HURT BY CONVICT IN ALABAMA BREAK

ATMORE, Ala., Sept. 26. (P).—A warden of the state prison farm near here was critically wounded early Wednesday night by three desperate white convicts who escaped shortly after noon by overpowering a guard and forcing 13 other convicts to flee with them.

Warden Oscar Dees, in charge of track dogs, was shot in the woods several miles from here early last night as he drew close to the trio, Ralph McCluskey, Albert Elder and Raymond Jefferies, after track dogs had taken up the trail. He was taken to a hospital in Century, Ala., where his condition was considered critical.

A posse of guards, Escambia county officers and citizens was believed early last night to have the fleeing trio surrounded in a swamp several miles from the prison, determined to take them "dead or alive."

Two machine guns from Kilby prison were brought here to aid the possemen in the siege.

The abducted guard, William O'Brien and the 13 convicts forced to flee with the desperate trio returned to prison late yesterday and reported the escape.

Dees had brought track dogs from Kilby prison to take up the trail after the break was reported. Warden Frank Boswell of Kilby prison, who accompanied him, said Dees had sighted McCluskey and as he started to dismount his horse was shot. The bullet struck him in the abdomen.

AGGRESSOR NATION BEFORE DECEMBER WILL LOSE STATUS

Council Decides to Draft Report For Peace

By ASSOCIATED PRESS The League of Nations council today warned Italy and Ethiopia that any hostilities before December fourth would put the aggressor nation in the status of committing an

The report would be drafted under article 15 of the League covenant, which was voted as beginning last September fourth. After three months, hostilities can begin without disregarding the covenant.

Any violations of the recommendations would bring sanctions on the violator nation.

The council asked the Italo-Ethiopian committee to continue to take advantage of any conciliation opportunity.
