JURY SELECTION STARTS IN TRIAL EDGAR ESKRIDGE

"Pistol Toting" Ex-Minister Is Up For Murder

DEATH IS ASKED Insanity Plea Will Be Made by the Defense

HOUSTON, Nov. 18. (AP)—The prosecution and defense announced ready today for the murder trial of Rev. Edgar Eskridge, vice-crusading former pastor of the First Baptist church of Orange.

Selection of the jury was started this morning. Eskridge is on trial for the killing of Police Chief Ed J. O'Reilly, of Orange. The defense will plead insanity.

HOUSTON, Nov. 18. (AP)—Selection of a jury for the murder trial of Rev. Edgar Eskridge, "pistol-toting" former pastor of the First Baptist Church at Orange, is scheduled to begin here tomorrow.

The prosecution announced that it was ready to begin introduction of testimony on which it hopes to send the swaggering minister to the electric chair. The defense likewise was ready with its insanity testimony.

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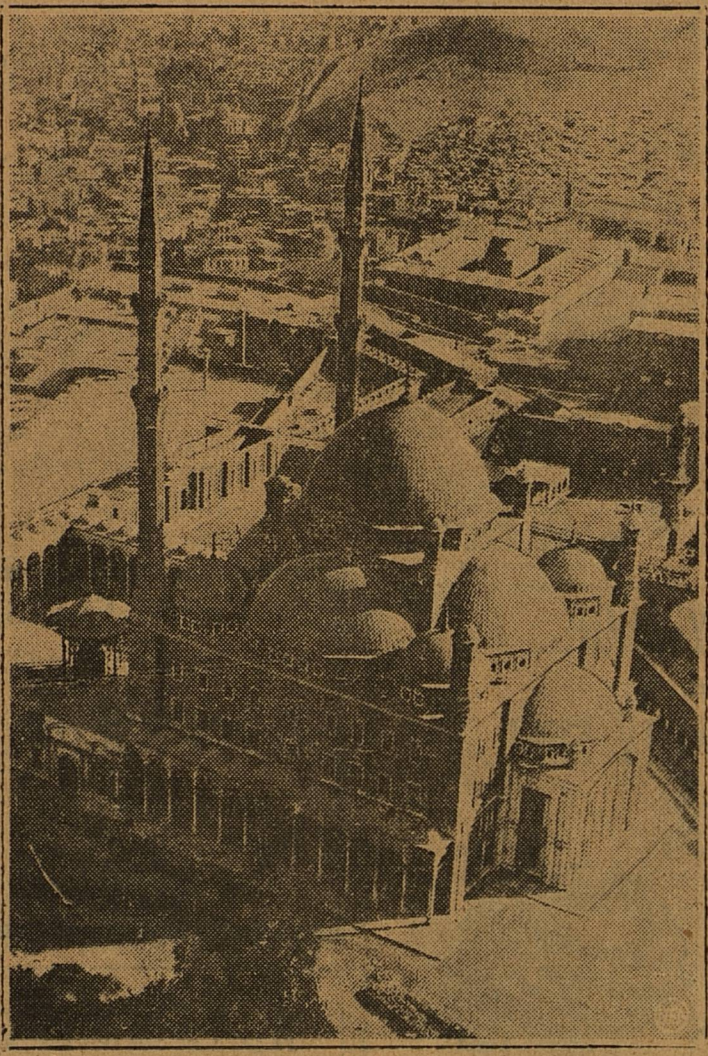

