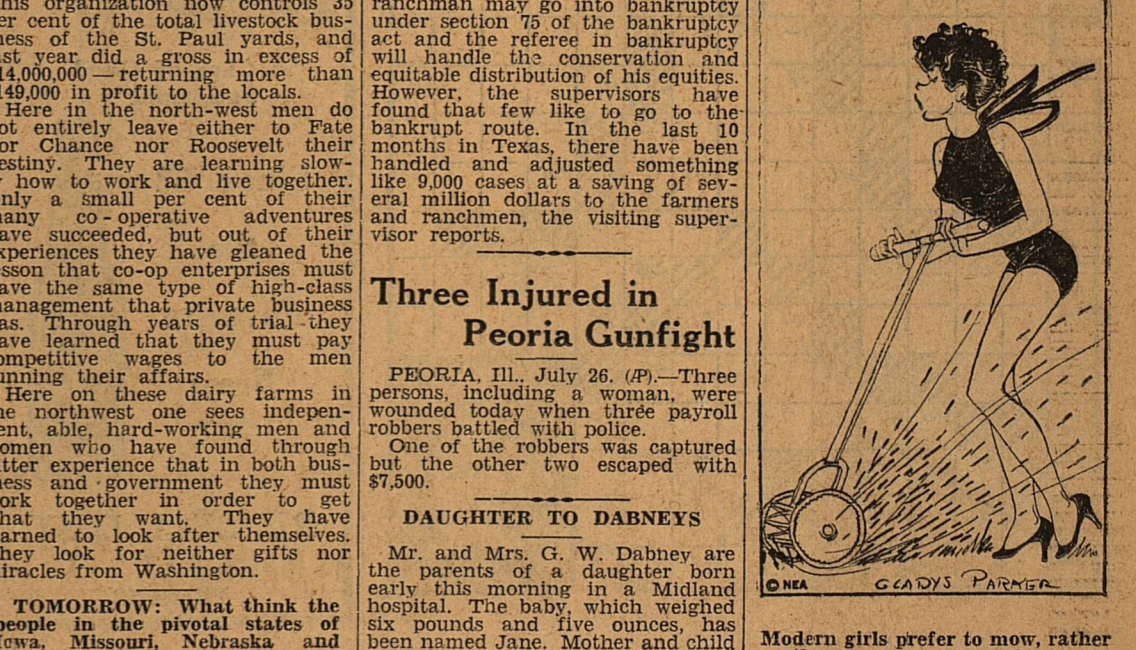

TOO MUCH DISCIPLINE

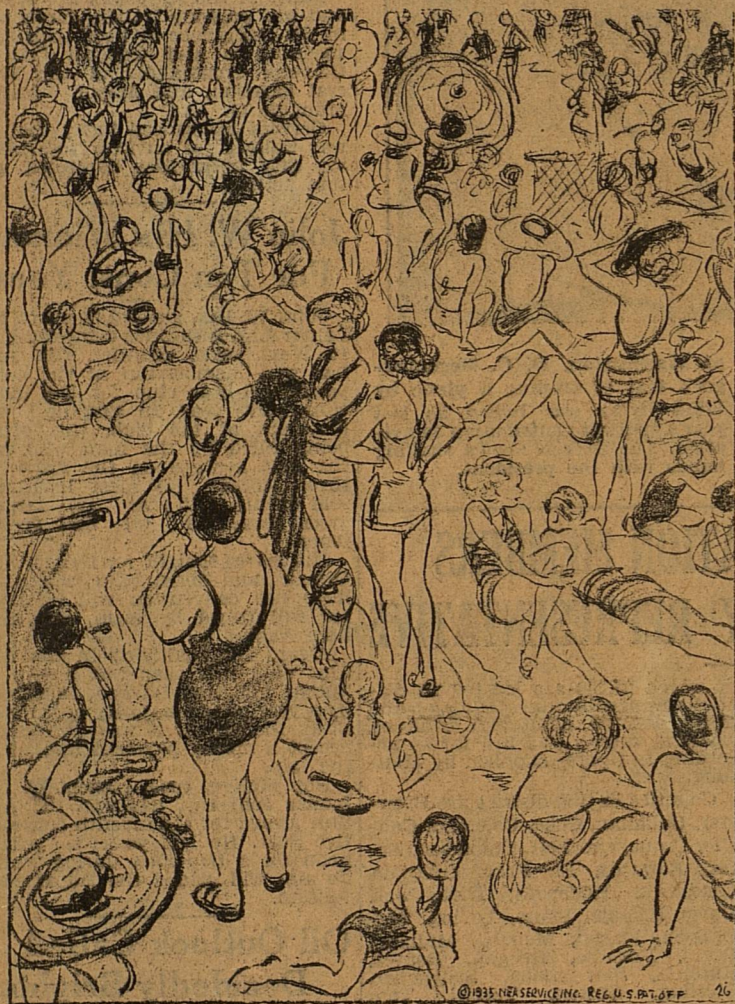
U. S. Army authorities are said to be preparing an official inquiry into conditions among enlisted men at Fort Clayton, in the Panama Canal Zone, as a result of a series of four suicides on the part of soldiers there in recent weeks.

Such an investigation has been demanded by Nelson Rounsevell, doughty editor of the Panama American, who asserts that the soldiers have been driven to the solace of the marijuana drug by the harsh treatment meted out by their officers, and that their use of the drug has led to the suicides.

Several of the officers at Fort Clayton, says Mr. Rounsevell, are Simon Legrees in khaki. Too-rigid discipline coupled with the ordinary trials of military life under the broiling sun of the tropics, he says, has been ruinous to the enlisted men's morale.

That a thorough investigation is called for seems obvious. This is not the first time that our army has been accused of fostering a Prussian spirit in the relationship between officers and men. If such a spirit is indeed driving soldiers to suicide, it is high time a change was instituted.
