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U. S. RULE NOT SO BAD, AS AGAINST FRANCE'S

When you let your gaze wander in the general direction of France, you are apt to conclude that there is a great deal to be said in favor of the somewhat stiff and cumbersome type of government which the United States enjoys.

The commonest criticism of the American form of government is that it is slow to respond to shifts in popular feeling. An administration has a four-year term of office, and there is no way on earth for the people to shorten that term no matter how greatly they may disagree with the administration's policies.

In France the situation is just the reverse. The government there is almost like a weather-vane, compelled to veer about in obedience to the slightest change in public opinion on penalty of being blown down if it fails to do so.

Since the formation of the Clemenceau cabinet in 1917, France has had upwards of 30 governments. A few have lasted as long as two years at a stretch; others have lasted only a few days. The recent government of Premier Fernand Bouisson endured exactly three days and 20 hours; Herriot once headed one which fell in 48 hours.

All of this indicates a degree of flexibility even more pernicious than the stiffness of the American system.

You can best understand how it works by remembering that the French premier must resign whenever he is defeated on an important vote in the Chamber of Deputies. That would be equivalent, over here, to having a president resign instead of using his veto.

When you recall that every recent president has used the veto a number of times, you can see what an extreme lack of stability the French system creates.

Installed in the United States, it would put every president completely at the mercy of Congress. He could not fight Congress, for if Congress voted him down he would go out of office. He could hardly even lead. His chief function would be to follow; and when you consider the extreme diversity of opinions reflected in any large legislative body, you can see that in many cases even this would be impossible.

The peculiarities of parliamentary government in France are not, perhaps, of very great importance in the United States. But the inflexibility of the American form of government frequently comes under attack; and when it does, it is comforting to reflect that too much flexibility can be worse than not enough.

ANNUAL SUMMER WARNING

This being the season of the year when bathing beaches and the old-fashioned swimming hole are doing an overtime business, a repetition of those annual words of caution to bathers might not come amiss.

The cautionary words are few and simple. Don't go into the water for at least an hour after eating; don't go out beyond your depth unless you are an expert swimmer; don't dive into any pool without first ascertaining the depth; don't swim when overheated or overtired; always find out in advance if there are any treacherous currents or undertows in the water where you plan to bathe.

All of these little rules can be summed up more simply in the admonition: use common sense.

Every summer week-end brings its reports of drownings at bathing beaches. Nearly all of these tragedies could be avoided if bathers used proper care. One of the finest of summer sports, swimming need not be dangerous if the swimmer exercises reasonable forethought.

Fishermen Promise 3,000 Pound Rayfish

PORT ISABEL, Texas, (AP)—As a "stunt" during the 1935 Rio Grande Valley Fishing rodeo here August 22, 23, and 24, local fishermen have promised to bring in a 3,000-pound rayfish.

Elaborate preparations are being made for the capture. In order to "try their hand" a group of fishermen headed by Dr. A. Hockaday of Port Isabel, rodeo chairman, went out recently and brought in a ray which missed the 3,000-pound mark by less than 100 pounds.

The first ray that was encountered started off at too fast a clip and tore out the harpoon. The second was brought in after a three-hour battle during which four bullets from a high-power rifle were fired into it.

There will be 29 prizes awarded and letters received indicate a record number of fishermen will be on hand. In addition to the ablest of Texas fishermen competitors are expected from many other states, including Dr. I. Henry Smith and David Lide of Shreveport, the two leading point winners in last year's rodeo.

One of the features will be the higher point-rating for fish caught on light tackle, which is expected to encourage use of that type of angling tools.

Fishing will be permitted in waters anywhere in this section, including the open Gulf, the pass at Brazos-

Santiago, the mouth of the Rio Grande, or the Laguna-Madre bay. Points are offered for all kinds of fish down to the lowly catfish but the tarpon and sailfin head the list. Tarpon are expected to account for the major prizes as last year when 23 of the big fellows were caught in the first Port Isabel rodeo.

