RURAL "GRAPEVINE"

There is a revealing human touch in a disclosure made recently at a gathering of telephone company officials in Minneapolis.

This disclosure was to the effect that while rural communities, welcome all manner of new mechanical gadgets, there is one old-fashioned way to which they cling: they do like the old party-line telephone, which permits all and sundry to listen in on their neighbors conversations.

"It is an intimate part of rural life," said one official. "If a doctor is to be called, if baby swallows a button, or if almost any other sort of emergency arises, the housewife runs to the phone, twists the bell, and gets the persons urgently wanted. And the rest of the neighbors know all about it in a few minutes, for there are as many as 20 parties on one line.'

There is more to this than simple noseyness. A farm can be an isolated, lonely place, breeding a great thirst for intimate human contacts.

The old party line helps to meet this need-informally, but effectively. No wonder the rural community doesn't want to give it up!