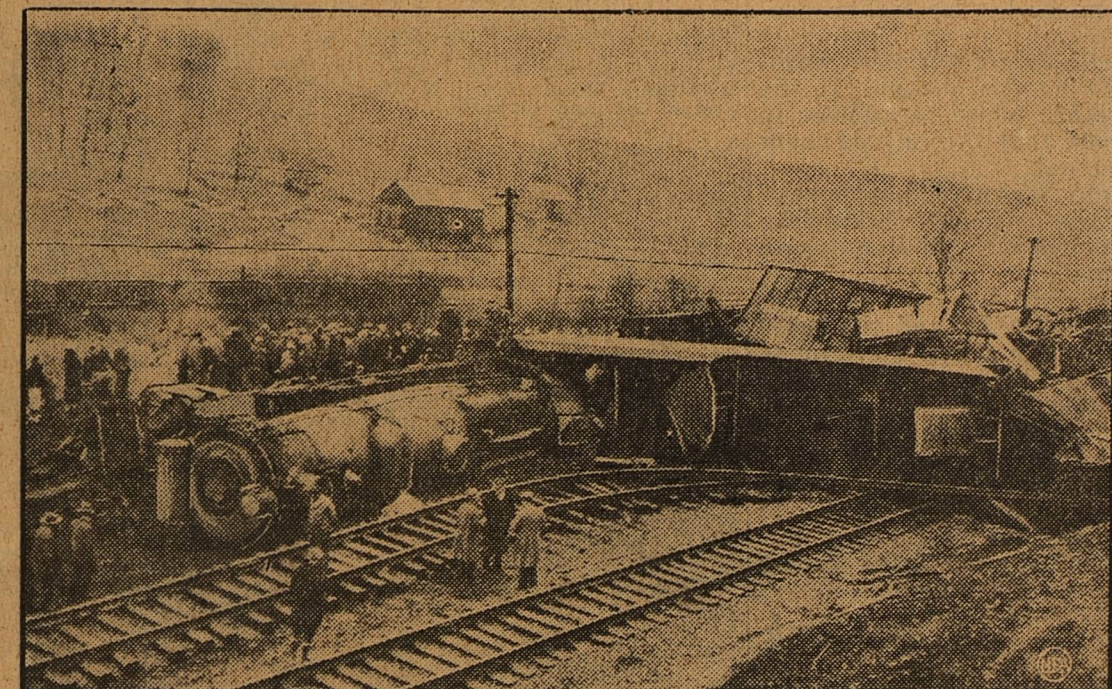
ELDERO MAN IS HUNTING VICTIM

12 INJURED WHEN TRAIN WRECKED AT JEWETT SUNDAY

None Are Seriously Hurt as 4 Cars Overturn

PALESTINE, Texas, Nov. 18. (AP)—At least a dozen persons were injured, none seriously, when Missouri Pacific passenger train No. 8, north bound, was wrecked near Jewett early today.

Three chair cars and a sleeper left the rails and overturned, startling sleeping passengers and inflicting minor injuries.

WORK STARTED ON SETTING UP OF NEW LAW ORGANIZATION

Package Sale Law to Be Put Into Force

ISSUE LICENSES First Signed Permits Are Expected Today

AUSTIN, Nov. 18. (AP)—The Texas Liquor Control board today appointed Charles R. Miller, 50, former of Electra and Taylor, as its administrator.

Miller and the board immediately started conferences to set up the organization to begin operation of the package sale law.

The new administrator said that the first licenses would probably be issued sometime today.

Miller has been second secretary on Governor Allred's staff. Allred said that George Clarke, Austin, already on the staff, would get Miller's former position.

In 1931, Miller was chief of law enforcement in the Attorney General's department under Allred. His new salary is undetermined.

Work Is Started On Two Year Corn-Hog Program In States

COLLEGE STATION.—Work has been started on the contract for the new two year adjustment program for corn and hogs, following conferences in Washington of producers, state agricultural specialists, and AAA officials on fundamental details.

"Since a major adjustment problem is to prevent an excessive production of hogs in 1937, a contract of more than one year's duration is necessary," it was pointed out by Hoolgreen.

The main objective of the new program will be to maintain a balance between the production and consumption of corn and hogs during the next two years.

To accomplish this objective, it will be necessary to prevent an excessive production of corn in 1936 and 1937, allow an increase in next year's pig crop that would be at least as great as it is estimated would take place were no adjustment program in effect, and prevent an excessive increase in the 1937 pig crop.

The Adjustment Administration has recommended that corn production next year be limited to 95 million acres, or about 10 million fewer acres than would be likely without adjustment.

Proposed hog adjustments are calculated to provide for a 30 per cent increase in Federally inspected slaughter in 1936-1937 above the slaughter expected in the present marketing year which began October 1, 1935. It is believed that a permit hog production equal to 100 per cent of the base will allow for the desired increase in hog numbers next year.

