EAGLE PASS, (P)—An irrigated farm belt surrounding Piedras Negras, across the Rio Grande from this city, seems assured after farmers of the area met with Mayor Juan Garcia of Piedras Negras recently and organized an irrigation district.

The meeting, attended by prominent land owners along the Escondido and San Rodrigo rivers, discussed the construction of two dams and a series of ditches from the impounded waters of the two streams. The San Rodrigo empties into the Rio Grande north of Piedras Negras and the Escondido south of the city.

Mayor Garcia was chosen president of the district. Hardly had the ink dried on the charter before the agricultural delegation laid down cash for its share of the stock. The balance of the cost of construction will be furnished by municipal shareholders at a forthcoming meeting. Aid for the project is expected from the federal government as the sites of the two dams recently were surveyed by government engineers upon orders of President Lazaro Cardenas.

### HUEHN AGAIN ON FORD SUN. HOUR

Julius Huehn, the brilliant young bass-baritone who made his operatic debut with the Metropolitan last season and his radio debut in the Ford Sunday Evening Hour broadcast of June 23, will return to the Ford Sunday Evening Hour as guest soloist on October 13. The program, which presents also the music of the Ford Symphony Orchestra and Chorus, under Victor Kolar, is heard from 9 to 10 o'clock, Eastern Standard Time, over the complete coast-to-coast network of the Columbia Broadcasting System.

Huehn, a German-American descent, is American-born and American-trained. He was born in Massachusetts, but his family moved to Pittsburgh when he was still a child. His early ambition was to study engineering, and his musical career was embarked upon almost by accident.

While a student at Carnegie Tech, several students organized a small dance orchestra, in which Huehn played saxophone and was vocal soloist. A Pittsburgh music critic happened to hear him, was impressed by his untrained voice, and persuaded him to study voice. He won a scholarship with the Juillard Graduate School and developed so

rapidly that contracts with the New York Oratorio Society, the Worcester Music Festival, and the Chautauqua Opera Company followed in rapid succession.

These led to engagements as guest soloist with the Philadelphia Orchestra Opera, and the Chicago Grand Opera and finally to his debut with the Metropolitan and to his nation-wide radio debut in the Ford Sunday Evening Hour, June 23. His successes in every engagement stamp him as one of the truly great "discoveries" of recent years in both the operatic and concert fields.

### Ex-Checker Champ To Appear in Texas

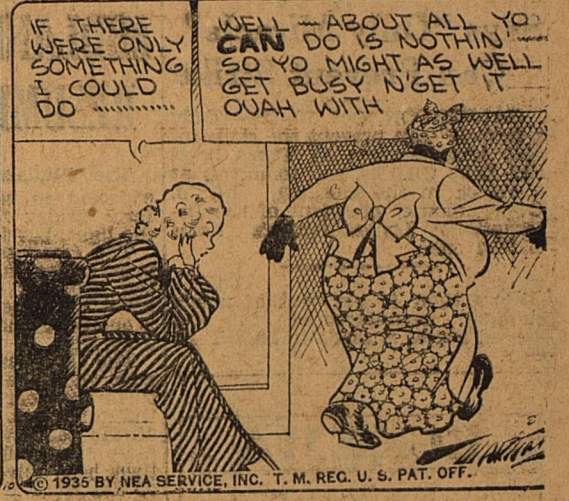
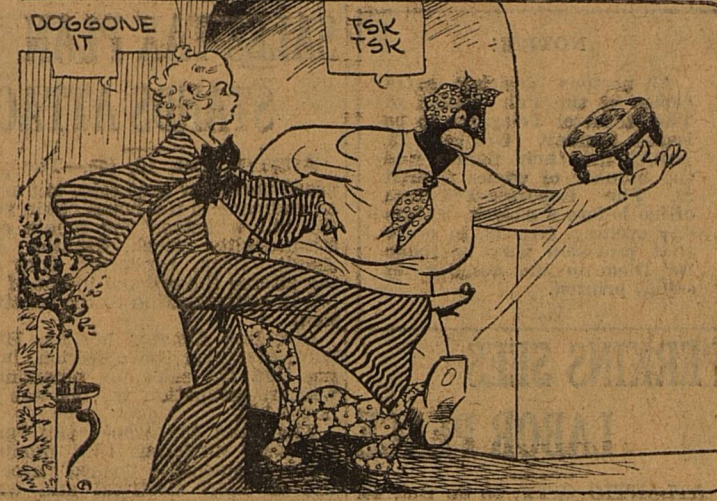

Prizes will be awarded to the six leading players.

