YOUTH CAN STILL DO "BIG THINGS"

Ambitious youth seeking to find their places early in life in a maladjusted world will find encouragement if they will take a look into the pages of history. E. B. DeGroot, California Boy Scout executive, in the Rotarian Magazine tells of a few of the young men and women who have "done big things".

"William Pitt", Mr. DeGroot cites as his first example, "filled the responsible post of Chancellor of the Exchequer at 23 and served as Prime Minister of Great Britain at 24. George Washington was only 23 when he led the Virginia troops against the Indians and French. Abraham Lincoln campaigned for public office at 24. Robert Louis Stevenson wrote 'Treasure Island' at 23. Galois at 19 proved that equations higher than the fifth order could not be solved algebraically, and thereby advanced the theory of groups for the solution of higher equations.

"Westinghouse," he continues, "invented the air brake at 23. Alexander the Great conquered and ruled the world before he was 30. Sir Isaac Newton at 24 formulated the law of gravitation. Whitney was not more than 29 when he invented the cotton gin. Charles Dickens wrote 'Oliver Twist' at 25. Napoleon at 27 was in command of the Italian army. Patrick Henry was but 27 when he made his conquering and historic speech against the Stamp Act. Thomas Edison was not far above the Youth Service age level designated by Rotary (24 years), when he astounded and benefited mankind with many of his inventions.

"Paul Siple, an Eagle Scout, was only 20 when he qualified for an important post on the first expedition of Admiral Byrd to the Antarctic regions, and he was chief biologist on the second Byrd Expedition. The average age of the members of America's Continental Congress was 35. Two of its members, at least, were under 30—Edward Rutledge, 25, and John Jay, 29.

"Lindbergh immortalized himself at 25; moreover the best out of 500 poems on the Lindbergh flight across the Atlantic in 1927 was written by Nathalia Crane, a 14 year old girl of Brooklyn, New York. And so on, almost without end could we record the achievements and services of youth in the fields of statesmanship, literature, science, education, invention, and courage."

Even the Arrival of Colonel Lindbergh Failed to Overshadow the Glamour of Will Rogers Before Mexico City, Group

Will Rogers was just as amusing at the breakfast table as he was on the stage, in the evening, according to Mrs. Elizabeth Morrow, widow of the former Ambassador to Mexico, the late Dwight Morrow, and mother of Ann Morrow Lindbergh, who recalls a visit Rogers made as their guest at the American Embassy in Mexico City for a short time in December, 1927.

"He was amusing and full of shrewd knowledge of human life at the breakfast table as he ever was on the stage, but one speech made under difficulties during his Mexican visit stands out vividly in my memory," relates Mrs. Morrow. "Dinner had been planned in his honor at the University City for the evening of December 14th. I believe it was known when the arrangements were made that the 14th was the date of Colonel Lindbergh's arrival in Mexico City. In any case no one thought of anything but Colonel Lindbergh and his flight that day. All Mexico waited for him in the morning until three in the afternoon when he landed at Valbuena Field amidst terrific excitement. The date of the Lindbergh flight was well known. I forgot the University Club dinner entirely until my secretary recalled it to my mind, and many guests were very late that night at the Club because, like me, they had to be reminded of the occasion.

"As I dressed I remembered feeling very sorry for Will Rogers. It seemed to me impossible that he could make any impression on a group of people who were so absorbed with the excitement of the day. I thought that it would be a humiliating and hard occasion for him. When he rose to speak I was distinctly nervous for him. It was a waste of pity. From his first sentence he held the whole room in the hollow of his hand. I had entirely underestimated his powers and his understanding of an audience. He shocked, flattered, cajoled, teased, tormented and enchanted the guests. He began by reminding us that we were in a University Club and said that he questioned the qualifications of many present for membership in a college group. 'Where is your sheepskin?' he asked suddenly pointing to a well known gaffer near him. 'You brought your score card at the Churubusco Club and they let you in. And where is yours?' his finger singled out a marvelous bridge player in the audience. I know you can play bridge, but you never learned that at college." He went up and down the long table calling men after man by name and giving him credit for something he could do, —horse-racing, polo, dancing, but

Fed. Transportation Official To Speak In Houston November 11

AUSTIN, Nov. 11. (Sp.)—Joseph B. Eastman, federal coordinator of transportation, will speak on the recently enacted federated truck law and coordination of transportation at Houston on Monday, November 11, to a meeting of shippers and truck operators.

