WASHINGTON, June 6—If any of the kids start asking, "Hey, mama, what is politics" during the conventions, you might give them a little lesson by telling them what is happening in Louisiana, domain of the late Huey Long.

Almost unnoticed, the government moved the other day to dismiss criminal income tax evasion charges against Seymour Weiss, chief henchman of Long and four other Long politicians in New Orleans.

Carrying the Roosevelt banner in Louisiana and is replacing them with politicians designated by the Long machine. Feud Was Huey's Own The Long people explain that the bitter fight between Long and Roosevelt was Huey's personal feud, that lacking a great leader they're powerless to carry it on, anyway, and that they're quite content to dominate Louisiana without looking about for more fields to conquer, as Huey did.

The Louisiana delegation will be whooping it up for Roosevelt at the democratic convention, the Long machine politicians have forgotten all about Huey's proposed third party, and the two Louisiana senators, John H. Overton and Mrs. Long, have been playing ball with the administration. And, by way of returning the compliments, the administration is replacing its former loyal ap-

points. State PWA Administrator Frank Peterman has been succeeded by a Long man. Louisiana's federal housing administrator lost out in the same way. Rufus Fontenot is still collector of internal revenue at New Orleans, but the Long machine has named the man to succeed him.

A Long man became postmaster in New Orleans in April. The state representative of HOLC is on the way out, according to Huey's followers. They also promise that the jobs of U. S. marshal at New Orleans and Shreveport and the U. S. district attorneyship at Shreveport will soon be delivered to them.

Protective copyrights on "Share the Wealth" and "Share Our Wealth" were taken out by Earle J. Christenberry, former secretary to Huey and now secretary to Mrs. Long, who is filling out her husband's unexpired senatorial term. Christenberry has turned the copyrights over to Mrs. Long.

Allen J. Ellender, Huey's former speaker in the Louisiana legislature, who will come here next January for a six-year senatorial term, is pledged to raise the "Share the Wealth" torch again and carry on, although no one suggests he will be anywhere near as effective as Huey was.

Headquarters of "Share the Wealth" are in New Orleans and large jobs of late Huey's speeches are being sent out to interested parties—but not any of the speeches which attacked Roosevelt. Also, club buttons.

TYLER PLANS ON BIG CONVENTION

Roosevelt Invited to Make Address to Assembled Editors, Newsmen

TYLER, Texas—What the Texas Press Means to Texas" will be the theme of the 1936 Texas Press association convention to be here June 11 and 12.

The convention is expected to be opened early the morning of the eleventh by a train platform talk by President Roosevelt. The chief executive has been invited by several hundred Texans to appear here and arrangements can be made to have his train routed through without loss of time to his next scheduled appearance. Definite confirmation is expected by the local arrangements committee daily from Washington.

President Louis C. Elbert of the press association will open the convention with his annual address. T. B. Ramey, prominent local lawyer, will issue a welcome to the press members to Tyler, "The Rose Garden of America," on behalf of the city and business organizations.

"Closer cooperation and more thorough understanding between the agency and publisher" will be the theme talk of Alfonso Johnson, secretary of the Southwestern Advertising Agencies.

Joe B. Cowan, publisher of the San Saba "Star" will talk on the much discussed subject of "Grafting schemes worked on newspapers—present and past." Deskin Wells, publisher of the Wellington "Leader" winner of many state awards and National Editorial winner in weekly paper contest, will discuss "The Schools of Journalism may mean to the Texas newspapers."

"The parity of local and foreign advertising rates" will be covered in an address by Irl W. Brown, director of space for the Texas Daily Press League. Frank Shannon, publisher of the Wharton "Spectator" will speak on "What Class of Free Publicity should be banned by newspapers."

One of the outstanding features of the press convention will be given by George A. Riley, vice president and general manager, American Press association, in his address on "Looking Forward with the smaller town publisher towards an increase in foreign advertising."

The press body will be invited to be guests of the Centennial Exposition at Dallas the 13th and 14th and to attend a luncheon at the Exposition grounds by Frank Watson, director of promotion and publicity of the Centennial Exposition.

Ray H. Nichols, of the Vernon "Daily Record," will present the report of the "Constitution and By-Laws" committee, and a new constitution for the association will be presented for discussion.

A memorial service will be conducted by Mrs. Ella E. Lane, publisher of the Shiner "Gazette" and her committee. A report will be given by the several divisional press associations regarding work done during the year.

Chevrolet Buys Out Durant Calif. Plant

The Chevrolet Motor company has purchased the former Durant plant at Oakland, Calif., says an announcement by M. E. Coyle, president and general manager of Chevrolet.

"Our present assembly facilities at Oakland have proved inadequate to meet the demand for Chevrolet passenger cars and trucks," said Mr. Coyle. "We have, therefore, acquired this additional plant, which contains 315,000 square feet of floor space."

"By January 1, 1937, Chevrolet will have completed necessary rearrangements in both Oakland plants, and will then operate them as one unit."

"Both passenger car and truck capacity will be increased when the new plant goes into operation."

The former Durant plant was built for assembly purposes, and is well adapted to Chevrolet operations. It consists of a main building 600 feet long on Fourteenth street, and has three wings extending to the rear, one 600 feet deep and two 400 feet deep. The buildings, of modern construction, are two stories high except for one wing. A two story office building faces Fourteenth street.

This purchase will increase the number of Chevrolet assembly plants to eleven and the total number of Chevrolet manufacturing and assembly plants to 24.