500 Will Teach FERA Course at Tex. Tech.

LUBBOCK—Five hundred teachers will be assigned to the Adult Education Teacher Training course for Federal Emergency Relief Administration teachers of adults to be given at Texas Technological college August 2 through August 30. The Texas Tech school is one of four to be conducted in Texas, the others being held at North Texas State Teachers college, the University of Texas, and the negro school at Prairie View State Normal.

Dr. A. W. Evans will be relieved of his duties as head of the department of education for the second term of summer school to be director of this special course. Dr. R. E. Garlin will be acting head of the education school during the second term. George H. Ferry, director of adult education program of the state department in cooperation with the Texas Relief commission, is in charge of the program at all four schools in Texas.

A staff of fifteen teachers, experienced in adult education, will conduct this school. Members of the Texas Technological college faculty who have had experience in training for adult education will aid

in this school. This is strictly a service school conducted at the request of the government to increase the effectiveness of adult classes for persons on relief, and will not carry college credit, officials state.

Courses of study will include Special Methods of Teaching Adults, Psychology of Adults, Theory and Practical Problems of Adult Education, Organization and Management of Adult Classes, Analysis of Subject Matter, Organization of Courses of Study and Instructional Material.

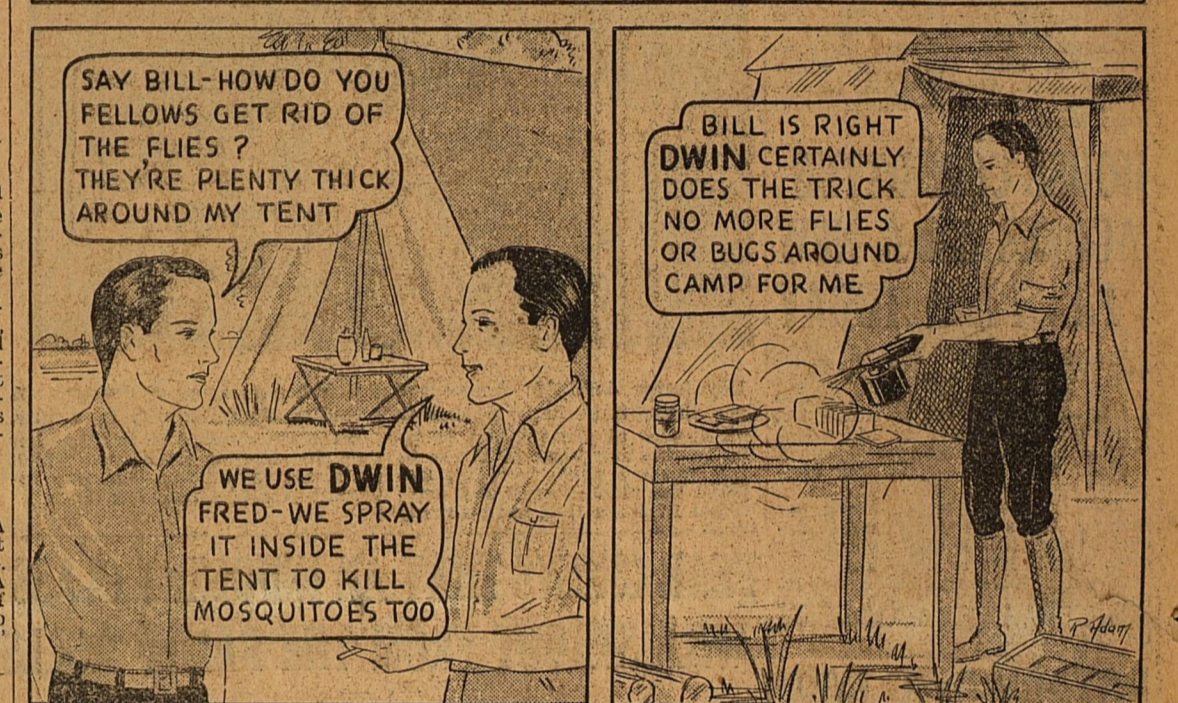

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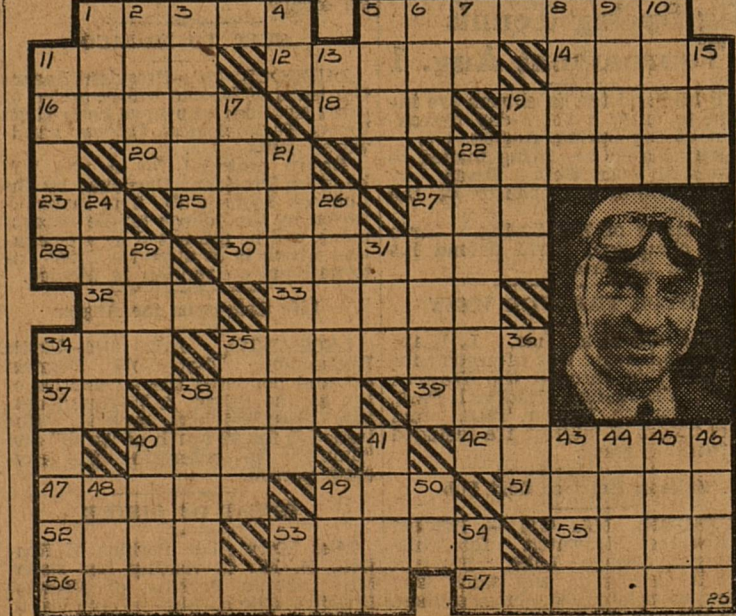

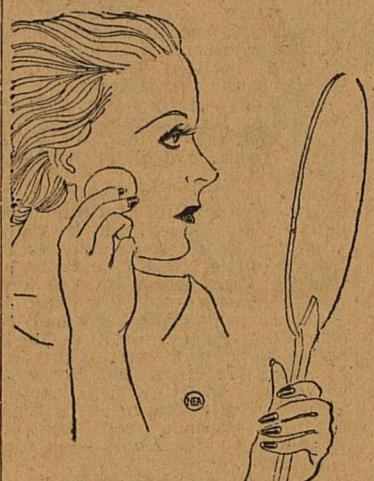

### Serve With Crisp Wafers

Crisp wafers are a good accompaniment for jellied soup. And radishes and celery can be served with anything but a mixed vegetable soup.

Canned soups, bouillon cubes or freshly made stock are suitable for jellied soups. Instead of long cooking and fussing over meat bones trying to extract the gelatin to make the soup thicken, use gelatin with canned soup or bouillon cubes. Extra salt and pepper are needed for jellied bouillon.

