Gymnasium Building Bids Are Asked

Local Option Election is Called

PRECINCT TO VOTE LIQUOR QUESTION ON DECEMBER 7TH

Petition Is Presented
Commissioners
Monday
198 DEMAND VOTE
Legal Liquor for
Precinct One Is
To Be Voted

County commissioners met yesterday at the court house and adopted a resolution calling for a local option election for Precinct One, December 7, on whether or not all legal liquors are to be sold in the Precinct One.

A petition bearing 189 names of qualified voters of the county was presented to the commissioners before the meeting and it was immediately decided to call the election.

Precinct Four, Warfield, is the only wet district in the county.

A copy of the commissioners' order follows:

"On this the 25th day of November, A. D. 1935, the Commissioners of Midland County, Texas, being in session, came on to the present of a petition bearing One Hundred and Ninety-eight (198) signatures, the same being qualified voters of Justice Precinct No. One, Midland County, Texas, the same being more than ten percent (10%) of the qualified voters of said Precinct No. One, taking the vote for governor at the last preceding general election as the basis or determining the same, which qualified voters petition this Court to call an election to determine whether or not the sale of all liquors shall be legal in Justice Precinct No. One, Midland County, Texas, and it appearing to the Commissioners Court of Midland County, Texas, that said petition is properly prepared, presented and signed by a sufficient number (See ELECTION, page 4)

Lasso Is Weapon in Mexican Riot

Revolutionist Plan in Brazil Thwarted Today

Attempt to Enlist Cavalry Regiment Halted With Officer's Arrest

RIO DE JANEIRO, Nov. 26, (P)—An alleged plot to enlist the first cavalry regiment, quartered here, in the communist rebellion in this country was thwarted today as the revolt dead stood at about 60 men. Lieutenant Fontoura was arrested and charged with attempting to induct the cavalry unit to revolt. After nearly a day of fighting in the state of Pernambuco, insurgents were driven back toward Socorro, military garrison of Recife, and about 60 killed and 100 wounded. Rebels are still holding Natal, Macayaba, and the jails here are filled with extremist suspects. All of Brazil has been declared in a state of siege by President Vargas and the entire country is under martial law. Planes, warships and troops are being used in an effort to quell the bloody riots in the northern part of the country. Troops are being rushed to Natal to attempt to wrest the important seaport from the hands of the communists. A state of siege amounts to virtual martial law, Vargas said the plot was not confined to the states of Pernambuco and Rio Grande do Norte but also embraced the 18 other states of the nation. "There is proof of the intention to implant a communist regime," he asserted. Reports were circulated in Rio de Janeiro that socialists expected the small state of Ceara, lying immediately north of Rio Grande do Norte to join the northeastern uprising. Facts in possession of the government were alleged to have disclosed a widely ramified socialist movement designed to grip all Brazil within three months.

COURT RULING NOT TO HALT FARMERS' FIGHT AUTONOMY

BENEFIT CHECKS

Miller's Injunction Is Not to Affect Payments

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26, (P)—Soon after the Supreme court had granted eight Louisiana rice millers a temporary injunction against the collection of processing taxes Monday, the government announced that benefit checks to farmers would continue regardless of the outcome of the rice tax cases. By this high court's order granting the injunction petition of the rice millers, they will continue to pay processing taxes. But instead of going to the treasury the taxes will be paid into a court appointed depository for holding until the constitutional question is decided. M. G. White, solicitor of the agriculture department, said there was no significance attached to the injunction "insofar as the constitutionality of the AAA was concerned."

Four Landings Are Reported at Field

Four landings were made by ships at Sloan Field up to 2 o'clock this afternoon, officials reported. Two navy fighter land planes arrived at one o'clock from El Paso and departed at 2 o'clock for Dallas, under command of Lieut. Lambert. A navy observation land plane in command of Lieut. Commander Osterander arrived this morning from Abilene, leaving for El Paso. The fourth landing was made by Lieut. Burton, flying a coast guard amphibian. He arrived at 1:30 o'clock from Tucson, Ariz. Capt. Fredricks, who left Fort Sill at noon, flying an O-25, is expected to arrive this afternoon.