Texas Pecan History Centennial Feature

SAN SABA, Texas, Nov. 18.—San Saba will be the scene of the 1936 Texas Pecan Growers Association, and as a special feature a history of the pecan industry in Texas is being prepared, which will later be sent to the Central Exposition at Dallas along with prize-winning pecans.

Mrs. Neta Cantrell, of Bend, natural historian, has been appointed to compile the information. Her appointment was announced recently by W. A. Smith, the association's president and editor of the San Saba News.

Mrs. Cantrell is seeking the cooperation of Texas pecan growers in the contribution of all available data on this interesting subject.

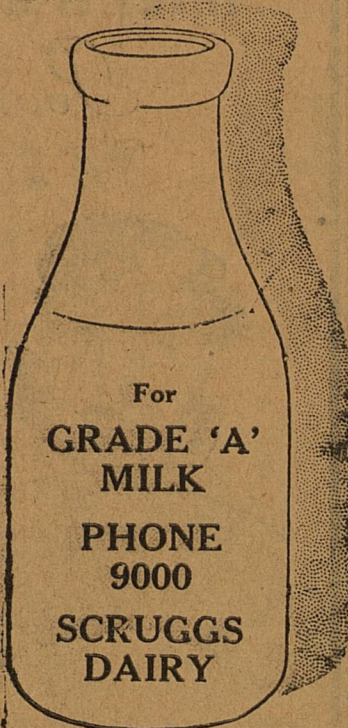

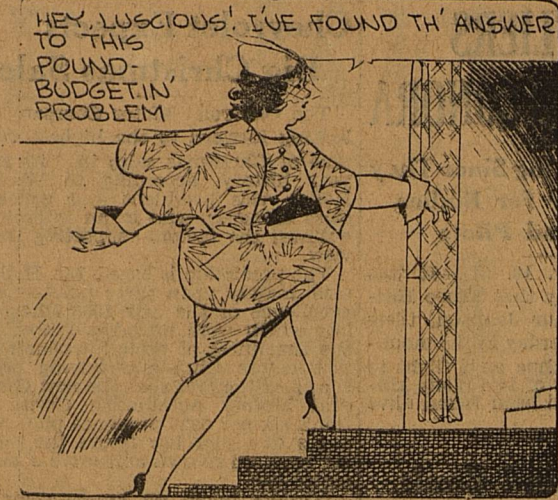

\$1,500 in Prizes Are Offered School Kids For County Histories

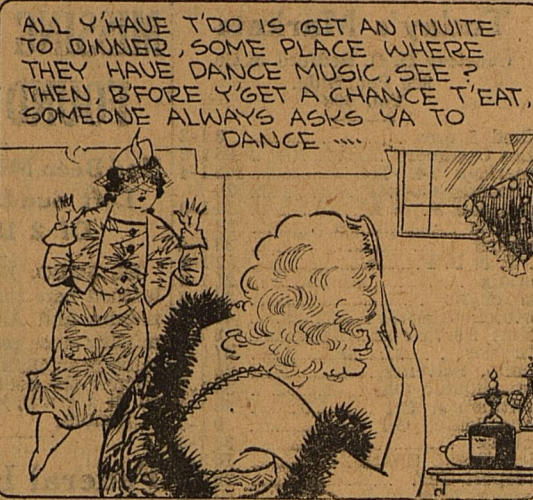
AUSTIN, Nov. 7. — Prizes totaling
\$1,500 have been offered to the
school children of Texas by Lieuten-
ant-Governor Walker F. Woodul for
the sixteen best historical essays
written on subjects drawn from
county histories. Winners of first
place in each of four divisions will
receive \$200 each; second place, \$100
each; third place, \$50 each, and
fourth place, \$25 each. Divisions in
which these prizes will be awarded
are rural ward school, rural high
school, independent district ward
school, and independent district
ward school, and independent district
high school.

