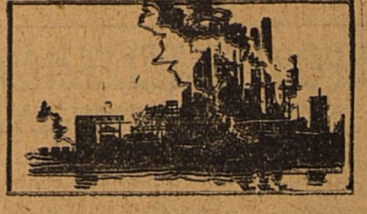

STREETS RUNNING WITH WATER

Labor Day Casualties from Shootings, Crashes Heavy

TRANSPORT PLANE AT LOS ANGELES DOWN; 3 DEAD

Riots Bring Death, Injuries Early This Morning

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 2 (AP)—Three persons were killed late last night in the fiery crash of a Western Air Express plane a few minutes after taking off from Union Air Terminal for Salt Lake City.

The dead were George C. Sherrod, 39, pilot, of Los Angeles; Fred Burlew, 35, co-pilot, of Glendale, Calif.; and Miss Donna Naylor, 22, stewardess, of Burbank, Calif.

The big Boeing transport was circling toward the field with its engines apparently missing fire when it struck a high tension wire line and crashed in flames against a ranch barn.

Firemen battled the heat for 20 minutes before they could recover the charred bodies. Seventeen sacks of U. S. mail were carried in the plane.

At the airport, the Western Air Express operations department reported that the plane made a perfect take-off in the face of overcast skies and some fog. As the big metal ship passed over the administration building in a circuit of the field, however, its motors were heard to misfire.

A mile from the airport the plane seemed to waver and the pilot apparently tried to head it back, fighting adverse winds and falling power.

STRIKE RIOT KILLS WOMAN; 15 INJURED

PELZER, S. C., Sept. 2 (AP)—A woman was killed and at least 15 were wounded in a short-lived but terrific gun battle at the strike-torn Pelzer Manufacturing Mills here early today as workers attempted to break picket lines.

Two companies of National guard troops, called out by Governor Olin Johnston, left for the scene immediately from Greenville and Greenwood under the command of Major Frank H. Barnwell of Florence.

Mrs. Bertha Kelly, 21, the mother of two children, was the one slain. She was killed during the fighting at the company's main plant situated here on a slight hill.

P. McDougal, a watchmaker taking his son to work, was perhaps fatally wounded in a second gun battle at the number four plant a mile from the principal plant.

Witnesses said that approximately 500 pistol and rifle bullets screamed through the air during the two fights. All those shot were said to be members of the group of strikers and pickets that night the plants shortly before opening time.

SAN ANTONIO REPORTS SHOOTING, CASUALTIES

AN ANTONIO, Sept. 2 (AP)—One man died of a broken neck several persons suffered gunshot wounds, a soldier was stabbed and other persons received less serious injuries in affrays over the weekend.

A man was found shot dead in his garage.

E. J. Pencer, 45, was injured fatally in an altercation at a tavern here. A man arrested after the trouble made a written statement and an inquest was begun.

Three were wounded in a shooting at the home of Mrs. Antonia Ojeda, YP, on a ranch southwest of San Antonio. She was hit in the back with a pistol bullet; her sister, Anita Huizar, 45, was wounded in the right breast; and Jesus Ojeda, son of Mrs. Ojeda, was shot in the neck. A farmer suspected of the shooting was arrested in San Antonio.

George (Dutch) Schultz, 45, a sign painter, was shot with a rifle in a dispute with a bartender.

PARENTS OF QUEEN REACH BRUSSELS

BRUSSELS, Belgium, Sept. 2 (AP)—Prince Carl and Princess Ingeborg of Sweden arrived Sunday to join the royal assembly for the funeral Tuesday of their daughter, the ill-fated Queen Astrid of the Belgians.

Many persons at the railroad station wept in sympathy for Ingeborg as she bowed in sorrow, she walked to an automobile holding her husband's arm.

The party included their son, Prince Carl, Prince Olaf of Norway. They were met at the station by Prince Alex of Denmark, Prince Bertil of Sweden and other dignitaries.