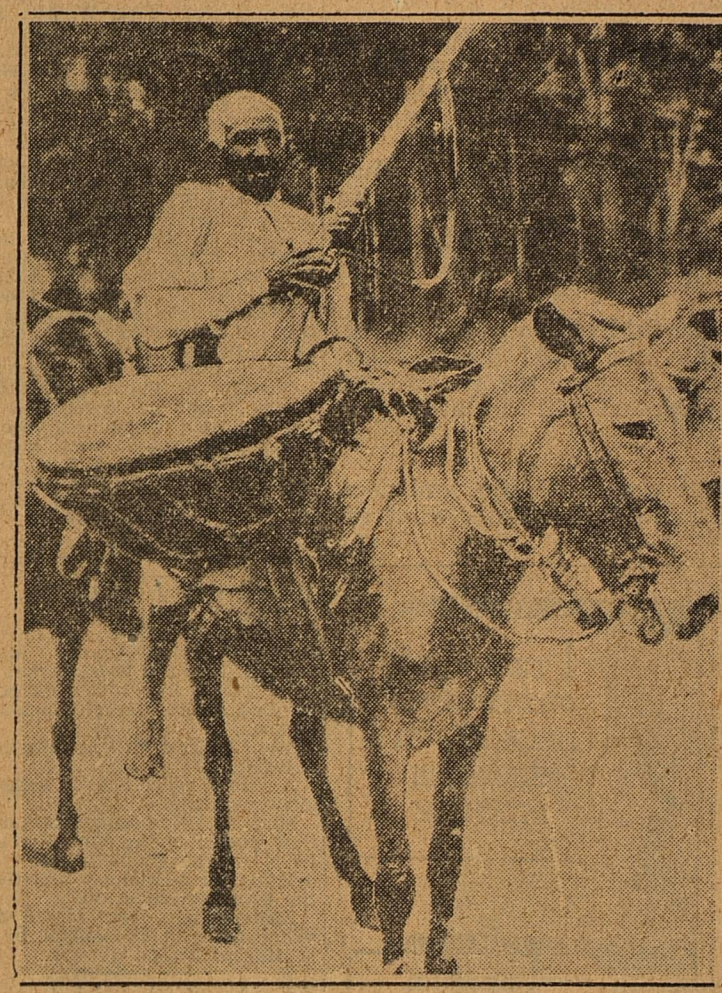

NEW KIDNAPING EVIDENCE SAID FOUND IN MASS.

BOSTON, Nov. 26, (P)—Wood believed identical to that of the Lindbergh kidnap leader and handwriting resembling that in the ransom notes plus bills which may be part of the ransom money, has been discovered in Massachusetts, the Boston Globe said today in a copyright story. It was said in Boston that Ashby, Massachusetts, was the focal point for a fresh inquiry by Hauptmann's investigators. It was said that the Hauptmann defense is keeping the details as secret as possible.

Shot-Torn Bodies of 2 Texans Are Found

HAMILTON, Nov. 26, (P)—The shot-torn bodies of W. T. Blackwell, 30, and C. O. Gann, 60, were found in the Gann home seven miles north of here where the men "batched" while Mrs. Gann was gone on a visit. Officers were inclined to believe that a third person was involved. They did not think it was a cause of slaying and suicide.

To Honor Pioneers At Oil Exposition

TLUSA, Okla. (Special)—Honor will be paid to the pioneers of the petroleum industry at the ninth International Petroleum Exposition in Tulsa, May 16 to 23, 1936 according to W. G. Skelly, president. An old timers committee is being formed, a special program planned and a club room made in the replica of the old Drake well on the grounds. The Drake well, the first drilled for oil in the United States, came in as a producer in 1859. "A medal will be awarded to the 'Grand Old Man of the Oil Industry' who will be selected from among the pioneers still living and who by the dint of their labors made possible the 12 billion dollar industry," said Skelly. This medal has been awarded at the last five expositions and the pioneers receiving the honor have been: in 1927, J. Alex Stephenson, Tulsa; 1928, James Amm, New York City; 1929, John C. Looker, Bradford, Pa.; 1930, E. H. Sloan, Pittsboro, Pa.; and in 1934, N. V. V. Franchot, Oleans, N. Y.

LEGAL PWA FORM IS RECEIVED FROM THE ARCHITECTS

Bids to Be Opened On December 12; To Trustees \$70,000 IS READY Five Per Cent of Bid Must Be Posted By Bidder

Advertisements for bids for a gymnasium building for the Midland Independent School District No. 1 will be published Wednesday, following receipt of the legal PWA form from Peters, Strange & Co., architects.

Bids will be opened at 2 o'clock on the afternoon of December 12, addressed to the board of trustees of the school district. Plans, specifications and instructions to bidders may be had from the office of the superintendent of schools here.

Approximately \$70,000 is available for construction of the gymnasium, the order states. The successful bidder will be required to enter a contract with the school district, complying with requirements of the federal emergency administration of public works.

