FOR QUICK SETTLEMENT

Senator Norris' proposal for a constitutional amendment to prevent five-to-four decisions by the U.S. Supreme Court on constitutional questions will provoke a great deal of debate, certainly; but there is one part of his plan which should meet wide acceptance, and that is his scheme for giving the supreme court original and exclusive jurisdiction in all lawsuits involving constitutional

As things are now, if you wish to test the constitutionality of a law, you file suit in any federal district court. If that court feels the law to be unconstitutional, it can restrain enforcement of the law. and many months may elapse before the question finally reaches the supreme court.

Senator Norris would have the issue taken directly to the supreme court, without all these intervening steps, and his idea looks sensible. It might, in fact, be even more sensible to have the court decide on a law's constitutionality the moment it is passed, before any attempt at enforcement is made. Failing that, the Norris plan is at least a step in the right direction.

Tips Out for Those Visiting in Mexico

LAREDO. (A).—American tourists o Mexico no longer will have to obtain bonds for their cars, hire guides and give "tips" as all that has been abolished by the Mexican congress.

In place of the bonds and guides the Mexican immigration service will arrange for everything for the

will arrange for everything for the tourist entering Mexico and only the customary tourist card charge will be made.

The new law, about to be put into effect, also permits residents of Nuevo Laredo, Mexico, and other Mexican towns and cities on the Mexican side of the boundary line to buy an automobile in the United States and take it into Mexico without the payments of duty provided such residents live within twenty kilometers of the border and will keep the car there. Should such a resident desire to take the car outside the limit permitted duty free he would have to pay the regular duties or obtain a 90 day permit.

The new regulations are expected to stimulate tourist travel into Mexico and save tourists much unnessary expense.
