**Dove Season Hunting** Dates Are Changed

AUSTIN, Aug. 30. (U.P.) — Federal game regulations on mourning doves were amended Thursday to permit shooting in Texas from Sept. 21 to Jan. 5. Legal hours are from 7 a. m. to sunset.

The change follows protests from Gov. James V. Allred, Texas game officials, and hunters.

The change does not make the State and Federal regulation the same, but makes them more nearly coincide. There will still be a conflict in the South hunting zone of Texas where state law makes the season from Dec. 1 to Jan. 16.

Texas had protested against the original federal hunting hours which prohibited shooting three hours before sunset.

Prior to the change, the federal regulation did not permit hunting mourning doves to start anywhere in the state until Oct. 1.

The robber fled in an automobile after tearing the bank telephone from the wall.


The Barstow bank was burglarized on the night of July 4, 1932, for which seven men later were indicted. All except two are now serving long term sentences. Then in March of this year the bank again was burglarized, four men being indicted, with sentences imposed upon all who were tried, others being under 99 year sentences for other cases. The four were Red Giles, Joe Duniwoody, J. H. Green and Dick Yarbrough.

Those burglaries led to the practice of keeping a record of serial numbers of the bills in the bank. The system made identification of the money found here easy. It consisted of one hundred dollar bill, the remaining being in packages of \$500 each, the bills ranging from \$5 to \$20 in denomination. One package had only 98 of the \$5 bills, revealing that only \$10 of the total amount taken had been removed or spent.

There is a great deal of talk about the enemies of democracy. It usually centers on the Communists, or the Fascists, or some other sort of organized effort to set up new forms of government.

But those are not the real enemies of democracy. They are not the real danger to the free form of govern- | Rev.

The real danger is in ourselves, in those of us who profess to be devoted to democratic and free government, and yet who won't bestir ourselves to do anything about it. No form of popular government can succeed unless the average man will take an active and conscious part in it.

Put yourself under the microscope for a minute. What have you done to make democracy work? Did you take any part in the last primaries to see that decent candidates were nominated? Did you talk to your neighbors and friends about the candidates?

You needn't be a professional political worker to take | Honored at Bridge an active, intelligent, and important interest in these Thursday Afternoon

Did you vote in the election? Did you discuss the election with friends and neighbors, using your influence for the man you believe best qualified?

Did you take the trouble to look up the record of your congressman? And did you talk and work against him if it didn't suit you; did you help him if it did? Do you follow the papers carefully and watch the records of your local judges?

Are you the kind of person who likes to get parking tickets "fixed"? A small matter, true. But people who demand this sort of "special privilege" should be the last to complain of police corruption brought on by the same sort of special privileges sought on a larger scale by people less reputable than you know you are.

The next time we get discouraged with the working of democracy, let's each ask ourselves this question: What Two Will Speak at have I done, this last year, to make it work better?

#### THE FIRST BILLION

Legalization of beer and liquor has brought its first billion dollars in revenue to federal, state and local governments. The lion's share of this, more than \$700,000,-000, has gone to the federal government in excise, license and customs revenue. The rest has gone to state and local governments.

The income from this source is rising steadily. Federal officials believe this is due to steady work in breaking up bootlegging. The percentage of bootleg liquor consumed is sometimes estimated as high as the normal consumption, but that seems unlikely in view of the fact that annual revenue from beer and liquor today is higher Coming—No. 45.


The fact that these revenues are badly needed by federal and local governments is in a sense a danger. It might well lead to a progressive letting down of the bars at the International Date Line. of regulation. Every governmental unit, national and local, must keep constantly in mind that there must be no relapse into pre-prohibition conditions. The iron hand of control must not be allowed to weaken because of the golden flood of revenue.