A cashier's or certified check of five per cent of the bid must be posted by the bidder and a performance bond of not less than 100 per cent of the contract price will be required.

The notice to bidders specifies that not less than the prevailing rates of wages as established by the school district, and approved by the state PWA director must be paid on the project. The scale calls for \$1.00 per hour for skilled workers, 45 to 80 cents per hour for semi-skilled and 30 to 40 cents for unskilled. Clerical employees will receive 40 cents per hour when working less than 30 hours per week, or \$12.00 weekly if working 30 to 40 hours.

The school district may reject any or all bids received after 60 days in which to accept. No bidder may withdraw his bid after 30 days from the date of opening the proposals.

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ORIGINAL INTENT REMAINS

Mussolini's withdrawal of one division of troops from the frontier between Libya and Egypt should help ease the tension between Italy and England, and the current reports that England will reciprocate by withdrawing two or three battalions from the Mediterranean would ease it still further. But it would be foolish to suppose that a real solution of the problem can come through any such simple moves as these.

Basically, the tension is caused by the fact that Mussolini's plans for building up an African empire clash with England's plans for protecting the empire she has already obtained. Unless there is a fundamental modification of aims by one side or the other, the situation will remain dangerous.

If Mussolini, for instance, should radically modify his plans for conquest of Ethiopia, we could see daylight ahead. Until some such things happen, the recall of a division here or a battleship there will do little real good.

How to Pick Out Turkey That's Fit For Traditional Thanksgiving Gobbling

Here's something in the way of Thanksgiving news to upset you if your order for turkey isn't already in. The noble national bird is scarcer this year than last! The U. S. Department of Agriculture says so and must know because it made a survey. The 1935 drought is partly to blame—but if you order now you will probably find no lack.

A turkey to be in its prime should be of last spring's hatching. This means that it's from six to eight months old, has grown fast and will be tender and delicious when roasted.

Most city markets offer a choice of milk-fed or corn-fed stock. A milk-fed turkey is considered the finest grade. This means that the bird has had a diet of ground grain and buttermilk or of powdered whole milk. The flesh is white with clear white fat over the breast and with a distribution of fat throughout the muscles.

Corn-Fed Stock Not So Tender
 Corn-fed stock has a rich yellow appearance with layers of yellow fat under the skin. The flesh is coarser and not as white and tender as the milk-fed bird.

The general condition of the flesh should be firm, the cartilage at the rear end of the breast bone soft and pliable, the breast itself broad and plump, the neck short, the drumsticks dark colored and smooth and the skin covering the entire bird smooth, fair and unbroken.

The bird which has been dry pickled may have a skin with a slightly shriveled appearance. The scalding necessary to wet pickling has a tendency to make the turkey plump and round with a tightly stretched skin.

Dark spots and blotches appearing over the skin indicate that the bird was not properly bled after being killed. This spoils the appearance and means that the turkey will not keep as well.

Your butcher will dress the turkey for you. This means he will draw it, discarding everything except the heart, liver and gizzard. These he usually drops loosely back inside the turkey. If the gizzard is not opened make a gash with a sharp knife through the thickest part down to the sack, taking care not to cut the sack. Discard the sack. Put giblets—liver, heart and gizzard—in a bowl of cold water and let stand an hour or two.

You will have to singe the turkey. This means holding it over a flame, turning it from side to side so that the tiny hairs left on the skin after picking all are singed off. Look for any pin-feathers that may have escaped plucking. If the tail of the turkey is a tiny oil sack. This must be carefully cut away.

Scrape With Blunt Edge of Knife
 Rib the turkey and scrub it well with salt. Then thoroughly wash it with cold water until every trace of salt is gone. Scrape the outside of the turkey with the blunt edge of a case knife, keeping the bird under water and taking care not to break the skin. Drain thoroughly and keep on ice until ready to stuff and truss.

The turkey is trussed after he is stuffed. To truss, first draw the thighs close to the body and hold them by inserting a long skewer under the middle joint, running it through the body and out through the other side. Fasten to tail. Second, place wings close to the body with tips pushed over first joint, making triangles on the sides of the turkey. Hold them with a second skewer forced through wings and body. Draw the neck skin under the back and sew with a soft cord.

Next, take the cord holding the drumsticks to the tail, cross and draw it back and forth under each end of long skewer.

Now cross string again and draw it up and around in end of the upper skewer. The string securely in a knot and cut off end.

The stuffing and trussing should be done the day before Thanksgiving. Then keep bird in the refrigerator until wanted for roasting.