Trains, automobiles and bicycles took thousands to join the ever-growing queue, estimated at 10,000, which circled the royal palace, awaiting a chance to enter the Thinkers Hall and pay their last respects. (See PARENTS OF QUEEN, page 4)

ONE MAN INJURED WHEN PLANE NOSES OVER NEAR FLOREY

Broken Shoulder Is Suffered by Wacoan

One man sustained minor but painful injuries and two others narrowly escaped injury early Sunday when an airplane in which they were going on a prairie chicken hunt "nosed over" in landing on a flat near Florey.

Lewis W. Stephens, wholesale lumber dealer of Waco, sustained a dislocated shoulder and a severe head gash. J. F. Barnes, Waco lumberman and pilot of the ship, and Elliott F. Cowden of Midland were not hurt, although somewhat shaken up when the plane tipped over.

Cowden said the Waco men flew here late Saturday to be his guests on a prairie chicken hunt. An automobile, driven by Frank Roberts, had proceeded to the flat on which they planned to land and was there when the accident occurred. The three in the plane, a four place Stinson cabin job, were about to land at 6:30 a. m. The tall grass concealed an old road running across the flat and the pilot saw it when he was too close to the ground to get altitude. He managed to clear it with one landing gear but the other struck the old ditch and crumpled. The plane, as result, nosed over and landed on its back.

Cowden and Barnes remained suspended by their straps but Stephens came loose in some way as the ship went over, falling on his shoulder. It was believed that the gash on his temple was caused by a fire extinguisher which fell from its place on the wall of the cabin. Barnes quickly cut off the ignition and no flames resulted.

Roberts immediately drove the party back to Midland and Stephens was given an anesthetic and his shoulder set in place. Hospital reports this morning said he was recovering from both injuries and that an X-ray examination showed there were no other portions of his body hurt.

The plane, rather badly damaged, was loaded on a truck and sent to Dallas for repairs.

Barnes and Cowden were planning later this month to take a "guaranteed" hunt near Cody, Wyoming, where on a certain ranch they were guaranteed a certain kill of bear, deer and wild game. Cowden said they still probably would go although the outcome of the repairs to the ship might necessitate their going by automobile.

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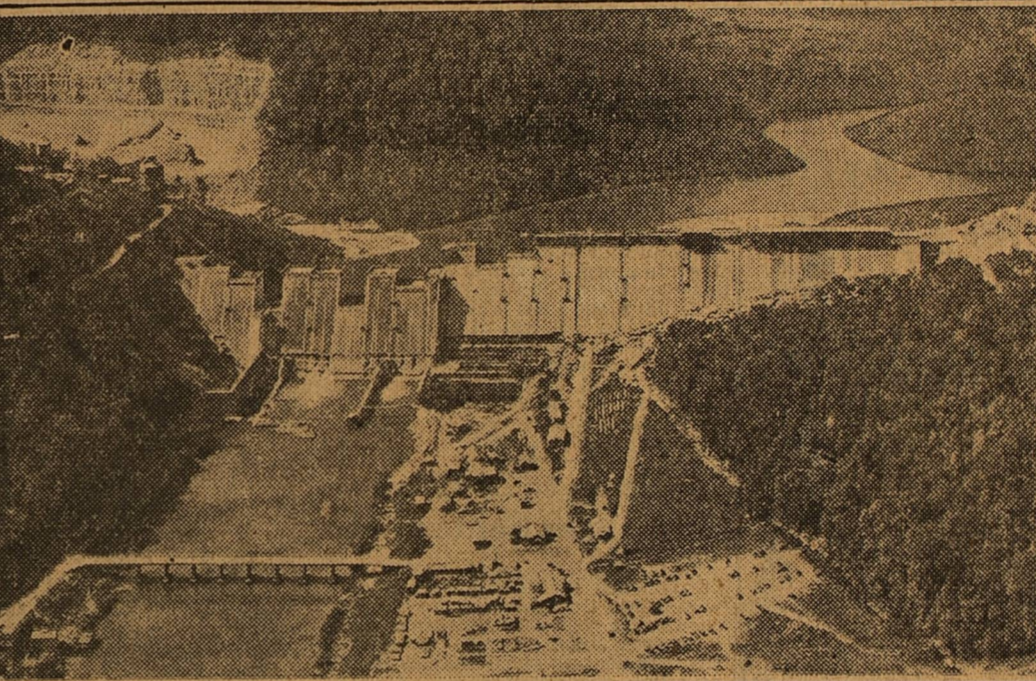
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Air View Shows Norris Dam Nearing Completion