Mr. Eastman, crossing the country, has agreed to stop in Houston enroute and address this meeting, according to telegram from P. G. Dorsey, Houston president of Texas Motor Transportation association, from Washington.

"Shippers and truckers alike throughout the east feel that the instrument for stabilizing the motor transportation industry has been placed in the hands of the Interstate Commerce commission," said Dr. Dorsey. "Mr. Eastman's route makes it impossible for him to be at any more centrally located point in the state."

The federal motor carrier law, which became effective October 25, places under Interstate Commerce commission control the granting of certificates, fixing of rates, etc., on all trucks operated for-hire in interstate commerce. The coordinator is also a member of the I. C. C. "Business men distributing by their own trucks will be as much

RECORD YEAR DISASTERS for Red Cross Relief Given in 128 Catastrophes-Unusual and Varied Freaks of Nature and Other Calamities visit distress on Nation-People aided through Your Membership in Red Cross. Little girl who was orphaned in the Republican river flood in Nebraska and was cared for by Red Cross, which aided many hundreds in three states affected. High winds destroyed many homes in North Carolina. Here, at left, where home stood. At right, home rebuilt by Red Cross. Fifty tornadoes in U. S. called for Red Cross help during year. Epidemics of bronchial troubles followed devastating clouds of dust in midwest. Red Cross established hospitals for victims. Here are little patients and Red Cross nurses. Five other epidemics came under Red Cross care during the year. Families marooned in Mississippi valley floods were taken from rooftops by Red Cross rescuers. During the year the Red Cross gave disaster relief to 110,000 persons in 37 states. This little girl arrived during the New York floods—Red Cross provided hospital care for mother and baby.

GROUP URGES BIG 'CLEAN-UP'

"We believe Texas should begin at once to clean up for the Centennial," said R. B. Stanford, chairman of the public health committee of the Texas planning board. "Every county, city, and community should make plans now and get a thorough clean-up under way. Cut the weeds and grass; get rid of all trash and stagnant water. This procedure will not only serve to improve the appearance of our cities, but it will also do much toward the elimination of mosquitoes."

"The Texas planning board's public health committee is very much interested in the safety of the various water supplies throughout the state and has suggested that all supplies of drinking water which have been tested and found to be absolutely safe should be placarded so that the tourist will know that the water is safe."

