OLD-TIMERS' REUNION AND GOODWILL TRIPS, SPONSORS' CONTEST AND BIG ADVERTISING PROGRAM WORKED OUT

Four distinct activities in which the merchants of Midland and the chamber of commerce will aid in advertising and building up the Midland Fair October 19-23 were worked out Thursday night, at a joint session of chamber of commerce directors and fair officials.

The trips probably will be held early in October.

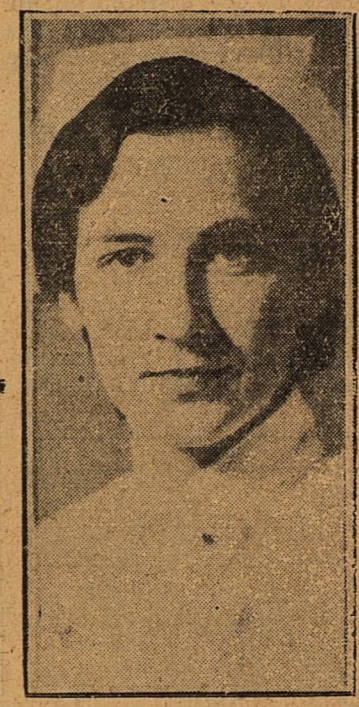
The fourth item approved was for newspaper advertising to be conducted in papers of towns in the territory where extraordinary effort will be made to secure large attendance at the fair.

Men were wandering slowly towards the park that serves L. A. as an exhaust valve, the same as Hyde Park serves London.

I came with a half dozen or more, but it was this particular unemployed man who frankly answered my questions. After we'd got along for some minutes he asked me if I had any chance there was of revolution in America. "There'll be a revolution whenever we miss three meals straight running," he answered solemnly.

CONTEMPT TRIAL OF SIX NEWSMEN IS BEING HEARD

ANGLETON, August 2. (AP)—John H. Crocker, Houston attorney, argued today in the trial of six Houston newspaper editors and reporters on charges of contempt in a district court here that freedom of the press is a privilege of the public as well as newspapers and publishers and should not be restricted by any judiciary or law making body.

He told Judge Munson that by entering a contempt order he was furthering the theory that is leading to the invasion of the free rights of speech and the freedom of the press.

ANGLTON, Aug. 2. (AP)—Six Houston newspaper editors and reporters were charged today in a district court with the violation of a grand jury indictment.

The newspapermen charged were George Cottingham, managing editor of the Houston Post, and Ed Rice, managing editor, and Harry McCormick, correspondent, of the Houston Press.

BRYAN, August 2. (AP)—Murd M. Riedel, 36, Houston, charged with the murder of Luther Broadway, 40, here yesterday, was released today on a \$100 bond.

BRYAN, August 2. (AP)—Luther Broadway, attorney of Madisonville, Texas, was shot to death in a hotel room here, Thursday by M. M. Riedel, an attorney of Houston, slain to return to Chilton for his gun.

Taken to police headquarters, Riedel talked freely of the shooting to officers and a newspaper man.

J. Buchanan rendered a coroner's verdict that Broadway was shot to death by Riedel. W. R. Allen, county attorney, said a charge of murder would be filed against the Houston attorney. His bond was set at \$5,000.

Mrs. Riedel had been employed at College Station, near here, since July 17, in connection with the cotton adjustment program.

Last Friday Riedel came to Bryan to see his wife and to Bryan to get out of town. On Tuesday he was found a letter addressed to his wife from Broadway which caused him to return to Houston for his gun.

Broadway, who was 43, was a former county attorney and county judge of Madison county.

ACTIVITY AGAINST NAZI PARTY TO BE CALLED TREASON

BERLIN, August 2. (AP)—Roland Freiser, State Secretary for the Ministry of Justice, disclosed today that any activity against the Nazi party and its organization would be regarded as treason against the people and punished by death under a new criminal code.