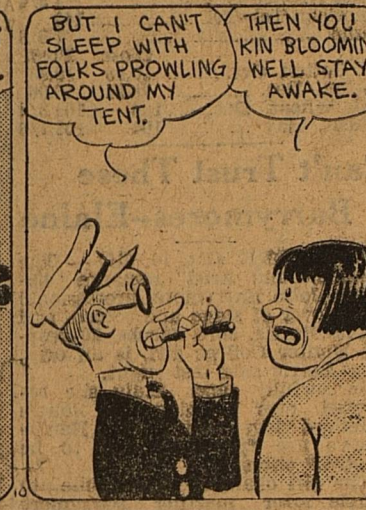

MIDLAND BULLDOGS ARE EXPECTED TO RESUME WINNING WAYS AGAINST OWLS

The Midland Bulldogs will be expected to resume their winning form Friday night when they get the light, but fast, Big Lake Owls.

The Owls' record of accomplishment so far this season is good, but the lightness of their team, combined with their lack of experience is enough to make the Midland team a favorite.

The Owls can boast of only three men who have lettered and none of them have earned their letter more than one time. Only three members of the team will tip the scales at more than 150 pounds and two of these boys only weigh 152. The giant of the team is Parks, a non-letterman tackle who weighs 170.

After a week of hard work the Bulldogs should be in perfect shape for the game with the exception of Collins, midget fullback, who is out with a bad charley-horse. It is doubtful whether he will be able to get into the line-up at all during the game.

The coach is hopeful that his first team can build up enough of a lead early in the game that he can use some of his substitutes but he is not expecting to win by an overly large score.

The Owls lost last week to the Crane team by a 12-0 score but in

doing so showed a fast set of backfield men and a pass attack that is apt to click at any time. With the realization that pass defense is one phase of the game that his team is particularly weak at, Baumgarten has stressed that in his workouts this week.

The Big Lake coaches scouted the Midland game at Pecos last week and there is no doubt that they will resort to the air more than any other way in an effort to win. With a team as light as theirs it is there is small probability of them being able to pierce the Midland line. The heaviest man that they can place on the field will average only 145.

CONNALLY SEES F. D. R. VICTORY

EL PASO, Oct. 10.—President Roosevelt has lost some support but he and his administration will be re-elected, re-elected, re-elected, Senator Tom Connally of Texas predicted here today.

"There is no reason why the masses of people," said Senator Connally.

"The Republicans probably will have difficulty in agreeing on a candidate."

The Texas Senator praised the President for his efforts to keep America out of war.

"There is no reason why the United States should get into the Italian-Ethiopian conflict," he said.

Senator Connally conferred today with U. S. Rep. E. Thomason on plans to obtain a \$1,500,000 replacement fund for the International Boundary Commission.

Senator Connally has been active in working for projects in this area, including Ft. Bliss appropriations and the Marfa re-garrisoning.

The Senator praised Rep. Thomason as an able and efficient representative in Congress.

Mr. Thomason's influential position on the House Military Affairs Committee should be of great weight in getting further Ft. Bliss appropriations, he said.

Mr. Connally said that every index shows a rapid improvement in business conditions everywhere in the country.

"Texas is a particular bright spot," he added.

Mr. Connally and his son, Attorney Ben Connally, Houston, will leave El Paso tomorrow for Seattle, from where they will sail Oct. 16 for the Philippine Islands to attend the inauguration of the new president.

Mr. Thomason will also make the trip.

New Deal Spending Reaches High Mark

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10. (AP)—The Federal Government reported new high peace time spending Wednesday in figures showing expenditures in excess of \$2,000,000,000 in the first 99 days of the current fiscal year.

In the period from July 1, to Oct. 7, a total of \$2,009,491,366 poured out of the Treasury for costs of running the Government and for recovery and relief purposes. In the corresponding period of last year, expenditures were \$1,676,305,479.

Instead of the strikes and lock-outs that have marked the ends of past depressions, both employers and employees now are turning to the various government labor boards for aid in settling their differences.

Miss Perkins told the American Federation of Labor convention.

"The United States will not become even more general as recovery progressed."

Her message was the high spot in a brief convention session, but behind the scenes warring factions were drawing their lines and making secret alliances for showdown on the building trades department row and the industrial union issues.

Whether workers in a mass production industry should be divided among craft unions or organized into one big union was the issue that promised to provide the biggest scrap at the convention.

Clever delegates introduced resolutions Wednesday calling for the federation to adopt an industrial unionization policy.

