LONG'S INFLUENCE IN MISSISSIPPI SLIGHT

(By The Associated Press)
JACKSON, Miss., Aug. 7.—On returns from 231 precincts out of 1,638, gathered from 47 of 82 counties, in the Mississippi democratic primary election today, Hugh White, Columbia millionaire lumberman, held a substantial lead in the guident of the company of the substantial lead in the guident of the company of the substantial lead in the guident of congress, running only heads apart for second place.

Returns from North Mississippi brought Murphree a slight lead over Johnson, who had been running easily in second place on the first two hours of returns that were coming in slowly because of the long ballot and heavy vote.

Lester Franklin, former chairman of the state tax commission, was far behind in fourth place and Dr. E. O. Copeland was out of the race. On these returns the vote stood: White 5.794. Murphree 5,136, Johnson, 5,044, Franklin 1,975.

These returns indicate that Senator Huey P. Long's influence in the election was slight. He was reported by his representatives to be supporting the candidacies of both Johnson and Franklin.

Franklin, who ran on a "share the wealth" platform said Long had supported him all through the campaign but Sol P. McCall, agent of the Louisiana conservation commission in charge of the Bloxi, Miss., office where fishermer's licenses are issued, said he was directed by Long to have his associates support Johnson.

WASHINGTON, August 7. (P)-The adoption of a inter-corporate dividend tax to prevent corpora-tions from defeating the purpose of the proposed graduated corpora-tion income tax was recommended to the Senate Finance Committee today by an administration offi-cial

cial.
"The House desregarded the President's suggestions in this respect," shid Robert H. Jackton, counsel for the Internal Revenue Bureau.
Jackson estimated that \$397,000 could be raised by reducing to 85 per cent the present 100 per cent exemption on intercorporate dividends from corporation income tax.

The row was settled by giving each one a different job—and the job Judge Wilson got was on the Federal Parole Board. So Dr. Stannard had to step down to make room for him.






