Major-General Over Post at Omaha Charged

SENATE DEBATES

Relieving of Hagood Is Argued by Solons

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25. (AP)—A charge that Major-General Bolles, commander of the seventh corps area at Omaha, Nebraska, was "actively engaging" in politics was heard today in the senate debate on the suspension of Major-General Johnson Hagood as eighth corps commander.

Senator Hastings, Delaware, termed the relieving of Hagood an "illustration of the terrorism in government," when Senator Robinson hurried his charge about Bolles.

Hagood was relieved Monday as a swift aftermath of his recent criticism of WPA funds as "stage money," by direction of the president in a move that stirred immediate repercussions in Congress.

Although the war department gave no reason for its unusual order, sending the army's third ranking senior general officer home to await further instructions, members of congress and others ascribed his "reprimand" to his testimony before a congressional sub-committee that "you can pass it (WPA) around, but you can't get anything out of it."

The couple will live at Big Spring. Marriage witnesses were Judge E. H. Barron and H. L. Hart.

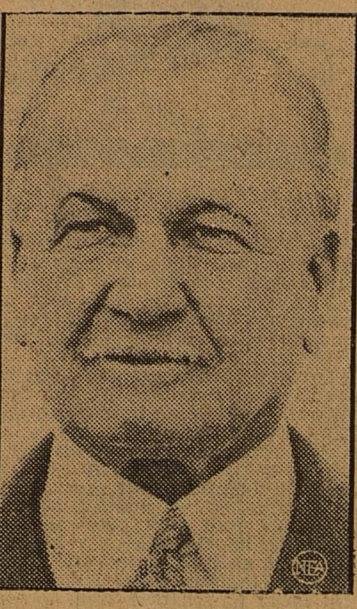

BIG SPRING RODEO DATE DESIGNATED

Annual Cowboys Reunion Will Be Staged on Sept. 7-8-9

BIG SPRING, Feb. 25.—Dates for the third annual Cowboys Reunion here have been changed again to avoid conflict with the rodeo held at the centennial exposition of the Texas centennial in Dallas.

Nine Counties Get 31 New Well Locations

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CALL ALIENISTS TO TESTIFY FOR OKLAHOMA GIRL

Advances by Father Are Related by Emma Willis

ANADARKO, Okla., Feb. 25. (AP). Four alienists were called Monday night to testify at the murder trial of Emma Willis in an effort to strengthen the defense contention that the 18-year-old brunette was insane when she shot her share-cropper father to death last December 21.

Miss Willis testified Monday that her father had made improper advances toward her, and had beaten her many times—just like he did all the stock—with rocks, sticks, pieces of iron, or anything he could grab.

Dr. Covne Campbell and Dr. F. E. Erwin, Oklahoma City mental specialists, and Dr. R. W. Williams and Dr. J. W. Henry, Anadarko physicians, were ready to testify to the mental condition of the defendant. Defense counsel contends the treatment that 51-year-old Addis H. Willis accorded his daughter affected her mind.

"He handled me all over," said the girl, blushing deeply as she recounted alleged instances in which her father had made advances toward her.

The girl's mother, tall, work-bent Mrs. Zonia Willis, followed her father frequently to get her corroborate testimony. The mother said she knew of improper proposals her husband made Emma.

"Because she wouldn't go down to the watering trough and chase a big bull away, he knocked her down with a club," Mrs. Willis testified.

Some of the observers in the tiny Caddo county courtroom made comparisons between Emma Willis' story of her father's brutality, and the testimony of several months ago in the case of Edith Maxwell, 21-year-old Wise, Va., school teacher convicted of patricide.

In the Virginia case, Miss Maxwell testified she struck her father with a shoe in self defense after the father, allegedly intoxicated, attempted to stab her with a butcher knife for returning home after midnight.

Miss Willis told the jury that her father frequently tried to get her to go out with him, unaccompanied. "I always told him I'd rather stay home," she said.

Willis was shot to death last Dec. 21, in bed at his three-room home near Eakly.

Sheriff Elmer Finley and three other witnesses testified the girl admitted firing the fatal blast.

