INTERESTING BATH TUB CENSUS RETURNS

Bath tub census returns came to light in Austin this week. In 1883 information shows there were 58.3 persons for each bath tub in the State. Latest figures, announced by Dr. Manton M. Carrick, the State health officer, show that tubs have increased until the average is 6.7 persons for each. "This increase in the number of bath tubs is a good indication of the advance that has been made in matters of personal hygiene said Dr. Carrick. "Bathing used to be a weekly chore, something to be endured. Within the memory of many people still living is the recollection of what happened when the bath tub was first introduced. It was lambasted as a menace to democratic simplicity, and a danger to health. An ordinance was introduced in Philadelphia—and almost passed — to to prohibit bathing between November and March. Boston made bathing unlawful except on medical advice, Virginia imposed a tax on the bath tub owners of \$30 a year. All because the bath tub was new, and the public resents a novelty.

"But today we realize that not only is cleanliness next to godliness, but it is essential to health as well. Not only does it contribute to our good looks to remove the dust and perspiration from our bodies, but it does much to eliminate the danger of contracting diseases. For dust carries and harbors germs, and these germs, if allowed to remain on our persons, will oftentimes lead to serious illness."

There were 4046 deaths among people between the ages of 45 and 55 reported to the Bureau of Vital Statistics for the year 1920, according to Dr. Manton M. Carrick, State Health Officer. For the month of January alone, the report shows 306 deaths among people between these



Baits for catching rats should be some attractive morsel which they have not been getting, as meats or green vegetables for catching rats in granaries; or seeds or grain for rats

where meat is plentiful. Traps should not be placed in large open places, but in the narrow runways of the rat or close to a wall. The surroundings should be disturbed as little as possible. Traps must be disguised and free from the odor of human hands or rats previously

caught in them. Cut off the food supply of the rat by making all food-storage places rat-proof with covering of wire screen of quarter-inch mesh. Make it impossible for rats to feed on garbage and offal by keeping these in tightly closed metallic receptacles,

which should be frequently emptied and kept clean.

FATTED CALVES FOR PRODIGALS OF EUROPE

The following, by Senator Arthur Capper, of Kansas, is taken from the last issue of Capper's Farmer:

The increase of 1-2 billion dollars a year to our interest bearing debt through the failure of foreign governments to pay the interest on the 10 billion dollars we lent them during the war, a matter to which I recently made reference in these columns, has brought me a number of letters. These letters show that the people of the United States are not blind to what is going on, or to what it would mean to cancel completely the entire 10 billions of war debt that Europe owes this country, as recently strongly urged by Great

To get this 10 billions Uncle Sam sold Liberty Bonds and War Saving Stamps on which he is paying interest right along. Europe defaults on its interest, but Uncle Sam doesn't do business that way. So he has had to shoulder the cost of carrying this huge floan added to the burden of his own war debt. This he does by assessing the American tax payer for Europe's defaulted interest at the rate of 1-2 billion dollars a year.

Europe, which has nearly bankrupted itself by secret diplomacy, exclusive self interest and the game of international grab an plunder, now proposes that the United

States assume the whole debt. While it is true we did not get inourselves from the curse brought on the world by Europe's diplomacy and militarism, this country Britain expended in four years. But our way, nor are they expected to. Great Britain gets rich German territory in Africa and the oil of Mespotamia, while France and Italy have

each taken over a colonial empire. In the meantime, we have backed our 10 billion cash loan to Europe with other billions, public and private. We are carrying about 4 billions of unpaid balances on exports made during 1919 and 1920, and our more than 2 billion dollars of European securities.



GENERAL DIRECTOR 75-MILLION CAMPAIGN TELLS PURPOSES TO WHICH MILLIONS GIVEN.

EVERY CAUSE IS BENEFITED

Christian Education, Hospitals, Orphanages and Ministerial Relief Share in Receipts.



DR. L. R. SCARBOROUGH, Chairman Conservation Commission Baptist 75 Million Campaign.

Dr. L. R. Starborough, who was general director of the Baptist 75-Million Campaign, and who was later elected chairman of the Conservation Commission that is seeking to con-serve all the interests of that campaign, has issued a report from the Nashville headquarters showing the various interests that have profited from the \$16,851,100.68 collected on campaign pledges up to Dec. 1, 1920.

With its receipts of \$2,958,808.07, the Foreign Mission Board has added to its territory five new provinces in China and made the beginning for pening up work in the new fields of Spain, Hungary, Roumania, Jugo-Slavia, and the Ukraine in Russia; strengthened its work in Syria and Palestine, made a beginning in Eastern Siberia, added 100 new workers to its force of American missionaries in foreign lands, provided new houses of worship, hospitals, schools, publishing plants and other institutions needed in the prosecution of missionary work. What is of even more im portance, in the estimation of Secretary Love, is the completion of many institutions and undertakings that

Home Missions Doubles Budget By reason of the larger receipts from the campaign, the Home Mission Board has been enabled to practically double its annual budget for its work of evangelism, church building, work among the foreigners, Indians and negroes, mountain mission schools, enlistment, and general mission work in Cuba and Panama. The appropriations to evangelism have been practically doubled, those to church building increased between 500 and 600 per cent, those to the mountain schools, forty in number, 100 per cent, and those to the work of enilsting undeveloped churches,

300 per cent. In the realm of state missions, which embodies such work as providing missionaries and other special workers for needy fields within the states and aiding weak congregations in the building of houses of worship, the advance made possible by the campaign ranges from 25 to 100 per cent in the eighteen states of the convention territory.

Returns to the Conservation Commission by forty-five of the Baptist institutions of learning which are sharing in the returns from the campaign, show that they have received \$2,713,756 so far. Of this sum, \$1, 640,000 has been expended on improvements, \$400,000 has gone to endowment, several hundred thousand dollars in old debts have been wiped out and other improvements are under way.

Ten New Hospitals Provided Southern Baptists were operating fourteen hospitals when the campaign began, and as a result of the new interest in this work aroused by the campaign ten additional hospitals have been launched. These hospitals have received \$1,111,439.45 from the campaign so far, while local communities in which the hospitals are located have subscribed approximately \$2,000,000 additional. The hospitals have practically \$1,000,000 in improvements under way. The seventeen Baptist orphanages have likewise come in for much larger support as a result of the campaign, their receipts from this source being \$1,018,798.67. As a result of this income the orphanages have been enabled to make improvements valued t \$325,000.

The work of aiding aged preachers s a new one among Southern Baptists as a whole, but as a result of the campaign the Relief and Annuity Board has received \$408,148.82 from that source and \$300,000 from Mr. Rockefeller, Sr.