Revealing the remarkable progress already achieved at Norris Dam, in East Tennessee, this exclusive air view shows the \$30,000,000 project as it appears today, almost completed. More than 900,000 of the needed 1,000,000 cubic yards of concrete have been poured. Several hundred feet of the east abutment (at right) have already been built. And the water behind the dam, formerly a tiny stream called Cove Creek, is now a river, 50 feet deep. To avoid obstructing road and bridge relocation in the reservoir, excess water, as shown, is allowed to flow through sluiceways in the dam. The quarry from which the necessary concrete was blasted is pictured at top left.

Getting Car Calves For Orphans' Gift

O. B. Holt announced this morning that he is getting up a carload of calves to be donated to the Methodist Orphanage, and hopes to make shipment some time this month. This is the third consecutive year the project has been handled by Holt, with the aid of Midland, Odessa and Stanton ranchers who have donated one or two calves each.

The poorer grade calves received in the past were butchered and canned for consumption at the orphanage while the better animals were fed out for market on the home's 4,000 acre farm near Waco.

Holt said today he had been promised 16 of the 50 or 55 calves needed for the car.

MONTH IS USHERED IN WITH GREATLY NEEDED RAINFALL

Precipitation Over West Texas Is General

Midland streets were running in water today, after September had been ushered in with intermittent showers Sunday. The town, practically closed for Labor Day, saw rain, sloppy streets and heavy skies as the morning progressed.

The government gauge at the Southern Ice and Utilities Co. reported 31 of an inch Sunday. Rains began falling at daybreak today in the city, coming from the northeast. Heavy electrical display indicated that another rain had started to the southwest of Midland, and reports coming to the city showed the precipitation to be general.

At 10 o'clock this morning, the city rain gauge reading was 82 inch, bringing the total for Sunday and part of today to 1.13 inches.

It was indicated that the entire ranch and farm area around Midland was being soaked.

Rainfall at Sloan field Sunday was 63 of an inch, and by 7:30 o'clock this morning had amounted to an additional 52. The rains still were falling at 9:30 but another reading had not been taken.

Army airways reports at the field said rain was falling at Fort Worth, Santo and Abilene; heavy at Big Spring; heavy at Wink, heavy rain and dense fog at Guadalupe Pass 200 miles west of Midland; no rain at El Paso, San Antonio, Dallas and Oklahoma points from which reports had been received.

This reports this morning said heavy rains had fallen all along the highway from Baird. Utilities companies had received reports of good rains to the north.

Lubbock had received an inch and a quarter Sunday, with rains continuing throughout last night. Lamesa reported about two inches of rain. The rains there came from the north, indicating that considerably territory above those points was being soaked.

SECOND INQUEST CALLED TO PROBE ICKES CAR CRASH

SANTA FE, N. M., Sept. 2 (AP)—Conflicting stories of the careening motor car crash that killed Mrs. Harold L. Ickes, 61, talented wife of the Secretary of the Interior, moved the coroner's office Sunday to call a second inquest of the wreck at the edge of rugged Rio Grande Canyon.

Ibrahim Seyfullah, secretary of the Turkish Embassy at Washington, seriously injured, told E. C. House Jr., chief of the state motor patrol, the rented car apparently skidded on slippery pavement before he ditched.

He could not say whether it had been contacted by a second car which some witnesses said might have been involved.

The first inquest determined only that Mrs. Ickes met death in an accident and fixed no responsibility. "We just seemed to have turned out for a car and the next thing I knew I was on my stomach trying to get up," Seyfullah said.

The explanation may, perhaps, be found in a remark dropped the other day by Gen. Jan Christian Smuts, the famous South African veteran.

