THE PANHANDLE PROTESTS

(An Editorial in the Amarillo Daily News) The News believes it is expressing Panhandle-wide sentiment in protesting the decidedly unfair publicity given this territory recently by eastern newspapers.

Typical example is the Monday, March 9, issue of the Cincinnati Inquirer, one of the larger papers of the nation, carrying a page one picture of an old abandoned shed outhouse in the "49" ranch pasture northwest of Dalhart.

The truth is that the Dalhart country has had only two bad dust storms this year and a relatively few smaller ones which have done little temporary damage.

The abandoned ranch shed, fence and windmill photographed is in the heart of a very sandy region and was abandoned years before the dust storm menace ever attracted any publicity.

No one dust storm or sandstorm is going to ruin any farm or any part of the Panhandle. No one season of dust storms is going to ruin this country because it has a wonderful soil and if given half-decent treatment will bound back into its own in record time upsetting world wheat, corn and cattle markets.

About the most damaging thing the Panhandle region has to "put up with" are the deliberate lies told by tenderfoot easterners and spread by unprincipled and uninformed individuals or organizations who, seeing a swirl of dust of a weather beaten shed and corral, pull in their weak and yellow necks and yell at the top of their canary throats: "Wolf, Wolf!"

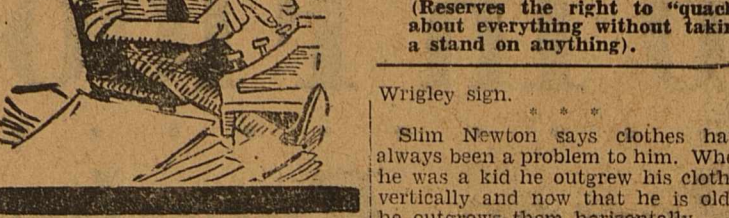





Scientists' Field Meet at Gonzales

GONZALES, Texas, (Sp.)—A Centennial celebration field meet for scientists will be held at Palmetto state park near Gonzales on March 26, 27 and 28.

Widespread interest has been shown in plans for the meet which is sponsored by the Texas Academy of Science and which will be directed by the Gonzales Palmetto Park board in cooperation with the Texas State Park board, the National Park service, and Fort Sam Houston officials.

Important features on the three day program will be a series of field trips and auditorium programs. The first wild flower show in Texas was sponsored by the Gonzales Women's Study Club in 1926.

The "pisang-suribu," or King banana, tree has its fruit growing directly from the trunk. The larger the tree, the larger the bunch of bananas. The fruit of this native Malay Peninsula tree, however, is tasteless and is not eaten by the natives.

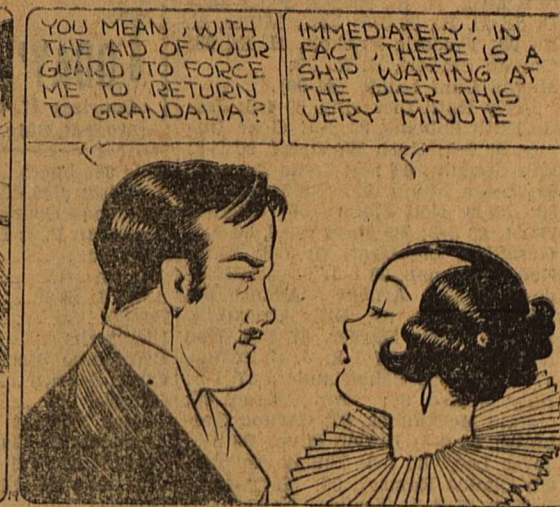
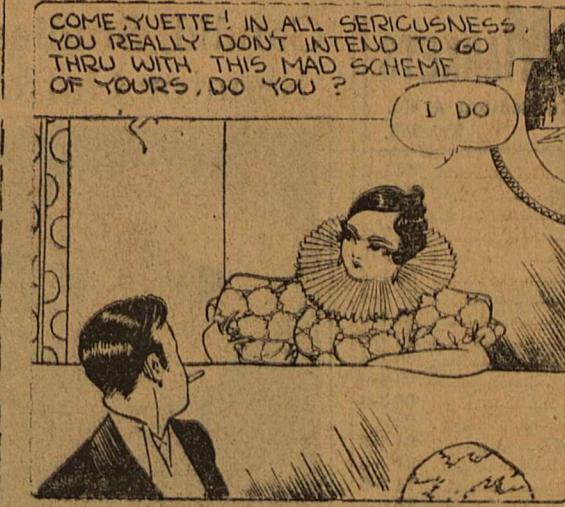

A clergyman won first prizes for pastry and confectionery making at a cooking exhibition in England in 1934.

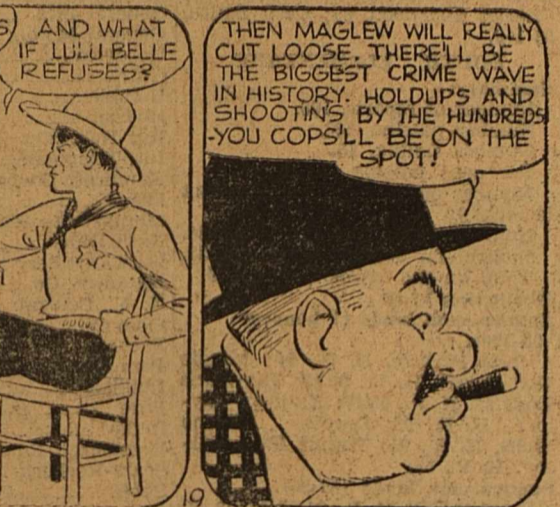