Severe punishment will also be provided for any reasonable action by foreigners, but such action could not be termed treason against the people, he added, because foreigners are bound only by obligation hospitality.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2. (AP)—Bonnie Patton, 17-year-old daughter of Representative Patton of Texas, testified today that E. V. Sellers, NRA employe, told her that he knew the box her father took from the hotel room of John W. Carpenter, Texas utilities official, contained cigars.

POST AND WIFE ON TRIP TO MOSCOW

SEATTLE, August 2. (AP)—Wiley Post and his wife in a red low-winged monoplane arrived at the Renton airport, 12 miles south of Seattle, at 8:30 p. m. (Pacific standard time), Thursday completing one leg of their 8,000 mile flight from San Francisco to Moscow, via Alaska and Siberia.

FOUNDATIONS OF FAIR BUILDINGS STARTED

Pouring of concrete for buildings at the new fair grounds was started today. Installation of an electric force pump on the No. 1 water well had been completed, easily supplying 250 gallons a minute. The water in the string well 60 feet deep. A second well, to be equipped with windmill and elevated tank, was drilled to a depth of 147 feet in the stables and paddocks.

Foundations include those for the steel grandstand, to seat 2,520 persons, the agricultural and livestock exhibit buildings. Stables for from 75 to 100 race horses will be built at the east side of the fair park, and pens for the cat-in-the-leader calf show will be built at the northwest corner.

HARRY JOHNSON TRANSFERRED TO HOUSTON OFFICE

Harry H. Johnson, for five years in the lease and scouting department of the Gulf Production Company here, left Midland with his family today for Houston where he has received a promotion with the company.

A lieutenant colonel in the Texas National Guard forces, being connected with the Calvert Company 124, Johnson was in charge of the military forces on duty in the East Texas oil fields for several months.

While living at Midland, Colonel Johnson was active in American Legion work, having served as commander, and also was an active member of the petroleum committee of the chamber of commerce. Mrs. Johnson has been a civic and social leader and an active worker in Catholic Church and Albar Society circles. They have four children, two of whom were in the city schools.

Col. Johnson has spent 15 years with the Gulf, having been zone agent at Eastland prior to his coming here. Before leaving Midland, he spoke highly of the wholesome citizenship, "big city" atmosphere and aggressive efforts of Midland people.

SAYS MORGENTHAU IS ASHAMED OF THE TAX BILL PROGRAM

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2. (AP)—An assertion that Secretary Morgenthau was either ashamed of the \$270,000,000 tax bill or else lacked ability to analyze it, was made in the House debate on the measure today by Representative Treadway (Mass.).

Treadway spoke after Representative Hill (Washington) told House Democratic Ways and Means committee members the bill without consulting members of the minority party.

ABANDON PUBLIC COUNCIL SESSION AFTER OPPOSITION

GENEVA, Aug. 2. (AP)—Faced with the opposition of Italy and Ethiopia to suggestions for a peace formula, leaders in the League of Nations council abandoned the intended public session of the council today.

Premier Mussolini of Italy and Teclé Hawarait, Ethiopia, were understood to have expressed opposition to certain phases of the formula, including the wording and punctuation of the text.

More serious was the report that Mussolini was opposed to fixing a definite date for the council to discuss the dispute if political negotiations among England, France and Italy as provided in the formula, failed to solve the problem.

A CRITIC'S VIEWPOINT

Georgia's Governor Talmadge has had a great deal to say about the way in which the national administration is spending money.

But it makes a difference, even to a homespun critic, apparently, where the money is going to be spent. And so Governor Talmadge took his hat in his hand and went to the White House the other day to ask President Roosevelt to spend some \$19,000,000 in government highway funds in Georgia through state rather than federal auspices.

Any alert governor, of course, will do all he can to see that his state gets a fair break in the distribution of federal funds, and Governor Talmadge's idea that the Georgia State Highway Commission ought to supervise highway expenditures in Georgia is sensible enough.

But there is something faintly odd in the spectacle of one of the most vociferous critics of federal spending hurrying to Washington to see that his state gets its \$19,000,000 to spend in its own way.