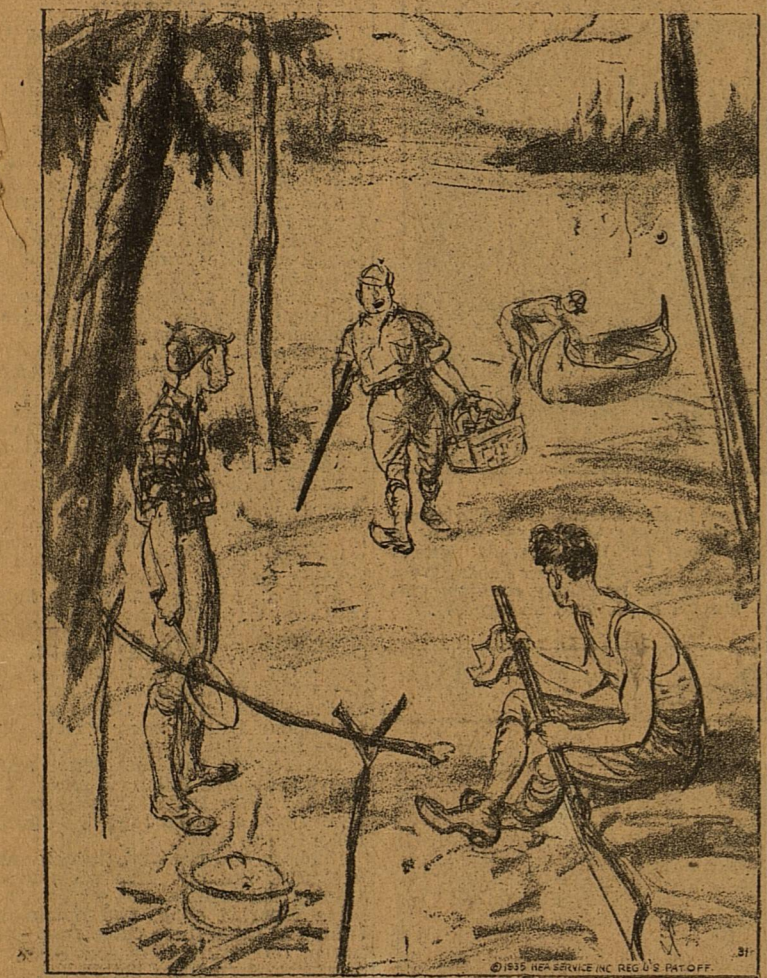

Unless your brows and lashes are quite colorless or of a drab, uninteresting color, better not wear eye cosmetics in the daytime. If you do, take special pains to get them on artistically. For evening, of course, you can use a little more of both eyeshadow-as well.

First of all, pick shades that deepen and enhance your own natural coloring. If you are a true brunette with jet black hair and dark lashes, it is right to buy black mascara and either purple or dark brown eyeshadow. The chances are that you never will need an eyebrow pencil. Practically all other types should use brown for lashes and brows.

Don't buy exotic shades such as blue, until you have tried them in

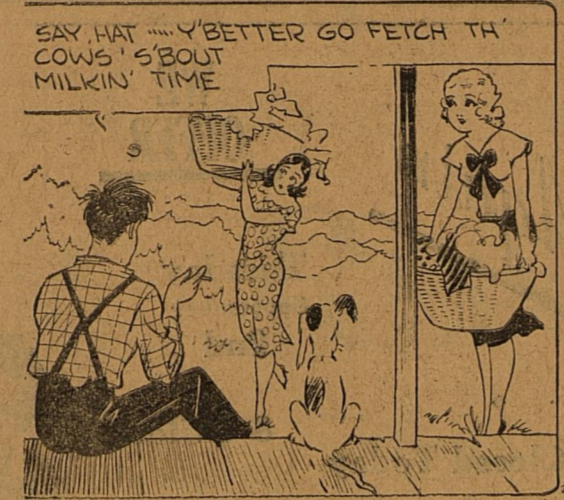

Forbes Herrick, guests of Mrs. Ickes and Frank Allen of Gallup, driver of the car, were in a hospital Sunday. All suffered fractures of the pelvis. Allen, once termed the world's best driver by Mrs. Ickes, appeared the most seriously injured. He has not regained consciousness.