In making a fruit cocktail, be sure to cut fruit neatly in small pieces. Crushed or broken fruit is much less inviting. Do not cover melon with crushed ice. This dulls the flavor and is not effectual for chilling.

The flavor of tomato and fruit juice cocktail is so elusive that everyone who drinks it has a first time wonders what the mixture is.

Putting on foundation lotion or cream is the next step and a very important one, too. You ought to choose a shade that matches the tone of your skin, and you must see that it is smoothly blended and quite dry before you start with cream rouge.

If you have difficulty with cream rouge, brush your forefinger across a bit of cleansing cream before you dip it into the rouge jar. Then, beginning on the cheek bone, about one-half inch outward from your nose, run your finger along the bone, stopping about an inch in front of the ear.

Go back to the starting point and make a line downward, thereby forming a baseless triangle. Fill in the triangle with fingertip, smoothing down rough edges on the two lines and making the rouge look like natural color. Repeat the same steps on the other cheek.

**Powder Correctly**

You are now ready for powder. Dip a large piece of clean cotton into your face powder and press it firmly against the skin on forehead, face and throat. Powder lavishly and don't try to obtain a smooth surface immediately. Simply leave it blotchy until you have put on lipstick. Then smooth down with the reverse side of the cotton pad or a soft baby brush.

Lipstick should be applied from corner to corner of lips that have been wiped quite dry. Let it set for at least two minutes, and wipe off the excess with cleansing tissue. Don't moisten your lips until the color has had a chance to set and has been wiped dry. This way, lipstick will stay on for hours.

Mascara, if you insist on using it in the daytime, goes on last. Comb your hair and touching your ears and wrists with light, daytime perfume are the final steps.