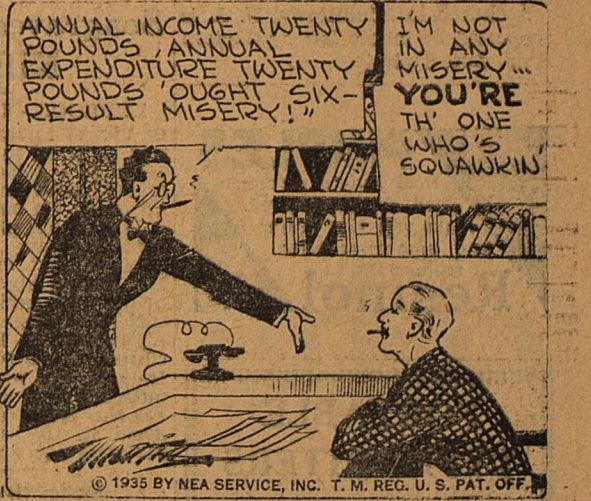
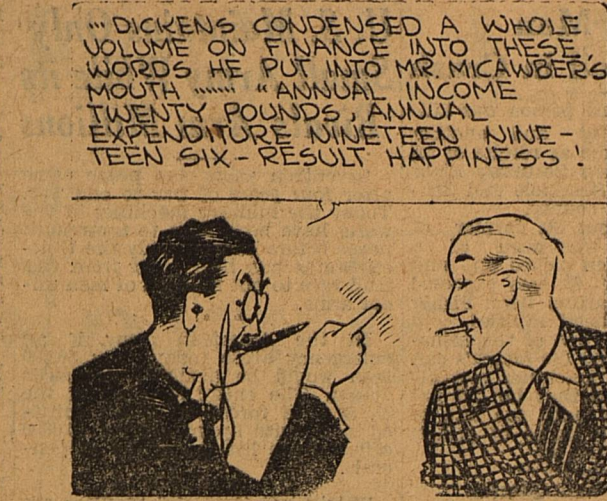
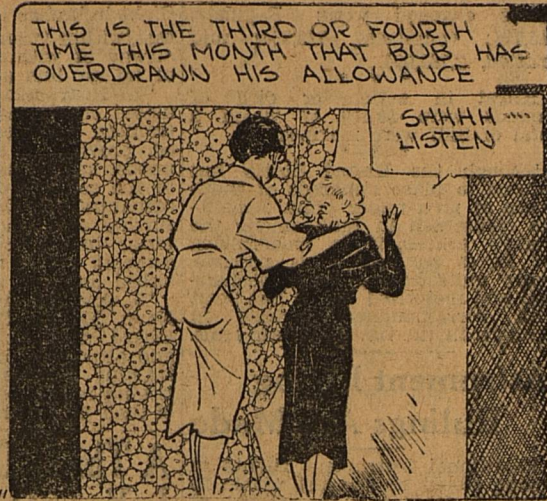

U. S. Maintains Only Small Army While its Rivals Arm Millions

Seventeen years ago peace came after four years of war to end war. Today the military machines of the world have been built to a strength never before known.

In the American army, if an emergency arose today, only 30,000 men would be available for swift action.

Sextet Becomes Quartet PITTSFIELD, Mass. (U.P.)—The sextet that was to sing at a meeting of American Revolutionaries made an appearance as a quartet.

Thirty-two thousand regulars are in our foreign possessions, 86,000 in continental United States.

Of this 86,000, about 36,000 are engaged in various kinds of clerical and educational tasks.

The cost of the U. S. army in 1935 is given as \$295,900,000. In 1936, a little more will be spent for military purposes—\$365,000,000, or a million dollars a day.

Reserve forces, army chiefs estimate, would provide about 2,000,000 men in two years.

forces engaged were: Regulars, 545,773; volunteers, 728,234; and drafted, 2,783,094.

Killed in action or died of wounds were 50,510, of which a total of 2457 were marines.

Though the United States has refused to place hundreds of thousands of men under arms, remaining eighteenth in rank among the world's armies, it is modernizing its forces as rapidly as possible.

Instrument Flying Rulings Are Made

Intentional instrument flights in broken clouds or overcast within 25 miles of an airway, or within 25 miles of an air line airport may be made only by airline aircraft, pilots and operators were notified today by the Bureau of Air Commerce.

An intentional instrument flight is one in which the pilot takes off knowing that he will have to rely upon instruments and radio before reaching his destination.

Text of the notice to pilots and operators follows: "Notice to all Pilots and Operators: "1. As a precautionary measure and until the present tentative proposed regulations now under consideration are approved for the governing of airway traffic control and airport traffic control, no pilot will make an intentional instrument

flight in broken clouds or solid overcast within twenty-five miles of an airway of within twenty-five miles of an air line airport.

Instrument flying under simulated conditions (under hood) for training purposes may be conducted, provided a safety pilot having unobstructed vision and with access to the controls of the aircraft accompanies the flight, and provided further that such flight does not enter broken cloud formation or overcast within the foregoing prescribed limits of airports or airways.
