Gets Into Line-Up MIAMI, Okla. (P).—The name of Key Wolf, made famous by a squat, 210-pound Indian who captured the great University of Oklahoma foot-ball team of 1908, has bobbed up again, this time in the lineup of the Miami high school. "Key junior, son of the Wolf, is lighter than his father but his work at tackle has caused even the gruff "obo", as the elder Key was known, to grunt his approval. "The younger Wolf at 17 weighs around 160 pounds. His father was five feet seven inches tall and weighed 225 pounds when he en-rolled at the university in 1905. Ben G. Owen, then Sooner coach, work-ed him down to 210, a weight he retained during the five years he payed for Oklahoma. "Key the elder was captain of the 1908 Sooner squad that defeated Texas 50 to 0. He played tackle on defense and guard on offense. The "Jobo" played unorthodox football, grabbing the opposing lineman around the neck and applying a headlock to keep him out of action, when he first started, causing Owen no end of embarrassment in penal-tices until the mentor taught him the rules and guard.



UN-AMERICAN DISTINCTION

An Italian woman living in New York and working at the somewhat humble trade of dress finisher was hurt in an accident on an elevated railway some little time ago.