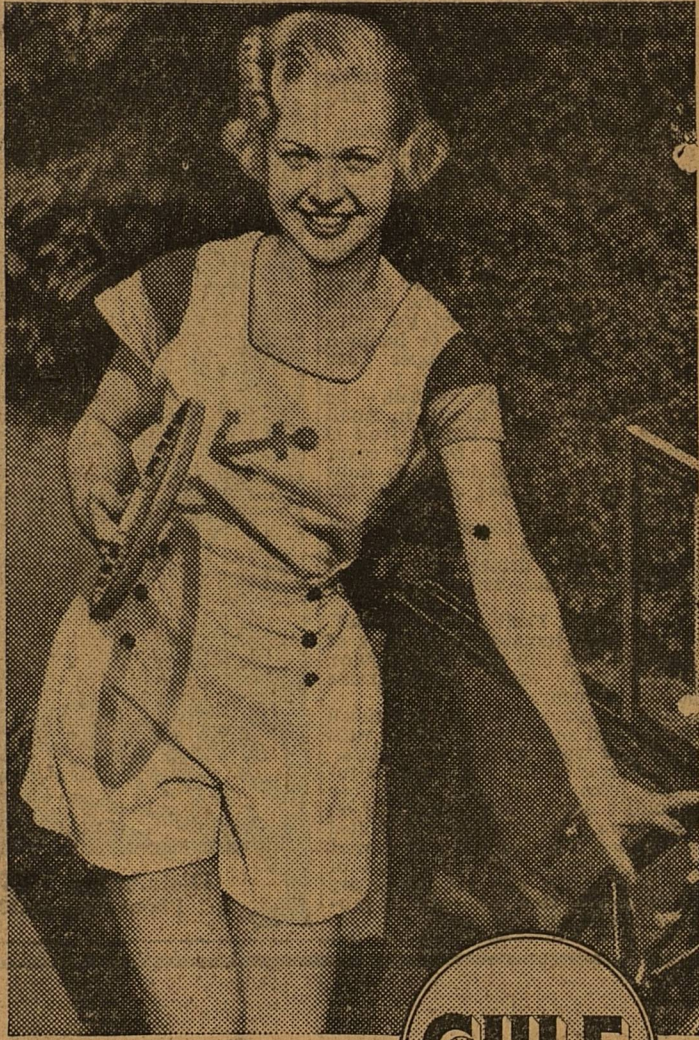

## LEARN TO SWIM IN A WEEK . . . No. 6

Arms and Legs Combine Perfectly to Give Swimmer Six-Beat Crawl

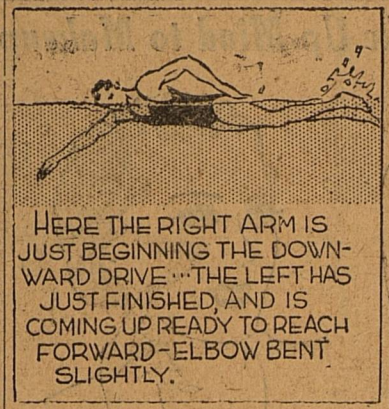

A combination of the flutter kick and correct arm movements gives the novice swimmer the completed stroke.

In combining the two, do a dead man's float and start the flutter kick. Try this several times, and when it is working rhythmically, start the arm movement.

Count 1-2-3 on the down stroke of your left arm, and 4-5-6 as the right arm goes through its cycle. The legs should kick on each count.

This gives you what is known as the six-beat crawl, or six thrashes of the legs to each complete cycle of the arms.

Arm should be taken in as the left arm goes through the cycle and the right begins, and vice versa as the right completes and the left begins.



HERE THE RIGHT ARM IS JUST BEGINNING THE DOWNWARD DRIVE—THE LEFT HAS JUST FINISHED, AND IS COMING UP READY TO REACH FORWARD—ELBOW BENT SLIGHTLY.

NEXT: The completed stroke and plain entry dive.

Guards, tackles, and ends will be seen passing the ball around like backs, and scoring touchdowns. Football will look more like rugby than ever.

A letter from George S. Halas to members of the Chicago Bears is typical of those being received by football men, collegiate and professional alike, these tepid days. Halas is Mr. Chicago Bear himself. The old Illinois end is president and treasurer of the outfit and one of the most progressive coaches in the business.

