## MATTER OF DEFINITION

The federal government recently offered to give Kansas City some \$4,000,000 for a slum clearance project; but it looks as if the offer will be rejected, as City Manager H. F. McElroy says that Kansas City has no slums, and the head of the local Real Estate Board declares there are more than 5000 vacancies in homes which rent for \$15 a

On the other side of the argument is A. E. Hutchings, chairman of a citizens' committee drawn up to sponsor slum clearance; and he asserts that Kansas City has fully 8000 homes without modern plumbing, 6000 without running water and at least 1000 that are actually insanitary

These opposing viewpoints emphasize one of the knottiest problems of the times. The slum is a blot on civilization—but where are you going to draw the line between the actual slum and the "cheap neighborhood"? How are you going to clear away slums without working hardship on certain property owners? Can you, in fact, embark on a real slum clearance program without first getting an entirely new viewpoint on such things as living standards, private property and civic responsibility?







NAPLES, Italy, Oct. 15. — With a war clouds at last loosing their dread rain of death upon Italy and Ethiopia, history is repeating itself and once more youth is gaily marching off to battle with a smile on its lips and a song in its threat. That is, the Italian boys are.

# Rains Over the State

favorable for all growing crops, except cotton. The reported condition of farm pastures and livestock ranges on October 1 shows a marked gain over the condition of a month ago and is well above the 10-year average (1923-32) October 1 condition. Livestock continued to gain during September and are in better than usual flesh for this time of the year. Such late maturing crops as sorghums, peanuts, sweet potatoes, and pecans show an improvement over a month ago, and indicated yields are somewhat higher. The citrus crop promises to be about 10 per cent greater than the crop harvested last season.

Cotton: A 1935 cotton crop of 3,-75,000 bales of 500 pounds gross weight is forecast for Texas, based in condition of October 1. Grain Sorghums: Prospects for yields are slightly above those of a month ago. The reported condition is 63 per cent of normal compared with 33 per cent a year ago and a 10-year average of 72 per cent. The indicated yield of 14 bushels per acre forecasts a total production of 75,292,000 bushels compared with 17-928,000 bushels last year and a 5-year average of 52,882,000 bushels.

Panuts: The condition of Texas peanuts on October 1, 1935, is placed at 75 per cent of normal, which compares with 43 per cent a year ago and 66 per cent the 10-year average. A condition of 75 per cent October 1 indicates a yield of 620 pounds per acre and a total production of 145,700,000 pounds. Last year 51,350,000 pounds.

Hay: The preliminary estimate of the yield per acre of all tame hay is 1.10 tons per acre, which compares with .73 tons last year and 1.08 tons the 10-year average.
