

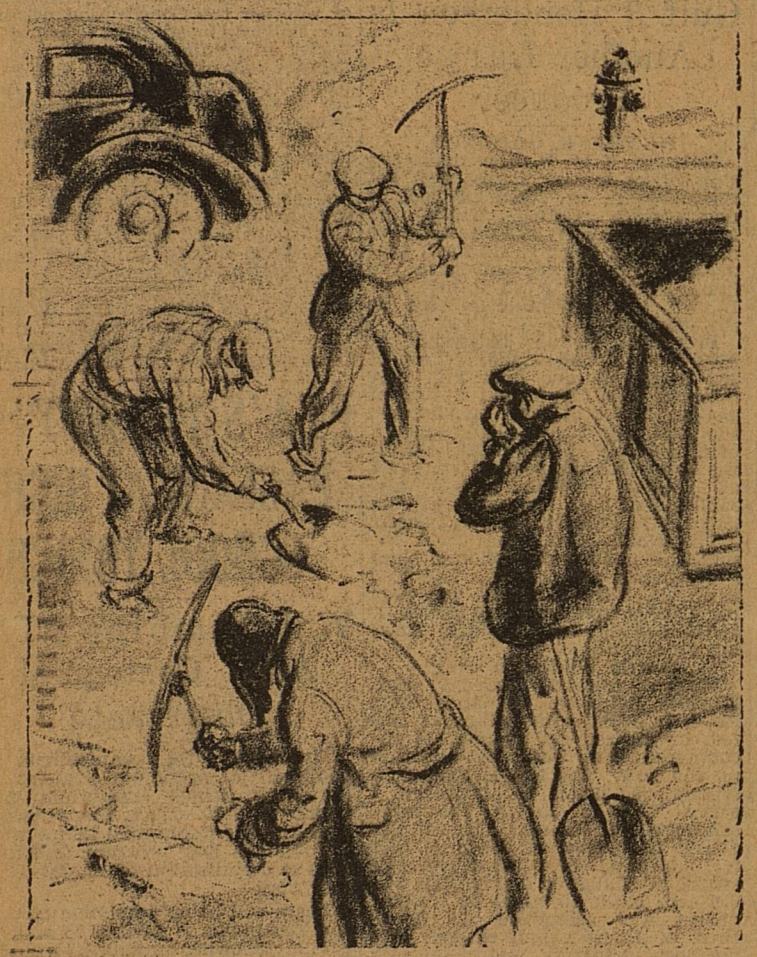

School children get a greater percentage of oxygen, of course, on their daily trips, than the younger fry. But even so, many of them use cars or busses in which the air keeps moving to a degree, and is changed more or less, but which also is breathed by more people and becomes as impure as house air.

There are several ways of giving the children their daily supply of uncontaminated atmosphere during the ultra-cold weather.

One is to change house air frequently to put up windows and to open doors. Pushing the house completely does not take long and is not the fuel-waster it sounds.

The ventilated house is easier to heat than the sealed one. By ventilation is meant, no draughts and thin streams of cold air, but the planned ventilation that does not endanger health. This may be the scientific type of heating system that automatically changes the air, the open fireplace (log or coal) whose open chimney acts as conductor of currents, or the simple flushing of the house, as before mentioned.

To flush the house two or three times a day, slip on out-door wraps to protect the children or put them in a warm room temporarily. Skipping that one until the rest of the house is purified.

So much for the house. When the day is not too windy or stormy, or cold enough to freeze the tail of a dog, there is no reason for small children not going out into

RANGE CONDITIONS IN TEXAS STILL FAVORABLE; DETERIORATION SLIGHT

Surplus of Feed Crops Remaining in Most Areas With Little Supplemental Feeding Being Necessary

The condition of livestock and ranges in Texas remains favorable with only slightly above average deterioration during January, according to the monthly report of the United States Department of Agriculture. There is a surplus of feed crops remaining in most areas, with very little supplemental feeding necessary so far this winter. Conditions of wool have been very active. Prospects are favorable for good lamb and calf crops. Extreme cold weather during January injured winter ranges and caused the condition to deteriorate more than average during the month. However, moisture conditions are more favorable than for some time, and prospects are favorable for early spring and summer range feeds. Portions of the northwestern and western districts still have insufficient moisture to insure summer range feeds, but the balance of the state is adequately supplied. Grain fields are furnishing some grazing in portions of the plains area of northwest Texas, but in several counties, in the western and extreme northern portion of this district, growth has not been sufficient to allow much grazing. The condition of ranges at 77 per cent of normal is 5 points below the condition reported a month ago, but is 1 point above the 10-year average, and 30 points above the condition a year ago.

Many Marines Back For Home Visiting NEW ORLEANS.—When the battleship USS Arkansas docks in New Orleans on Feb. 21, many young Marines will be returning to their native Southland for the first time since their entry into the U. S. Marine Corps. The Arkansas has aboard several hundred men of the First Brigade, Fleet Marine Force, whose headquarters is at Quantico, Va., under the command of Brigadier General James J. Meade, USMC. It is believed that short leave will be granted those young men living in the vicinity of New Orleans.