"You are to report in Chicago for football on Aug. 11, for on Aug. 29 we play the College All-Stars at Soldier Field," writes Halas. "It is up to you to arrive in good condition. My advice is that you start at once and gradually get in shape. Get plenty of sleep. Eat only plain, wholesome food if you are over-weight, ease up on your eating. Cut out potatoes, sweets, and pastries, and limit yourself to one glass of water at meals. Use a little judgment in regard to smoking.

"Spend at least 20 minutes a day doing bending and stretching exercises, along with full squatting and stationary running. Practice starts, short sprints, and jogging so that you will be sure to show up with your legs in good condition."

The Bears will train at Delafield, Wis., in preparation for the battle with the College All-Stars. That out of the way they will settle down to sharpen up for another bruising season of professional warfare, which is no pink tea.

Barney Ross and Jimmy McLarnin cannot go on fighting each other forever, but the Pacific Northwest has a welter whom it suspects can beat either of them and a middleweight expected to restore the breath of life to that division.

The welter is Gordon Wallace, of Vancouver, which is McLarnin's old home town.

The middleweight is Freddie Steele, of Tacoma, just across Puget Sound.

Efforts are now being made to bring Ross, Harry Dubinsky, Frankie Klick, and Celerino Garcia, the Filipino, to Vancouver for engagements with Wallace, the most magnetic attraction in the history of the British Columbia city. Wallace is eager to go anywhere for a crack at one of the better boys.

Steele gets his big opportunity in Seattle on July 30, when Vince Dundee collects a substantial guarantee for stepping in rounds with him. Since dropping the 160-pound leadership to Teddy Yarosz in Pittsburgh last September, Dundee has repelled Paul Pirrone and Babe Risko.

Steele first appeared as a 95-pound amateur when only 11 years old. He now stands 5 feet 11 inches and comes in at about 156 pounds. Since turning professional in 1930, Steele, now a handsome chap 27, has dropped only two four-round decisions in 72 starts, and reversed them in subsequent engagements.

**Highly Regarded at Home**  
While 147-pound champion, McLarnin was offered \$25,000 to meet Steele in a non-titular skirmish in Seattle, and could have had \$15,000 after losing his crown to Ross. Young Corbett III was offered \$5,000, and an attractive inducement was extended Risko. The east hasn't beckoned Steele, and Dundee is the first real topnotcher to be coaxed in the Pacific Northwest.

Steele has knocked out Celerino Garcia twice, Frankie Petrolle, Eddie Murdock, Bucky Lawless, Joe Gilek, Andy DiVodi, and Baby Joe Gans. He has won decisions from Billy Townsend, Glick, Eddie Ram DiVodi, and Tommy Rios, and boxed Gorilla Jones 10 rounds on even terms.

"You can't hurt him if you hit him, and you can't hit him," says Gans. "An' if he hits you he knocks you daid, and he can't miss you."

More than 90 per cent of Steele's opponents have been on the canvas including the tough Rios, who insists that he never was down before.

You have Elliott Metcalf's word for it that Steele is a spectacular knockerout and as colorful as a painter's overalls. Metcalf, veteran sports editor of the Tacoma Times, has seen gloved workmen come and go for more than 20 years and isn't inclined to rave.

"If you considered McLarnin a puncher—wait!" asserts Metcalf. "And Steele's got it in either hand and lands it from any position. I've looked at a long line of beak busters, but Steele is the dream fighter of them all. Another year will give him more polish, no doubt, but as he stands today he's even money against the best middleweights. You'll have to see this boy in action to appreciate him."

**Northwest Turns Out Good Ones**  
Steele survived three severe spells of sickness and a broken jaw to get where he is. One Leonard Bennett broke his jaw with his first punch in a six-rounder two years ago, but never recovered from the beating dealt him by the uncomplaining Steele, who has since proved that the injury did not permanent damage.

In Vancouver since last October, Wallace has knocked out and outscored Billy Townsend and repelled Bobby Facho, Tommy Bland, Ronnie Headley, and the veteran Tod Morgan, among others.

