Knox Defeats Borah in Illinois Primary Voting TEXAS; OKLAHOMA

Bullet Wound is Fatal to Denton, Cain is Charged

Funeral Services To \$2500 Bond Is Made Be Held Today For Victim

Lloyd "Jack" Denton, 36, Midland resident succumbed to death at about 7 p.m. Tuesday, approximately 48 hours to the minute from the time he received a gunshot wound in the neck Sunday afternoon in a South Main street beer parlor.

Cain was released Tuesday afternoon at the beer and sandwich parlor operated by Arlis Cope on South Main streets.

Since the time of the injury Denton had been in a local hospital, and despite first beliefs by physicians that he would recover, his condition gradually grew worse until the time of his death. The wound, thought at first to have been only a flesh wound, proved later to have touched the spine, paralysis following immediately after the bullet, entered the neck.

The accused man has intimated that he will plead self-defense, alleging that he shot Denton after the latter had made threats toward him and started at him as the aftermath of a quarrel between the two Sunday afternoon.

Cain was arrested immediately after the bullet, entered the neck.



States Month Late In Starting Work For Year

NEW ORLEANS. Apr. 15. (/P)— Drought in Texas and Oklahoma and excessive rain in the East to-day is hampering planting, and threatening to become a major fac-tor in the federal government's 1936 cotton curtailment program. Six of the ten chief cotton growing states reported planting to be from one to four weeks behind sche

Texas and Oklahoma are afflicted with a persistent drought re-tarding planting as much as a month. Central and Southwest portions are about three weeks hind. Planting time in the North has started, with little being done. The area from San Antonio Northward, comprising three-quarters of the cotton land in the biggest staple state, is 50 to 75 per cent deficient in moisture.

The Carolinas, Georgia, Alabama and Tennessee are harrassed by rains, retarding the planting three weeks in some places. Arkansas, Louisiana and Mississippi are near-

"Sec. 2 (e) The term 'sale,' or 'offer for sale' or 'sell' shall include every disposition, or attempt to dispose of a security for value. The term 'sale' means and includes contracts and agreements whereby securities are sold, traded or exchanged for money, property or other thing of value, or any transfer or agreement to transfer, in trust

This subsection contains other provisions that are too lengthy to

oe quoted in this letter.

In order to lawfully engage in the business of selling or offering to sell securities in this state, one must, therefore, qualify as a dealer or salesman. A registered dealer may sell any class of securities that may be lawfully sold in the state of Tex as. He is required to fill out cer-tain blanks that have been prepared by the department of state.