All essays are to originate in the
history and English classes of the
schools, and must not be more than
500 words in length. The first con-
tests will be within the schools in
order that the judges who select the
county winners will have only a re-
latively small number of manuscripts
to handle. The Centennial Advisory
Boards in each county will handle
the county contests, and only one
essay in each division, first place
winner, will be sent to the state fi-
nals.
State awards will be announced
after May 1, 1936.
Details of this contest are being
handled in Dallas in the public
school division, Mrs. Elthe Ham-
ilton Beal, director, of the State De-
partment of Publicity for the Texas
Centennial celebrations, and com-
plete instructions and rules for this
contest will be mailed to all schools
in the state within a short time.

MISSING FLIERS FOUND IN SONORA
Had Been Missing Since They Left Sunday for Bodies Of 2 Dead Pilots

EL PASO, Nov. 18. (AP)—It was learned here today that Eliseo Hernandez and Arthur Johnson, fliers missing since yesterday in the mountains near Chihuahua on a flight to recover the bodies of two pilots killed in a crash, had been found alive in Sonora.

Federal Land Bank To Continue Service

Improvement in farm conditions and gradual lessening of the need of emergency credit agencies will not affect the continued services of the Federal Land Bank of Houston and the other permanent institutions of the Farm Credit Administration of Houston, according to A. C. Williams, General Agent. "During the emergency brought about by the depression," Mr. Williams said, "the government supplied a large part of the capital necessary to conduct emergency lending operations. The permanent units of the Farm Credit Administration are basically cooperative institutions and government capital is being paid back as rapidly as possible." "When private creditors," he continued, "largely withdrew credit from agriculture during the depression, farmers all over Texas learned the need of a permanent and dependable system of credit which would be available in times of stress as well as in good times in which the farmer himself would have a direct interest."

Mr. Williams pointed out that the Federal Land Bank of Houston helps to meet the emergency by extending to farmers and stockmen, through national farm loan associations more than \$106,000,000 in long term farm mortgage loans in twelve months.

The stabilizing effect of this credit, much of which refinanced existing indebtedness, helped to bring about a recovery of agriculture, he said. The Production Credit Associations now are pointing the way toward similar recovery in the short term credit field.

In two years the cooperative credit institutions under the Farm Credit Administration; the Federal Land Bank, the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank, the Production Credit Corporation, and the Bank for Cooperatives, have been built up to take a leading part in providing farmers and stockmen with sound and adequate credit suited to their needs," Mr. Williams continued, "and I do not believe that farmers again will be willing to depend entirely upon the old sources of credit."

Production Credit Associations do not lend government money, but obtain funds from the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank, which, in turn, gets the money through the sale of debentures to the investing public. Every borrower through a national farm loan association, production credit association, or the Bank for Cooperatives, owns voting stock in the lending institution and has a voice in the selection of directors both for the local association and for the district.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston now is making new loans through national farm loan associations at the all-time low interest rate of 4% a year and production credit associations are making loans at 5% a year.

Eligibility Rules For YWA Jobs Cited

AUSTIN.—Ten thousand part-time jobs are ready for Texas youth, J. C. Kellam, assistant director of the National Youth Administration, announced today.

In order to be eligible for these jobs on WPA and NYA projects, Kellam said, boys and girls must be between 16 and 25 years old, must come from families certified as eligible for work on WPA projects, and must register with the National Re-employment Service. This registration is required solely because all assignments for work are made by the NRS.

"Boys and girls now enrolled in school are urged to continue their school work and not drop out to accept the part-time jobs offered through the NYA," Kellam said. "Education is as much a part of the NYA program as work-relief. These jobs have been provided only to care for youths who have finished school or need or desire no further education."

Youths employed on WPA projects will work 46 hours a month. The WPA authorities have announced youths may be worked on consecutive days each 15-day period, thus enabling them to complete the maximum 23 hours each period in as few days as possible. For example, a youth working on a Harris county WPA or NYA project, will report for work Monday morning and work each day thereafter until he has worked 23 hours. He will not report again for the job until the second 15-day period, at which time he will repeat the process.

His pay, Kellam said, in Harris county, will be \$1.82 a 7-hour day. Wages are based on the security wage scale of the WPA.

Youths are classified as unskilled, intermediate, skilled, and professional workers. Pay grades upward according to their classification.