More were craft unionists, privately claimed that the one-big-union men didn't have a change to change the federation's present policy of allowing the unions to join into the mass production industries in which the workers would best be served by craft unions.

REBELS SLAY FOUR IN SONORA

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 10. (AP)—Three officials and a civilian were slain a rebel band in Sonora, by armed men who were described as members of a rebel band, dispatches to the capital reported Wednesday.

They took the town by assault and lined up the officials before a firing squad, the accounts said.

The municipal president, a policeman, another official and the civilian were killed outright. Several other persons, including other members of the council, were wounded.

Fighting on the American border came word that 14 men accused of being rebels were held there for transfer to Hermosillo and military trials.

EIGHT PERSONS KILLED IN OAXACA BATTLE

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 10. (AP)—Eight persons were killed in a political war at Tlacotalpan, State of Oaxaca, a dispatch to the news agency from Sonora Wednesday.

The fighting which lasted for several hours, was said to have been caused by Cristeros (religious faction) who were dissatisfied with results of Sunday's election.

Universal said a group of alleged Cristeros seized the village of Gradados, killing the president of the council, Jose Moreno, a policeman, and two others.

Women Are Better Cooks, Rector Says

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 10. (AP)—George Rector, who rather miss a train than hurry through a meal, observed Wednesday that American women are becoming better cooks—but masculine table habits are getting worse.

The dresy, internationally known food connoisseur twirled his little white mustache.

"Just to watch a business man at a lunch counter wolf a ham sandwich, washing it down with a cup of coffee, breaks the heart of a true gourmet," he said. "But the American housewife ah."

"Her roast turkey, chicken pot pie and hot breads have the once predominant French cooking on the run. Some of our leading New York hotels now boast of women cooks."

Bang's Disease to Bar Imports Cattle

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10. (AP)—The Department of Agriculture announced Wednesday that cattle brought into the United States from countries other than Mexico must be found free from Bang's disease unless they are for immediate slaughter.

The new regulation becomes effective Jan. 1, 1936, and applies to all cattle at least six months old imported for breeding or milking purposes. Mexico was excluded from the arrangement because of its treaty with this country relating to health of imported animals.

DAUGHTER BORN TO STEEL

Mr. and Mrs. Red Steele are the parents of a daughter, born this morning in a Midland hospital. The baby weighed seven pounds, four ounces. Mother and child are doing well.

SALES TAX PLAN STANDS ATTACK

AUSTIN, Oct. 10. (AP)—The proposed three per cent sales tax as an amendment to the house chain store tax bill withstood the senate constitutional attack. Senator Van Zandt, Tioga, contended that the tax altered the original intent of the bill in contravention to the constitution.

Presiding Senator Martin, Hillsboro, overruled the objection, holding that the sales tax amendment was an occupation tax, as was the house bill.

The sales tax would tax "gross proceeds" numerous food products, other commodities termed "necessities of life," electrical and water power and construction, would be exempt.

Legion Asks Labor Aid Against Reds

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Oct. 10. (AP)—The American Legion asked the American Federation of Labor Wednesday to join in a Nation-wide drive to stamp out Communism.

Ray Murphy, the legion's newly elected commander, delivered the invitation in a speech at the federation's convention. In view of the recent suggestion of Matthew Woll, federation vice-president, that the two organizations unite to fight Red activity, acceptance of Murphy's bid was expected.

Woll said he whole-heartedly favored Murphy's suggestion for joint action. He predicted either the convention or the executive council would name a committee to work with the legion.

Depression Over in Six Months, Prophecy

NEW YORK, Oct. 10. (AP)—Roger W. Babson, statistician and economist, predicted Wednesday the depression in six months and headed for prosperity.

Babson said a declining standard of living would accompany the boom, because "this administration has taught the people they can be made comfortable without working and can get security by legislation."

The next administration, whether Democratic or Republican, Babson believed, will be more conservative than the present.

Gas Rate Reduction Saves Austin Money

AUSTIN (AP)—Austin gas users may save \$34,000 this winter through a compromise rate reduction effected by the city council and the Texas Public Service company.

Based on 1934 statistics, it was calculated the reduction would average slightly more than \$3 per meter, or \$2.22 a year for the average customer who last year burned 4,000 cubic feet.

A reduction 3 1/2 cents per 1,000 cubic feet on the first one thousand used, plus a monthly service charge of 50 cents, would make the minimum charge \$1.14.

The average user would benefit in the second classification reduction of five cents per thousand on the next 4,000 feet used, cutting the cost to 62 1/2 cents.

Other reductions and the new rates, effective Oct. 15, were: Next 20,000 feet, 7 1/2 cents, 60
