### PATTON LEFT OUT OF HOTEL WITH A SMALL BOX; SAID

Admits Buying Four \$1000 Bonds in This Year

WASHINGTON. July 26, (A)—E.
B. Sellers, NRA employe, a surprise witness, told the Senate Lobby Committee today that Represenative Patton carried a small box from the hotel room of John W. Carpenter, President of the Texas Power and Light Company, the Sunday before the House vote on the holding company bill.

Sellers said that a couple of days later Patton showed him a bond which he claimed to have bought.

Before Sellers took the stand Patton voluntarily appeared to deny any wrong doing. The committee questioned his investments. He testified that he bought four government bonds of \$1,000 face value each since he came to Washington in January.

Sellers testified that the box which Patton carried out of the notel did not seem to be a cigar box, doubt that the package was a box

of cigars.

Chairman Black obtained statements from Sellers that he went to Carpenter's hotel with Patton and said that Patton left 30 or 40 minutes later with a "light box."

Taking the stand Patton, nervous, shaken declared, "I never heard tell of the little box that Sellers tells about."

### **GUARDS PATROL HOAQUIN STREETS** AFTER RIOTINGS

HOAQUIN, Wash., July 26, (P).— Squads of helmeted National Guardsmen patioled strategic cen-ters of Gray's harbor today after a riot in which 500 lumber strike sym-pathizers stoned a company of sol-

The company of guardsmen were being rushed to the aid of 10 troopers whom the crowd was beseiging after chasing them with a barrage

The troops charged the rioters with fixed bayonets and pursued them through streets. One guardsman was injured with a rock.

The disturbance was one of a series marking the strike of mill workers in Gray's harbor for the past month.

### Lamb, World Champion Bass Fisherman Here To Show Fans Fine Points of Game

Jack Lamb, world champion bass fisherman, is here and ready to show local fishing fans some of the fine points of the game. He was highly elated at the selection of the Courthouse lawn as the location for his exhibition, and said it was one of the prettiest spots in West Texas. Lamb stages his exhibitions at 6 p. m. in all cities for two reasons, first; because the wind usually dies about that time and wind is a great detriment to fly casting, and second; because most everyone is through working and can come out to witness the demonstration.

Lamb makes it plain that he to witness the demonstration.

Lamb makes it plain that he only tries to aid the amteur fisherman. He said there are two classes of fishermen, those who catch fish, and those who do not. Statistics show that only ten percent of all fishermen catch fish consistently. The remaining ninety percent have to carry their food along, or they don't eat. It is for the purpose of whoming the unsuccessful angler what is wrong with his fishing tactics that Lamb puts on his casting shows. He began these exhibitions 17 years ago as a hobby, and has taught more than a million people how to fool the elusive bass and other game fish.

Offers of every kind are made to Lamb for recommendation of various articles, and there are many people who cannot understand why he does not accept some of them. Jack Lamb is a deeply imbued sportsman, who loves the sport of fishing too well to besmirch it with commercialization. He fishes for the pleasure he gets out of it, and conducts free casting schools wherever he is so that others may enjoy the same pleasure. You cannot pay him to teach you. He will show you how it is done, but it is all free, and has always been that way. He has spent his own money for dozens of sets of fishing tackle and given it to young fishermen.


### TOO MUCH DISCIPLINE

U. S. Army authorities are said to be preparing an official inquiry into conditions among enlisted men at Fort Clayton, in the Panama Canal Zone, as a result of a series of four suicides on the part of soldiers there in recent weeks.

Such an investigation has been demanded by Nelson Rounsevell, doughty editor of the Panama American, who asserts that the soldiers have been driven to the solace of the marijuana drug by the harsh treatment meted out by their officers, and that their use of the drug has led to the suicides.

Several of the officers at Fort Clayton, says Mr. Rounsevell, are Simon Legrees in khaki. Too-rigid discipline coupled with the ordinary trials of military life under the broiling sun of the tropics, he says, has been ruinous to the enlisted men's morale.

That a thorough investigation is called for seems obvious. This is not the first time that our army has been accused of fostering a Prussian spirit in the relationship between officers and men. If such a spirit is indeed driving soldiers to suicide, it is high time a change was insti-

### Start Construction

BROWNWOOD. (A).—Construction work on buildings for a soil erosion CCC camp to be established here by September 1, has been started on a 12-acre tract adjoining the south city limits of Brownwood. The work will be completed in about one month.

Fourteen carloads of prefabricated material have arrived for the 13 main buildings of the camp and a crew of 30 Brownwood men is being employed in their erection. The city will extend water and sewer mains 400 feet to the camp. ### Ancient Graveyard Gets Tombstones

AMARILLO. (P).-After 55 years, Potter county's first graveyard which started in 1880, has its first tomb-

started in 1880, has its first tombstones.

John Arnot of Amarillo, who has
been a resident of the Texas Panhandle for 52 years, placed a homemade concrete marker at the head
of each of the six graves.

Five of the graves contain the
bones of Arnot's early-day friends
and neighbors or their children.

The graveyard is half a mile north
of the Canadian river in the lonely
sand hills of the old JY ranch. The
first person buried there was B.
McQuarry, a cowboy who was fatally injured while roping a calf in
1880. His death was prior to the
time that Arnot came to this section.

time that Arnot came to this section.

Mrs. Lizzie Farris Wyness, an English woman who had been in this country 15 months, was buried there in 1887. Interred nearby was her baby. The woman's husband was a bookkeeper on the LiX ranch. His second wife sent the money for the marking of her grave. Arnot constructed all of the others at his own expense.

Others buried in the small plot were the infant child of Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Mott, caretakers at the LX headquarters; Jim Bell, who was kicked to death by a horse at an isolated ranch camp in 1900, and Jim Bailey, who died in 1901 of pneumonia contracted while crossing the Canadian river during a winter storm.

Arnot helped dig each of the last five graves and was present at the burial services.
