week with an initial production of 1213 barrels in 24 hours. The oil flow was accompanied by 1,000,000 cubic feet of gas. First pay was logged at 4216 feet, and the well reached a total depth of 4250 feet in limitations.

It was shot with 230 quarts from 4205 to 4245 feet. Before shooting it registered a natural production of 378 barrels of oil with 831,000 cubic feet of gas in 18 hours.

Location is 1980 feet from the south and 660 feet from the west line of section 35, block 43, township 1 north, T. & P. survey.

While one Gaines county wildcat fished for tools as the week ended, the other 'drilled ahead in hard lime. Three miles northwest of Seminole, W. T. Walsh and Harry Adams Corp. No. 1 Averitt is trying to recover a string of drilling tools and half a string of fishing tools lost when the former was blown up by heavy gas coming from 3940 feet. In drilling from 3915 to 3940, the well hit as many as 15 gas pockets, estimates on the flow running around 3,000,000 cubic feet daily. Operators ordered special fishing tools delivered to the rig. The No. 1 Averitt is located on a seismograph high in section 228, block G, W. T. R. R. survey.
Fourteen miles farther northwest, Wahlenmaier, York and Harper No. 1 Dr. E. H. Jones has reached 5125 feet in hard gray lime, having made about 50 feet in the past week. Originally scheduled to go to 5000 feet, the test is being drilled to 5200 to make available additional geological information for the area. It topped solid lime at 4980 feet. The No. 1. Jones is in section 414, block G, C. C. S. D. & R. G. N. G. survey.
