

PIONEERING NEVER WAS A HOLIDAY AFFAIR

Glancing in the direction of Alaska's Matanuska Valley, one is compelled to wonder just what has happened to the old-time pioneering spirit in this country.

The Matanuska Valley harbors several hundred homesteaders who were moved from farms in Michigan, Wisconsin and Minnesota and sent to the northland to carve new homes out of the wilderness.

They were victims of the depression. There was no hope for them if they stayed at home. Unable to support themselves where they were, they had to move or sink into pauperism. The Alaskan venture, subsidized by the government, offered them a chance to make a new start.

When they set out for Alaska we heard a great deal about the new pioneers, about the revival of the old days, and about the rediscovery of the frontier in the twentieth century. Everybody sat back and wished the colonists lots of luck.

But lately the welkin has been ringing with all manner of complaints. These range all the way from protests over a shortage of farm equipment to moans about the excessive number of mosquitoes in Alaska's fair val-

Cabins that were to have been built to house the colonists are far behind schedule. The colonists are still living in tents, and are not enjoying it. Sanitation is imperfect, roads are practically non-existable, tools have not been delivered and political bureaucracy does not seem to be functioning very well.

Now these charges, having been aired on the floor of the Senate, deserve and should get a complete, impartial investigation. And yet, when all allowance is made, one does have to wonder-what has happened to that oldtime pioneer spirit?

These colonists were right back of the eight-ball, before the Alaskan venture started. They were broke and had no chance of remedying their condition. They were given a chance to better themselves by indulging in a little pioneering—and pioneers never did have it soft.

All of America was developed by people who lived in imperfect houses, lacked proper tools, suffered plagues of mosquitoes, toiled over boggy roads and in general had to put up with a whole lot of annoyances and inconveni-

It seems likely that a small minority is doing most of the complaining. Most of the settlers, one suspects, are plugging away and saying nothing. The majority, probably, realize full well that the pioneer never did have a pienic.

NEW DEPARTMENT PROPOSED

A new federal department to handle all conservation matters is proposed by the American Nature Association. This is a counter-proposal to Interior Secretary Ickes' suggestion that the Interior Department be changed into a Department of Conservation and Public Works.

Arthur Newton Pack, spokesman for the Nature As sociation, points out that there is no necessary connection between such public works as bridges and highways and the conservation of natural resources. 

"Increased use of sanatorium and hospital facilities in Texas for treating tuberculosis would be one of the greatest steps in further reducing the mortality from this dangerous disease."

This statement was made by Dr. John B. Thomas, Medical Advisor on the Midland county Public Health Board in referring to the campaign of the organization being carried on under the slogan, "Flight Tuberculosis With Modern Weapons."

"This is a reasonbale prospect for two important reasons," continued Dr. Thomas. "The sanatorium cap arrest, or cure, the disease through the never methods in contrast with the hopelessness or failure of former years. An even more important service is rendered toward controlling tuberculosis by breaking the contact between the patient and his relatives and friends. The disease is communicable and every case comes from another. It is spread usually by coughing or sneezing without properly covering the mouth and nose and by careless spitting."

Dr. Thomas declared that quarantine might be effective in controlling tuberculosis if it were an acute disease like smallpox or scarlet fever, but explained that this is not possible "because we cannot imprison human beings who carry about the germs of the dangerous disease."

Across the vast dust-piled plains, stretching without relief to the far horizon, the trail herd wends its way, in perhaps the last of the great migrations that annually led hundreds of thousands of cattle to market and to new grazing grounds, in the halcyon days of the southwest cow country. With drooping heads, the 2000 cows and yearlings move, as if sensing that their hooves are printing the last chapter of the plains saga in the dust that swirls as they pass. From 27 miles north of Pampa, Tex., on the Grundy Morrison ranch, cowhoys drove the stock across the Texas Panhandle to the foothills of the Rockies, 225 miles away in northeastern New Mexico. 

Arm movement in the crawl stroke is executed in the manner of a windmill. Standing in water about chest

Standing in water about chest high, raise your right arm over your head, palm forward, leaving the left at your side, palm backward. Bend forward until your chest is in the water, keeping your head up.

Lower the right arm forward and downward and then raise the left backward and upward. Continue this for a few minutes, and you will note that you are making a large circular movement, imitating a windmill.

This should be practiced about an hour, with perfect rhythem maintained.

Be sure that when the arm out of the water goes into the stroke, you roll, your shoulder slightly under.

Spanish Missions
AUSTIN, July 23, (P).—Large Murals of several old Spanish missions at San Antonio are being painted ab St. Edward's university by John Bedhar, C. S. C. When completed they will hang in the main corridor of the Administration building at St. Edward's.
The missions to be portrayed are San Francisco de Espada, Mission San Jose de Aguayo, Mission de la Concepcion Purisima and the Alamo. The panels will all be six and a half feet high but of different widths. Three of them will be approximately 12 feet long, and the San Jose canvas, which will show the mission from a side view, will cover an expanse of 21 feet.
The buildings all date from about 1720 to 1730, or about 50 years before the American Revolution. The artist was especially delighted with the entrance and the baptismal window of the San Jose mission, which he said contained some of the most beautiful carving he had seen.
The painting of the murals is a project that has for some time been contemplated by the Rev. Joseph Maguire, C. S. C., president of the St. Edward's. 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




