WASHINGTON, Feb. 25. (P)-A charge that Major-General Bolles, commander of the seventh corps area at Omaha, Nebraska, was "actively engaging" in politics was heard today in the senate debate on the suspension of Major-General Johnson Hagood as eighth corps commander.

Senator Hastings, Delaware, termed the relieving of Hagood an "illustration of the terrorism in government," when Senator Robinson hurled his charge about Bolles.

Hagood was relieved Monday as a swift aftermath of his recent criticism of WPA funds as "stage money," by direction of the president in a move that stirred immediate repercussions in Congress.

Although the war department gave no reason for its unusual order, sending the army's third ranking senior general officer home to await further instructions, members of congress and others ascribed his "reprimand" to his testimony before a congressional sub-committee that "you can pass it (WPA) around, but you can't get anything out of it."