## Flubdubs

BY JESS RODGERS

Folks, he's in town today, but it's dollars to doughnuts that he'll be casting his flies on some lake before the sun goes down. Of course we mean Jack Lamb, premier bass catcher and sportsman deluxe, who fishes anywhere and everywhere. Lamb is perhaps known by more people than any fisherman of the present day. He has fished all over the nation for the past twenty five years, and his articles on fishing have been syndicated throughout the world.

Lamb makes his living in the offices of the Gulf Refining Company at Fort Worth, but he readily admits that he works only to buy fishing tackle. Here is one guy who lives to fish. When he gets on a pretty stream and the bass are snapping up his lures, it would take an earthquake to stop him. He becomes so imbued with fishing that he often forgets to eat for a day or more. One time he fished 52 hours on the Gunnison River in Colorado without food, and only paused for a few hours sleep along the banks.

Jack can catch fish. He is one of the nation's foremost casters and has skill to burn. He does not accept fishing as a matter of fact but seeks a reason for everything. Thousands of bass and other game fish have succumbed to his deft lures. He knows where, when and how fish strike. A glance at water will tell him if it is the habitat of bass.

According to Lamb very few fishermen have enough faith in artificial bait. Like every other line of endeavor, the angler must believe in the method he is pursuing. He has experimented with 3,200 flies and half that many plugs, and has eliminated them down to a mere dozen. Experiments were conducted for years with color combinations, and all of them were likewise eliminated down to a very few. Jack says combinations of red and white are best for spring, black and white for summer, yellow and black for fall, and solid white in the winter. He only fishes with the fly when the temperature is 80 degrees and above, and uses the casting rod when it is below. All lures are fished on the surface when the weather is hot, whether fly or casting lures. The lures are allowed to sink one foot deep for every ten-degree drop from the basic point of 80.

All flies are fished as dry flies, and oiled frequently. The fly line is also oiled every half hour to keep it afloat. Lamb will not fish with any lure having more than one hook.

explains Jack Allen. "The latter is a relief after having to lug Townsend back to the corner so often." Allen also managed Townsend.

and even then he turns back all the fish he catches. He says that some of the game-hog element is still left in men who fish with stiff, three-foot rods, 35 pound test lines and 15-hook plugs. Lamb fishes for sport and not for the game, and thinks that the game bass should not be wasted in the skillet by meat-hunters when there are thousands of sportsmen in America who would crawl on their hands and knees for fifty miles to snare a ten-pound bass.

Lamb is one of the oldest amateur sportsmen in America. He is offered thousands of dollars each year for recommendation of various articles, but he does not take their money. He prefers to remain free and unobligated so that he can tell fishermen the truth about tackle. Lamb has spent a great

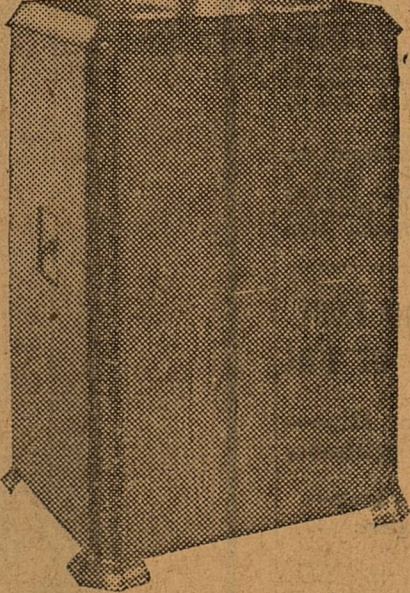
deal of time and money in aiding beginning anglers. He gave more than 550 public exhibitions of bait and fly casting at his own expense during the past 17 years to teach embryo fishermen how to catch 'em. His book "How to Catch 'O' John Bass" was written for, and dedicated to the men and boys who have been unsuccessful with artificial bait. If you are an amateur, and want to learn the correct way to fish with fly or casting rod, don't fail to see him on the courthouse lawn Friday afternoon at 6 p. m. ### Texas Farmers Get \$150,000 Per Day

