# 9 PASSENGERS AND SHIP CREW FALL TO DEATH

Pilot Had Inquired Of Ground Wind Before Fall

CHEYENNE, Wyo. Oct. 7, (P)—
Twelve persons—nine passengers, two pilots and a stewardess were killed today when a California to New York United Airlines transport plane hit a knoll on the rolling plains 15 miles west of here.

Pilot H. A. Collison had started from a high altitude when the twin-motored liner struck the hill, lost its propellor, and plummeted against another hillside. The plane did not burn.

About five minutes before the hip was due to land here Collison equired about ground wind infor-

The exact cause cannot be determined, airline officials said, until the Federal Department of Commerce finishes an investigation.

This control lies chiefly in some 2,112,042 shares of Allegheny Corp., which today have a value of slightly better than \$3,150,000.





The one factor in fall seed sowing to be attended to is mulch. Heavy rains will wash the seeds out of their regular rows unless a protection against the driving showers is given. Leaves, straw or stalks of the flower garden will give ample protection. If the seeds can be sown in a seed bed for transplanting in the spring, a wooden curb about the bed to prevent the washing of heavy rains is advisable.

Now is the time to get calla lilies going for early spring bloom.

Save autumn leaves for the compost. It is a waste of good fertilizing material to burn them.

Divide and reset early spring blooming perennials such as bleeding hearts, peonies, leopard's bane, pyrethrums, Shasta daisies.

Centaureas, which have little garden decorative value, are very valuable as cutting material. They will winter safely if they come up from seed this fall. The same is true of annual larkspur, indispensable for cutting. Both had best be sown this fall to get an early start next spring.

Oher annuals that can be sown now are all the various members of the poppy tribe, petunias, snapdragons, alyssum, nicotina (the flowering tobacco), gypsophila, Chinesc forget me-nots, calendulas and hosts of others. The tender annuals, such as marigolds and zimnias, should be held until spring, although occasionally marigolds self-sow.

Snapdragons which have bloomed this summer may be cut back and given a protective cover and come through for early bloom next spring. Experiment has shown that the California wax paper cloches will bring the snaps through the winter in fine shape. The cloche should have a small ventilating slit cut in its side.
