RETURN TO SELF-RELIANCE URGED BY THE STATE WPA ADMINISTRATOR

Denies Federal Government Has Invaded Rights of States and Cities

SAN ANTONIO, Feb. 26.—A return to the self-reliance and resourcefulness of the nation's fathers was urged by State Works Progress Administrator H. P. Drought in an address before the regional meeting of the League of Texas Municipalities here last week. Declaring the vital "states rights" governmental principle to be at stake, the state administrator asserted he had heard much of state and local governmental rights being assumed by the federal government, "but I know of no such right that has been assumed when the state or the local government discharged the responsibility incident to it. You can not retain the right when you shirk the responsibility for the people demand that the responsibility be discharged, and they bestow the right on the government that meets the demand." The statement was Drought's answer to a resolution recently directed by the league to national authorities requesting a relaxation of Works Progress Administration eligibility to permit persons not heretofore on relief to work on projects. "In all fairness to you, my friends," Drought said, "I certainly believe that you should discharge those governmental functions which the people have always entrusted to you and not appeal to Congress to discharge them for you." Drought challenged the accuracy of a previous statement by the league's executive committee that the state has "an estimated 50,000 employables, representing 200,000 individuals, unable to qualify" for WPA jobs. "There are not 50,000 worthy people in Texas wanting federal jobs—there are at least 200,000 such people who would be glad of an opportunity to have such jobs from time to time. No rule could be formulated which would cut out fairly and justly from this 200,000, one-fourth of them. The determination of who might and who might not work would soon be based on favoritism. And suppose we should offer work to this 200,000, or even only 50,000 of them, from where will the money come with which to pay them? Great as is the four billion dollar appropriation it is not unlimited. A fair division of it has been made among the states on the basis of their respective employables and it has been prorated so as to provide work for these employables until next June 30. Adding even 50,000 more workers in Texas would result in our share of the four billion being exhausted long before June 30. This would mean that many of our employables now at work, if not the 50,000 'worthy people' you have discovered, would soon be faced with starvation. Surely you do not in-

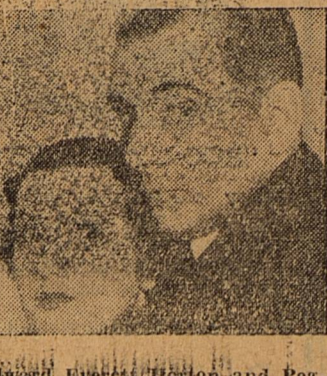
Late News

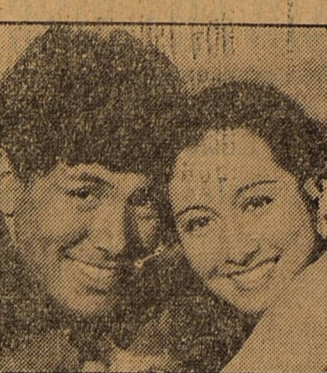
CIA Sponsors Series Of Radio Broadcasts
