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POPULAR VOTE OPPOSES STATESMEN'S WARS

Once in a blue moon, someone takes the unprecedented step of trying to find out what the ordinary man in the street thinks about his country's foreign policy.

When this is done the results are apt to be surprising.

Some 40 organizations recently undertook a great poll of British citizens to see what sentiment might be in regard to the League of Nations, disarmament, and similar issues.

All in all, they collected more than 11,000,000 votes, slightly less than 40 per cent of the entire British electorate. If the 11,000,000 people who voted represent a fair cross-section of British opinion-and there is good reason to suppose that they do-here is what the average Briton wants done:

He is overwhelmingly in favor of British adherence

to the League of Nations. He is almost equally overwhelmingly in favor of arms

reduction. He favors international agreement to abolish military and naval aircraft and to prohibit the manufacture and

sale of weapons for private profit. He favors the use of economic sanctions, such as the boycott, against aggressor nations which make war in violation of such agreements as the Kellogg treaty. By a lesser majority, he even favors the use of military measures against such nations.

Add all of this together and you discover that the war-weary Briton not only wants peace, but is willing to take some risks and do some unorthodox things in order to get it. That isn't surprising. He lived through four and one-half years of war that almost wrecked his nation; he isn't keen to get another dose of the same.

Statesmen are fond of saying that wars come as a result of irresistible popular clamor; that the various treaties, agreements and leagues to preserve peace are all right in theory but do not command the popular support which they must have in order to succeed; and that a statesman who proposed outright disarmament, or tried to put real teeth in such a thing as the Kellogg treaty, would immediately be disowned by his own voters.

This British poll would seem to give the lie to those claims. It shows that the people of at least one great nation—a nation which lives under the shadow of war, has enemies at its very frontiers and can look back on a long and proud tradition of military success—are ready, even eager, to go to almost any length to keep another war from overwhelming the world.

Yet the long shot does have a way of galloping home, occasionally, and if the views of an anonymous military expert writing in the London Spectator recently are correct, Italy stands a very broad chance of coming an in-glorious cropper in the fighting in Africa.

This writer makes the point that Abyssinia is apt to be an easy place to get into, but a hard one to get out of. The Italian army, he says, ought to be able to drive its way into Addis Ababa, Abyssinian capital, without trouble; once there, however, its troubles would begin.

All the Abyssinians need to do, he continues, is to retreat. To catch and defeat them the Italians would have to cross a rugged mountainous country larger than Morocco-and it took most of France's great colonial army many years to make the Moroccans knuckle under.

Meanwhile, Italian communications would be in danger, and the upshot of it all might well be the starvation and slow disintegration of the entire Italian expeditionary

All this is interesting chiefly as a reminder that wars are seldom fought according to the textbooks. On paper, a modernized and well-disciplined army like that of Mussolini's should have no trouble at all with a horde of semisavage levies such as Haile Selassie can muster. In actual fact, such encounters often turn out differently.

Augustus Caesar of Rome discovered this 1900 years ago, when Varus got the flower of the Roman army entangled in the Teutoberger forest in Germany, where the barbaric tribesmen annihilated it. Cortez nearly met the same fate in his first drive at the Aztec empire.

The British regulars were no match for the Pennsylvania Indians when Braddock was trapped near Fort Duquesne. The crack cavalry regiment of the U.S. army was overwhelmed when the plains Indians got it in a blind alley at the Little Big Horn.

You could cull a column or so of similar instances from the military histories, but the examples that have been given so far are enough to make the point-which is that making war on a horde of poorly equipped barbarians is a much riskier business than it appears on the







Discontinuance of **Bureau Is Protested**

COLLEGE STATION. (P).—Regret has been voiced by various officials of Texas A. & M. College over the discontinuance of the Federal transient bureau division located at the college during the past year. The establishment of the division here, the only collective transient unit at an educational institution in the country, was for the purpose of permitting some of the most capable men in the transient group to continue their education while the government fed, clothed and housed them.

President T. O. Walton of the college, in reviewing the operation of the division, said the academic records of the men were generally good and in some cases unusually so. Dean F. C. Bolton expressed the

belief that the men had benefitted materially through the experiment. "Not all the men sent here responded to the treatment," said Prof. Daniel Russell, head of the department of rural sociology, who played a large part in inaugurating the plan. "They had been on the road too long to settle down to the quiet life," he continued.
"However a majority responded






