

Memories shift again on this Armistice Day to events that happened in the city show above and the railway coach at the left events four years and four months apart, during which time nine million men died in the bloodiest war of all history. Charges of assault with intent to murder were filed in district court last week against Tom Cullins of San Angelo by T. E. Brandon of Midland.

Brandon alleges that Cullins assaulted him in a local hotel during fair week after the former had stepped from his room and asked that a disturbance be stopped. Brandon is in the oil business and lives at the hotel where the alleged assault took place.

It is alleged that Cullins hit Brandon over the head with a revolver and then viciously bit him.

Local officers arrested Cullins, jailed him and charged him with assault, drunkenness and disturbing the peace. He was later released after pleading gullty and paying a fine in justice court.

Cullins was arrested at San Angelo Saturday after Midland officers issued a warrant for his arrest on the charges made by Brandon.



Perhaps if we could see all those eight million we would be so eight million we would be so shocked, so profoundly moved in the very bottom of our hearts, that we would have the courage to redeem our forgotten pledge to them. We would have to watch for a long, long time to see their ranks pass by; all the soldiers who have fought in all our wars would not equal them in number. There is no way of making our imaginations comprehend what a tremendous army the army of World War dead really is.

Nor is there, either, any way of comprehending just how much unbelievable human suffering that war cost. The physical pain suffered by the fighting men, the heart-crushing anguish suffered by those they left behind, the long and pitiful misery visited upon Heaven knows how many millions of children whose homes were broken by the war, whose bodies were stunted by famine, whose lives were ruined by war-born chaos—there simply is not any way of totaling all that agony.

But we need to think about it, on Armistice Day above all other days. Until we actually do something in the way of making this a warless world, all that suffering and loss has gone for nothing—a mockery of every hope humanity ever had.

Until we find the courage to make that promise of a lasting peace and a better world something more than an empty phrase, we must be recorded as the ignoblest of all the earth's generations—a generation condemned by eight and one-half million dead men!

OFFICER IS SLAIN WHILE TRYING TO ARREST NEGRO

Assassin Shot Before Death Takes Vet Policeman

WOUND IS FATAL

One Charge from Shot Gun Snuffs Out Life

Funeral services for J. P. Wyrick, 51, night policeman of the City of Midland who was slain by a negro he had gone to arrest early Sunday

he had gone to arrest early Sunday morning, will be held this afternoon at 3:30 o'clock from the Ellis funeral home. The Rev. Winston F. Borum will officiate.

Wyrick, with E. B. Patterson, also a night officer, had been called to the 'flats' in southeast Midland to quell a disturbance reported to have been caused by a negro known as E. M. McMullen. He had engaged in a fight with another negro, beating him with a gun, reports said.

When the officers searched the "flats," they learned that McMullen had gone to his room in the servants' quarter of the George T. Abell home, 1505 West Illinois. They proceeded to the place, knocked at the door of the servants' house and McMullen called, "Come in, Mr.

As Wyrick and Patterson entered, McMullen'was covering the entrance with a shotgun. They fold him to drop his gun and he lowered the muzzle of it. Patterson walked around the wall, preparing to strike the negro from behind if necessary in order to disarm him without blooshed.

Several hours Saturday night. Early in the evening he had telephoned to Sheriff Francis saying he "had to take a shot at a guy while ago" and asking if anyone had been reported sking. If Francis had heard of no case of the kind at that time.

No one needs to look around the world very long today to see how tragically that hope has been dashed.


