

Mussolini's withdrawal of one division of troops from the frontier between Libya and Egypt should help ease the tension between Italy and England, and the current reports that England will reciprocate by withdrawing two or three battleships from the Mediterranean would ease it still further. But it would be foolish to suppose that a real solution of the problem can come through any such simple moves as these. Basically, the tension is caused by the fact that Mus-solini's plans for protecting the empire she has already obtained. Unless there is a fundamental modification of aims by one side or the other, the situation will remain dangerous. If Mussolini, for instance, should radically modify his plans for conquest of Ethiopia, we could see daylight ahead.