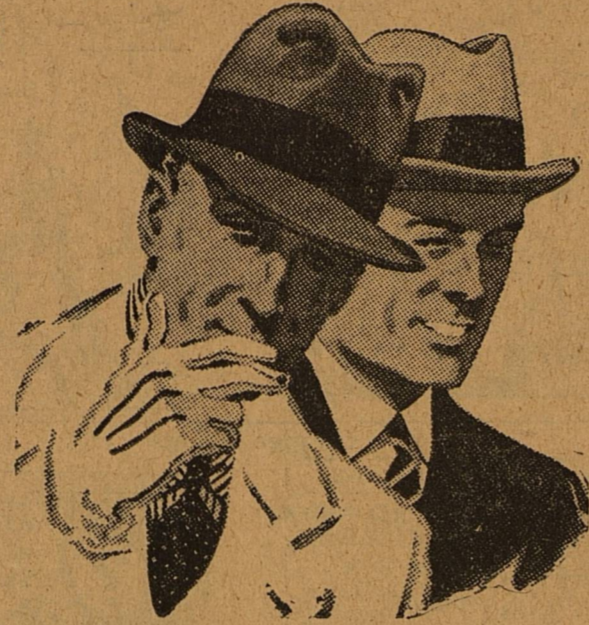

School Health Policies Explained by Editorial Writer in Health Magazine

Editor's Note: The following article is an abridgment of "School Health Policies," an editorial by W. W. Bauer which appeared in the September issue of Hygeia, the Health Magazine. It is published at the request of the Midland County Public Health Board.

Twenty million children, one person out of every six in the United States, will soon be on their way back to the schools. Compulsory education has afforded tremendous privileges to the American people but has also created problems. It has been said that compulsory education should not mean compulsory illness. There can be no disagreement with such a principle. It has also been said that the school is responsible for the health of the child. Is this going too far?

The school has the child in its direct control for approximately 6 hours a day, 5 days a week, or about 30 hours out of 168 weekly for not over forty weeks. During this time the school can have a great influence for good or ill on the life of the child, but it cannot be held responsible alone for that child's health, nor should it attempt to assume such responsibility. To begin with, the child is at least four years old and in many communities six years old before entering a school. In the years between infancy and entrance into school many determining factors in the future health of the child may have taken effect. To assess the school with responsibility for these occurrences beyond its control is not only unfair but illogical.

There can be no doubt that the school has certain definite responsibilities for the health of the school child. Briefly, these responsibilities may be defined as follows: It is incumbent on school authorities to provide an environment in which the child may not suffer from unwholesome surroundings. Environmental conditions include lighting, ventilation, drinking water, toilet and washing facilities, cleanliness of building and grounds, adequate play facilities, protection against accidents or excessive heat or cold, security against immoral influences, and the avoidance as far as possible of exposure to special environmental factors such as mosquitoes, which in certain localities may have definite health significance.

structors imaginable... Medical treatment should not be undertaken by the school. Except for emergency first aid, which obviously would be rendered by any person anywhere when necessity arose, medical treatment is a proper function of the family physician.

Neither should the school embark intensively on social service. It should maintain cooperative relationships with social service organizations, but social service and charity are not the responsibilities of the school. The schools in any community should have access to consultation with a medical adviser. In large communities this may be the health officer or a health department physician assigned to school work. It may be a physician employed by the schools. In smaller communities the schools may well turn to the county medical society and ask for an advisory committee. This school medical adviser should be what his name indicates, an adviser with respect to the school environment and curriculum, the health education plan and other special considerations relating to health. He should prescribe and put into effect a periodic physical examination for the school children, devising and maintaining the necessary records, having the examinations made by local family physicians whenever possible and providing examinations gratis for those unable to provide their own. He should encourage the carrying out of corrections of discovered defects and to a limited extent should carry out demonstrations of physical examinations for educational purposes.