OUSLER SAYS GOV. DISREGARDED THE TRIAL EVIDENCE

Identification of Hauptmann Said Overlooked

QUOTES "JAFSIE" Says That Dr. Condon Re-Emphasized Four Points

NEW YORK, Feb. 25. (AP)—C. Fulton Ousler, magazine editor, expressed the belief today that the questioning of the Lindbergh witness, Millard White, by Governor Harold G. Hoffman of New Jersey disregarded "four important points" brought out at Richard Bruno Hauptmann's trial.

Ousler listed the points as: Identification of Hauptmann by Dr. John F. Condon, Hauptmann's possession of the ransom money, testimony of handwriting experts and testimony on the kidnap ladder.

He commented that Dr. Condon had re-emphasized the four points in a talk with him in Panama recently.

In his cell in state prison, Hauptmann, convicted of the Lindbergh kidnap-murder and doomed to die the week of March 30, took hope from the latest developments.

Fisher said the condemned man was "greatly encouraged" though the governor reiterated he has no intention of granting a second reprieve unless circumstances warrant.

Astronomers Expect to Wrest Secrets of the Universe From New Telescope

United Press Staff Correspondent PASADENA, CAL., Feb. 25. (AP)—Astronomers estimate the new 200-inch telescope using the great mirror will act as a "light funnel." All light reaching the 200-inch circle will be reflected inward because of the curved surface, to a simple beam small enough to enter the eye.

A distant star's image reflected to this point of focus will be bright and sharp. Subsequently this image then may be magnified greatly through a set of lens without becoming fuzzy—just as a photograph which will be held in Midland, May 8 and 9. Word has been received that state and district officers will attend.

An unusual entertainment program has also been arranged for the evening, officers said, and urged that all veterans attend.

Searchers decided today that it would be impossible to recover the bodies until the ice thaws.

Look Directly Into Mirror

Astronomers using the new telescope at direct focus will perch in a cartridge-shaped carriage in the middle of the 55-foot tube near the top. They will look directly down at the mirror.

Under other arrangements a small mirror, instead of the astronomers, will be placed at the end of the tube. The mirror will reflect the star images back through a hole in the center of the "great eye."

In another type of focus, a mirror placed at a 45-degree angle will reflect the light off to one side. Astronomers will do little direct "seeing." Most of the work will be done photographically. A camera plate exposed to the reflection from the "great eye" for hours will pick up "dim stars" and nebulae that a direct visual observation would miss. The developed photographs are studied under microscopes later.

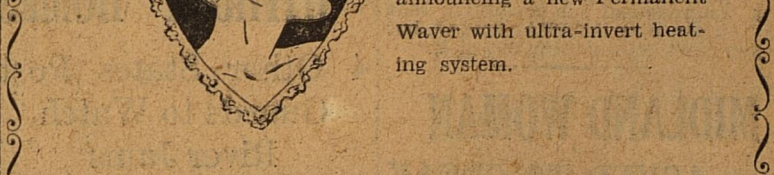

TAX ON RFC LOANS KILLED BY SENATE

Bi-Partisan Attack Charges Democratic Chief "Enriched"

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—Despite a bi-partisan attack, during which a democratic chief was charged with receiving salaries of \$90,000 a year from RFC borrowers, the senate Monday voted to exempt bank stocks held by the RFC from state and local taxation.

Senator Couzens (R-Mich.), joined by Senator Ashurst (D-Ariz.), led the opposition to the measure. It was Couzens who asserted that Walter J. Cummings, treasurer of the democratic national committee was receiving big salaries from agencies borrowing from the reconstruction corporation.

A 38 to 28 vote sent the bill to the house, where early consideration appeared likely under a rule adopted today limiting debate to two and a half hours.

The measure was drafted after a recent supreme court ruling in a Maryland case that bank stocks held by the RFC were subject to local taxation. The decision, generally interpreted as meaning that the corporation's huge holdings of such stock in various banks could be taxed by other states, precipitated swift administration action for a new law to prevent this.

As passed by the senate it contained an amendment proposed by Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.) calling for a reduction from four to three and one half percent the interest charged by the RFC on loans to closed banks.