WASHINGTON, (P) — Texas farmers plucked more than \$150,000 daily from the United States treasury in crop benefit payments during the last fiscal year. The farm administration announced today rental and benefit and trust fund payments to Texas from July 1, 1934, to May 31, 1935, totaled \$51,761,763.99—second only to Iowa which benefited more from the corn-hog program than any other state in the nation. The tabulation of the AAA showed the lone star state had received these rental and benefit payments: cotton, \$34,755,253.70; wheat, \$5,330,891.70; corn-hogs, \$4,663,285.97. In addition, the state received \$7,012,337.82 for Bankhead cotton pool operations resulting from distribution to producers who pooled their surplus cotton tax-exemption certificates. Following Iowa with \$66,555,455.24 and Texas, other leading states

were: Illinois, \$40,735,241.78, mostly corn-hogs; Kansas, \$6,655,906.18, more than half wheat; Nebraska, \$36,395,560.62, mostly corn-hogs. The five leading Texas counties were shown as follows: Nueces, \$1,027,336.43; Ellis, \$709,022.78; Navarro \$707,371.02; Williamson, \$667,111.72; and Collin, \$640,630.68. Midland county has received \$81,620.97 on benefits from cotton, wheat, corn and hogs divided as follows: cotton, \$78,494, wheat, none and corn-hogs, \$3,130.33.

MCCLELLANDTOWN, Pa., (W.P) — It took three years to build the new Free Methodist Church here but it cost only \$11. The church was constructed by persons donating their services free, using equipment and material furnished by industrial concerns.

eral Andre Figueroa revealed agrarians in Tamaulipas had taken the cities of Llera and Puzemec and forced resignation of city officials...

City Calm Matamoros was calm last night for the first time in two days, and there was an air of relief. Saloons, stores, closed, were open. Civilians who had armed themselves to aid city government officials were disarmed...

Governor Villarreal in a copyrighted story published by the Brownsville, Texas Herald, said, however, that he had no intention of quitting and followed his vigorous denial with a statement that President Lazaro Cardenas had telegraphed him support of his position.

"Emilio Portes Gil (former president of Mexico) is behind the trouble," declared Villarreal. "The legislative authorities of the state are supporting me. There are seven state deputies, and they are all my supporters. Likewise, the judicial forces of the state are supporting my government."

"President Cardenas told me that any complaints the peasants have should be made through legal channels. He has sent the minister of the interior, Silvano Barba Gonzales, here to receive these complaints."

Wants No Bloodshed "I will go to Tampico, where I will confer with Gonzales, and I believe that he will be able to work

out the troubles. I take the fact that the federal government demands that grievances be made through legal channels as indication of support for me against a forcible ouster. He commented that "the situation is more unjustified alarm than anything else."

"I am particularly anxious to avoid bloodshed," he said. They resent trouble, the Herald said, had its inception in a political feud between Portes Gil and Villarreal. The federal government sent soldiers to Villarreal's inauguration two years ago at Ciudad Victoria, the Herald said, and the situation at that time was intense.

Portes Gil came to the border, Villarreal's stronghold, to campaign against Villarreal's election and was greeted with abuse. Friction arose between the state and federal government, and speakers at Villarreal's election charged the federal government with meddling in state affairs.

The agrarians have stood by President Cardenas and Portes Gil during hard times of the last few months, the Herald said, and readily answered the call for action in the present uprising. They are seeking the scalp of Governor Villarreal and other ranking officials, the Herald said.

Villarreal belittled reports of organized opposition, however, and said his foes (the agrarians) numbered but 1,200 and "not the 12,000 to 20,000 that has been reported."

Director of Forest Service Appointed

WASHINGTON, July 25.—Appointment of Arthur T. Upson as Director of the Southwestern Forest and Range Experiment Station, with headquarters at Tucson, Arizona, was announced today by the Forest Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture. Upson will succeed G. A. Pearson, who at his own request is being relieved of administrative duties to devote full time to research.

Upson is returning to government employ after 11 years in trade extension and research with the National Lumber Manufacturers' Association. Graduating in forestry in 1910 from the University of Nebraska, he entered the Forest Service as a Forest Assistant on the Arapaho National Forest, where he subsequently served as Examiner. Urgent problems include the determination of the influence of vegetation cover on erosion and runoff, and the development of methods of managing forest and range lands so as to reduce floods and silting, check erosion, and regulate waterflow.