The school medical adviser should encourage immunization against smallpox, diphtheria and in some localities typhoid. Wherever possible, such immunizations should be carried out by the family physician and should be paid for by the community only in the case of those unable to pay. The records should be kept in the possession either of the health department or of the schools, depending on local organization. The school medical adviser should supervise luncheon and cafeteria menus in the schools where such

are provided... He should cultivate the cooperation with the schools of all agencies in the community, including groups and individuals who have a legitimate interest in the health of the children. All these matters should interest not only school superintendents and school physicians whose immediate responsibility they are but other groups in the community, notably practicing physicians and parents in every community is a better understanding of mutual problems by school administrators and teachers, school physicians, practicing physicians and parents. The best way to get such an understanding is by repeated community conferences, either formal or informal, which will lead, if not to an immediate solution of all problems, at least to a better mutual understanding and progress toward the ultimate goal, which is better health for our school children and through better health education, a better foundation for the health of future generations.

Chevrolet Announces New Roofing Process

The first large commercial application of a new rust proofing process has been made by Chevrolet Motor Company with the installation of special equipment for the "chromizing" of fenders, running boards, and other sheet metal parts. The new process differs widely from others used in the automobile industry, in that the rust-proofing is accomplished as the parts pass on a conveyor through a series of spray booths, and the treatment, instead of forming a brittle coating over the surface, combines with the metal and changes it chemically to form a rust proof surface.

Numerous manufacturing advantages, and extra benefits to the car owner, are claimed for the new process, which was developed by the Chevrolet manufacturing department in conjunction with the laboratories of the American Chemical Paint Company, and tested by the General Motors research laboratories. Since the treatment of sheet metal is the last step before the enameling of the parts, the chromizing equipment is installed at the assembly plant rather than at the manufacturing plant, where the stampings are made. The new Baltimore assembly plant was the first of Chevrolet's ten plants in the United States to be equipped for the chromizing process. No announcement of the new process was made at the time, pending its adoption for use in all of the company's assembly plants. Fenders and other parts that are chromized exhibit a great resistance to not only rust, but to corrosion caused by salt and other chemicals used in the treatment of highways to control dust or to melt snow and ice. Severe accelerated tests, it is said, have indicated that the new process doubles the life of fenders. On account of the simplicity of the process, absolutely uniformity is as-

sured. The treated parts possess an absolutely smooth surface, since the rust proofing does not depend on material adhering to the surface, but on a change in the surface itself. Improved enameling results from the smoothness of the finish and the ease with which it takes and holds the enamel. The firm bond between the metal and the dust proofing is an important feature to the car owner, since it permits the repair of dented fenders without damaging the protective coating, which cannot flake off. The new process is used by Chevrolet on both the Master de Luxe and the Standard passenger cars and on trucks and commercial cars as well.

More Children Enter Camps Than in 1934

MINNEAPOLIS.—Many more American families were able to send their children to high grade summer camps in 1935 than in the previous year, boys' and girls' attendance at such institutions showing an average increase of 13 per cent over 1934 figures, according to a report just issued by Northwestern National Life Insurance Company. The summary covers 58 summer camps, 34 for boys and 24 for girls, widely distributed geographically, and charging an average rate of \$249. Of the 58 camps, 41 or 70 per cent reported increased attendance; only 7 experienced smaller attendance, while 8 report their registrations approximately unchanged since 1934. More aggressive advertising by camps last spring found a ready response from well-to-do parents; inquiries directed to camps and to camp information departments of newspapers and magazines in which the advertisements appeared, revealed a far greater number of families interested in the higher priced camps than in the past several

years. Eastern camps reported a striking and consistent improvement in attendance, with 36 camps in eleven eastern and south Atlantic states showing an average gain of 21 per cent in registrations over 1934. This compares with a 17 per cent gain for 1934 over 1933 shown by a similar group, and is considered the more remarkable because a number of the camps suffered cancellations this year on account of parents' worry over the infantile paralysis outbreak. Twenty-nine of the 36 camps showed substantial gain; only three reported decreases, and four were unchanged. Of 22 camps reporting from central, south central, and western states, 12 showed improved attendance over 1934, while only four reported decreases. Seventeen of the 58 camps reported changes in rates from the previous summer, of which 11 were increases and six were decreases. Few requests for rate concessions were met with in 1935, but higher costs, particularly of food, tended to offset greater attendance and camp directors report, reflecting a desire to see the settlement of personal business uncertainties before making commitments.
