Resettlement Program in Rio Grande Valley Begun

BROWNSVILLE, Nov. 5. (P)—
The Federal government's east rural resettlement program directed by Rexford G. Tugwell, has begun operation with the Lower Rio Grande Valley the point of launching the experiment.

The first farmer in the nation to file application for a loan was Martin Clark of Raymondville. It was approved here and sent to the regional office at Dallas.

All the work except the farm purchasing division now is functioning in the valley and this is expected to be opened soon. Under the plan, a farmer, a former farmer or a man who wants to be a farmer may arrange for purinase of a farm. He will be set up on a farm and furnished with implements and other needed supplies for a year.

ment conference in London on Dec. 1, and the statesmen of the world are pulling back their cuffs so as to be ready for another round of the grand old game of dealing Uncle Sam three small ones off the bottom of the A disarmament conference right now would seem

to be a prodigious waste of time, since there is not a government on earth that has the remotest intention of reducing its armament. But back of the scenes some interesting things are due to happen, and if the American delegates aren't careful they are likely to come home wearing barrels in place of pants.

Great Britain, the world's pre-eminent naval power

for some two centuries, is all set to make enormous additions to her fleet. The coming elections are expected to result in victory for the Conservative party, and this party is all for a great naval building program. It is reported that fully a billion dollars will be spent on British warships and airplanes in the immediate future.

And the American delegation will have to play a lone hand if it tries to argue for continuance of the existing fleet ratios.

Uncle Sam, in other words, stands to collect a great deal of ill will. In England he will be blamed for opposing England's "unselfish" desire to be ready to support the League; in Japan, for opposing the Japanese desire for

However the cards fall, he is due to lose. Under the circumstances, it is a little hard to see why he should bother to go to London at all.

Regardless of its other activities, our federal government seems to have established itself as the greatest investor in the history of the world.

Treasury Department figures show that government credit agencies have loans outstanding for more than \$8,-250,000,000, and have assets to the dizzy sum of \$11,500,-000,000. This is by all odds the largest single accumulation of capital ever gotten together in America. The country's 10 largest banks do not have resources enough to buy it out.





"White Man" Shows Inevitable March of Inevitable Events

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following review of "White Man" by Samuel Raphaelson was written by Mrs. Powell specially for The Reporter-Telegram. She read the play before the Play Readers club at a meeting recently.

Raphaelson proves his versatility when he swings from writing such sparkling triviata as "Accent on Youth" to such serious drama as "White Man." In this play he presents a startling and powerful aspect of one of the most outstanding social problems facing the United States today: that of the negro who is able to pass as white.

One reads the play with an uneasy, squeamish feeling that nothing can come out right—and nothing does.

The main characters are very real in their tragic situation and suffering. Sympathy is keenly felt for the brilliant young architect who has so little negro blood that he feels himself to be white and for the emotional young girl who marries him, not knowing of his tainted blood, only to be told later when she is to bear his child and tries to believe herself strong enough not to let the knowledge matter.

His own people cannot stand by him, his marriage based on the promise there would be no children tricks him, his child, born white, turns dark, and his father-in-law takes his wife away. To add the last fatal touch as one glimmer of hope shines through for a reconstructed life among his own people, he is mistaken for a white man, drawn into a street fight, and kills another negro.

There is no comedy, no sophisticated patter reminiscent of other plays, nothing but the inevitable marching of inevitable events.

I'm in favor of attacks. If anyone, any team or any town isn't getting what's coming, the best thing to do is to set up a howl. Up at Lubbock, when the Centennial funds had almost been allotted, Dr. W. A. Jack-son of Tech set up a howl and proved that West Texas had been left out entirely in the Centennial abpropriations. And now Tech will get the museum which he asked for.

Midland gets left out of a lot of appropriations by not asking, fighting for and demanding something. The only thing I know of which has been allotted to Midland without a campaign is the federal building. And while surrounding towns have been getting huge PWA and WPA appropriations, Midland has gone along making her own living.
