CHICAGO, Dec. 9, (A)—President Roosevelt today declared before the American farm bureau federation that "political profiteers" are seeking to stir up the city people in opposition to the farm rogram.



THE DISHONORED DEAD

The anti-Semitism of the Hitler government is an ugly thing, even when viewed in its most favorable light; but it has never appeared meaner than it does in the recent order sent out by Paul Joseph Goebbels, minister of public enlightenment, that the names of all Jews killed in the World War must be removed from the rolls of honor of German war dead.

For a combination of pettiness and utter lack of logic, this would be hard to beat. How can a man more truly show his love for his country than by dying for it? Does not such an act automatically enshrine him among his country's heroes?

Logically, it is hard to see how the German government can strike these Jewish names from its honor rollsunless, at the same time, it contrives to find some way of giving their lost lives back to them.

NOT TO BE KEPT SECRET

As long as there are human beings who defy the law and go out to get what they want at the point of a gun, the newspapers will be obliged to print crime news; and just so long, probably, will the argument about that kind of news be carried on.

Crime news makes unpleasant reading. Now and then, honest citizens feel that it is news which should be suppressed. And one of the best answers that we have yet seen to this argument was made recently by Prof Lowell J. Carr, of the sociology department of the University of Michigan, in an address before the University Press Club

at Ann Arbor. "We are never going to win our fight on cancer by shutting our eyes to its prevalence, and we are never going to win our fight on crime by suppressing crime news.'



DALLAS.—With the coming of cooler weather, work has commenced on the \$250,000 landscaping scheme which will transform Texas Centennial Exposition Park into one of the beauty spots of the nation.

Within the next 30 days more than 300 large trees will have been transported here from various parts of the state so that the flora of every section of Texas may be represented on the Exposition grounds. The trees will be shipped by freight and motor truck. Palm trees, 40 feet tall, will come from the Rio Grande Valley, live oaks from Waco and Austin, Spanish oak from South Texas, towering pines and cedar elms from East Texas and magnolias from the South Central part of the state.



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
